# Heart of a warrior, heart of a nurse

Jessica and Reagan Blackwood at Redlands Community College's School of Nursing, A longtime office manager, Blackwood decided to become a nurse after learning Reagan would be born with a congenital heart defect.

Jessica Blackwood thought she had life all planned out. She had a beautiful daughter, a great job, greater husband and was pregnant with her second child. Little did she know how much a routine medical test would change everything.

"We were getting the ultrasound to learn the baby's gender and something was just off - they said it was probably their older equipment, but they set me up with a specialist," Blackwood said. "We knew, we just knew, something was wrong."

It was. Blackwood and her husband Matt

soon learned their baby - a little girl - was seriously ill. At 22 weeks, the couple first learned about hypoplastic left heart syndrome, a congenital heart defect that results in insufficient formation of the left side of the heart. HLHS meant their as yet unborn child, whom they would name Reagan, would need a series of three open heart surgeries before she was old enough to attend school.

While an understandably stressful time, Blackwood also found peace as she and Matt prepared for their daughter's birth.

"Because Reagan wasn't born yet, we had

accomplishments in each of their respective fields.

McHenry graduated from SAU in 1981 with an associate degree in nursing. She then earned a BSN at the University of Arkansas, an MSN at the University of Oklahoma-Tulsa, and a Doctor of Nursing Practice with a specialty in executive leadership from Union University.

She was honored and humbled to receive the award.

"I am so excited to be recognized by my alma mater," she said. "It is a humbling feeling to know that your colleagues believe you are worthy of such an award. When I look back at those who have been recognized before me, I am honored to be in their company. My learning experience at SAU cultivated my confidence and established me as an independent thinker. My faculty were dedicated nurses who loved teaching and their profession. They instilled this love and respect for nursing in me.

"Today, the confidence I gained at SAU has grown exponentially

and has propelled me to take on challenges and move into roles that I never imagined. As an independent thinker, they taught me to analyze situations, remain calm and never doubt my capabilities. The foundation they gave me is still solid today."

McHenry joined the OBU faculty in 2013 as dean of the College of Nursing. Before coming to Bison Hill, she served as assistant director of the Eleanor Mann School of Nursing at the University of Arkansas. Her clinical practice includes medical surgical nursing, long term care, adult psychiatry, staff development, adult addictive disease, children/ adolescent psychiatry, and human resources.

McHenry is the founding president of the Arkansas Directors of Nursing Administration in Long Term Care Association and past vice president of the National Association of Directors of Nursing Administration in Long Term Care. McHenry chaired the Transition to Practice Committee for the National Council of State Boards of Nursing and served as the vice president of this organization. She served four appointments by the Governor



of Arkansas, including the Long Term Care Advisory Board, Minority Health Commission, Arkansas State Board of Nursing, the Governor's Roundtable on Healthcare, and the Health, Safety, and Rural Development Committee for the Arkansas Farm Bureau. She is currently serving on the Finance Committee for the American Association for Colleges of Nursing.

# Martha Burger Named OCU President

Oklahoma City University has named Martha Burger as its next president, Board Chairman Ron Norick announced today. Burger will become the 18th president and first female president of the 114-year-old university July 1.

Burger is a former energy industry executive, most recently serving as senior vice president of human and corporate resources at Chesapeake Energy Corporation. She is very active in civic and professional organizations as well as statewide initiatives.

She has a long history with Oklahoma City University, receiving her MBA from OCU in 1992 and an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from the university in 2012. She has served on the OCU Board of Trustees since 2008 and chairs its audit and finance committee.

Burger is co-founder of Amethyst Investments LLC and a member of the board of directors of Tapstone Energy.

"Martha Burger's accomplishments in her career and her service to the university have prepared her well to serve as OCU's next president," Norick said. "She is the right person to guide our university forward. I am delighted that she has accepted the position, and I am very excited about the future of the university."

"I look forward to serving the students, faculty and staff of

Oklahoma City University," Burger said. "I love this community we live in and am honored to have a role developing students as they become active, engaged and productive citizens with a heart for service."

President Robert Henry will continue leading Oklahoma City University until his retirement June 30.

time to look at options," she said. "We decided when it was time we would go to Dallas; Reagan ended up having surgeries first when she was nine days old, at six months and again on Jan. 2 of this year."

It was in Dallas a new idea of Blackwood's future began to crystallize, she said. First there was the frustration of having to step aside as medical professionals handled her tiny daughter's treatment.

"It was so difficult for me as a mother to watch others care for my brand-new baby and then try to explain the best way possible what Reagan needed – and me still not have a clue what was going on," Blackwood said. "I was paralyzed with fear, so lost, so traumatized, and I was frustrated because I didn't know how all this worked and how they were going to take care of my little girl."

That's where an idea germinated and then began to grow – Blackwood would leave behind her managerial job and jump into something completely different.

She would become a nurse. That decision was reaffirmed

when the couple became acquainted with an organization formed to help families like the Blackwoods. It was called Mended Little Hearts and it was a Godsend to the family, Blackwood said.

"They were just amazing," she said. "We were going back and forth to Dallas, there was so much going on, and they were the first organization to stand up and help."

That was two years ago, and Blackwood's life has moved beyond anything she would have expected when she first learned she was pregnant with Reagan, she said. She is set to graduate from Redlands Community College's School of Nursing in May, not long after Reagan's second birthday, and has established herself as a beacon to families going through challenges similar to what her own experienced.

Blackwood has done that through social media and outreach, including her position as lead coordinator for the Oklahoma City office of the organization that did so much for her. Mended Little Hearts of Oklahoma City hosts educational programs, provides a lifeline and support network between families and resources, as well as promoting congenital heart defect disease awareness.

Her work there led to a lastminute job helping to coordinate OU Children's Hospital's February 2018 Heart Week activities and ongoing sponsorship of the Heart of a Warrior softball tournament, in its third year set for April 28.

"Over the years Heart of a Warrior has hosted so many events that have benefited families who have a child suffering from a medical condition that requires them to stay long periods of time in the hospital, as well as donations to the Ronald McDonald House and NICU at Children's Hospital," Blackwood said.

The NICU is where the 29-year-old Blackwood's hopes to be as she readies for the start of her nursing career, she said. After going through what she did with Reagan, she believes that's where she belongs, working in yet another way to help families make it through the medical and emotional challenges that come with a congenital disease.

"When you have a child with a congenital heart defect, there is no cure, there's always going to be medication, there's always going to be procedures," Blackwood said. "I want to be there for those people that are facing that frustration and that terror that goes along with this and other conditions like it."



In 2007, Misty Carruthers joined Cancer Treatment Centers of America (CTCA) in Tulsa, as a nurse tech in the inpatient unit. Little did she know that over time her career would progress to LPN, RN, charge nurse and ultimately to manager of the inpatient unit.

"I always knew that I wanted to be in the medical field early on," said Carruthers, who recently celebrated her 11th anniversary with CTCA. "After visiting loved ones in the hospital and truly getting to see the impact the nurse made, not

only to the patient but the family as well, I knew I was meant to be a nurse.'

After attending Nathan Hale High School in Tulsa, Carruthers submitted her job application at CTCA in Tulsa because she loved the vision of hope the hospital has for those struggling with cancer. "I applied several times and didn't hear anything," added Carruthers. "I am a firm believer that the Lord leads you to where you need to be. #### thrilled. "

Quickly after joining CTCA, Misty enrolled at Platt College for her LPN. "After receiving my LPN, I transitioned into the LPN role in the CTCA inpatient unit. I immediately began my LPN-RN bridge and received my RN. From there I continued floor nursing and eventually became charge nurse. When my manager transitioned to a new role in a different department, I applied for her position. I am now the manager of the same unit that I started out as a tech in. I literally grew up as a nurse at CTCA and could not be more grateful for the opportunities CTCA has given me."

Currently, as inpatient nursing manager, Misty manages а department of 33, including nurses, techs, and a unit secretary.

"Cancer is a tough field and can be sad at times," said Misty. "One of the main things we do is help 'nurse' a patient back to health. Sometimes with cancer we can and sometimes we can't. At the end of the day, God is the ultimate healer, and we are merely his assistants during their journey. Cancer patients are unlike any patient you will ever have during your career. For example, one time when I was working on night shift, I had a patient who was actively dying and felt sorry for me because I had to stay awake all night. I think that speaks volumes about our patients and their caring nature towards our staff."

Misty continued, "Our patients teach us to be grateful for every day that we are given and to hug our families a little tighter when we get home. I definitely get so much more out of caring for my patients than I feel that I could ever give to them."

Misty's advice for those who want to pursue a nursing career is to first become a Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) and work in an area you are interested in. "If you still want to be a nurse after that time, then you know you have most likely chosen the right career path," said Misty.

Misty has been married to her husband, Terry, for 17 years and they have three daughters. "I could not have asked for a more supportive, loving, and understanding family," added Misty. "I am blessed beyond measure. My cup runneth over."

# Special to the Nursing Times Overcoming Obesity: Life-Saving Tips

The biggest pro to gastric bypass is the weight loss boost, in addition to improved obesity-related health conditions and better quality of life. However, there are cons that need to be considered. Immediately after surgery, you will be on a pureed diet, and slowly transition to solids. Portion sizes will be much smaller due to the decreased surface area of your stomach, which might be hard for your brain to comprehend. Keep in mind that the pros and cons

vary depending on the type of surgery you receive.

Overcoming obesity is an ongoing battle, but you can do it. Revamp your diet, find an exercise routine that works, and when all else fails, consider alternatives such as bariatric surgery to get things going. You won't win the battle overnight, but victory is within sight.
