Easter Seals' Adult Day Health a blessing for families

With nearly three decades in healthcare, Tony Lippe, LPN, has always focused on caring for others.

But it wasn't until he began with Easter Seals Adult Day Health Center a little more than a year ago that he really started seeing the difference he could make.

The Adult Day Health Center provides special care for adults who are unable to care for themselves for extended periods of time in a protective group setting enabling them to maintain or improve their ability to remain independent.

"It's such a mixture but they're all able to thank you and love you back," Lippe said of the patients he works with every day. "Some we've kept out of nursing homes until they pass away. One lady, I just loved to death, was 94 and was here every day until she passed away.

"You're not coming to work. We're coming to give these individuals purpose in life."

Vicki Wood serves as the director of Adult Day


LOCAL COALITION PLANS RALLY TO RAISE AWARENESS ABOUT PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE

Concordia can generally serve about 200 seniors, he said.

Residents are able to age in place. When a resident qualifies to live at Concordia, they are committed to receive whatever contractual level they need through the continuum of care.

We work very hard for residents to age as long as they are safe in the lowest level of care and remain as long as they are safe and we can meet their needs," he said.

Jacquelyn Rolen, RN, serves as director of Health Services. She earned her bachelor's degree in nursing when living in Pennsylvania. She recalled the days when she was a nurse aide. Her mom was a charge nurse at a nursing home. Rolen would work there on weekends.

She then chose a path of ICU nursing for 27 years until she moved to Oklahoma where she began working in hospice and palliative care. She became very interested in working with elders. So she discovered Concordia.

"The residents are just wonderful," Rolen said. "Each one has their own personality and you get to know

them. When I came here, I said, 'How am I going to know all of these people?"" But soon she became more familiar with the residents. She learned all about them.

"It's really rewarding to help them at the end of their life," Rolan

Concordia offers activities in each department. Outside vendors come to Concordia to provide music. Hospices are also welcome for birthday celebrations, Rolan said. An intergenerational memory care program is provided.

"One hospice was coming in and bringing younger people like their children," she said. "They have games, card games. There's Bingo and dominoes going on every night."

Also, there is an arts and crafts program in tune to the needs of different residents. Assisted living may be more creative, she said, while in Memory services they reach their personal best, she said.

Residents bake cookies and take bus rides each Wednesday, weather permitting. They are taken to different places. Recently they went to Braum's Dairy and came home with milk shakes. Their bus rides take them to Lake Hefner or Buttram said.

"They have different spiritual services. They have gospel music and dog therapy. There's a couple of different therapy dogs that come in," Rolen said. "There's one real cute one with long hair. And the residents love them"

Independent residents also do some performing for the assisted living or memory care residents. The skits and musical programs are especially appreciated during the holidays.

"Especially in memory, a lot of our residents will come over and help with activities and games," Rolen said.

Rolen looks for the qualities of dependability and reliability in the nursing staff. Some residents need that constant care and it's not good for the residents to experience staff changes frequently.

"And it's not good for the rest of the staff who give the care," she said. "They need compassion. They need to be here for more than the paycheck and be willing to give a lot of physical care to these patients depending where they are."

There are a lot of rewards as a nurse at Concordia. But it is hard

downtown Oklahoma City at times, work, Rolen said. Assisted living can be more emotionally challenging when the residents sense they are losing their independence, Rolen said. So the staff needs to be flexible, she

> "It feels good when the families come up and say 'Thank you. I couldn't have done it without you,"" she said. "You want to do it."





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
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CAREERS IN NURSING NURSE HAS UNIQUE "BOND" WITH NEW HEALTHPLEX

The opening of Mustang's St. Anthony Healthplex last December was big news for a lot of people.

For the City of Mustang, it was an opportunity to finally have its urgent healthcare needs met by a 24/7, 12-bed emergency room.

And for nurses like Debo Bond, RN, it was a chance to do something few nurses will ever get to do in their careers.

"It's actually very exciting to come in when there's no equipment, bare floors and rooms and you get to stock it and be part of that process," Bond said.

St. Anthony Healthplex Mustang officially opened its doors to care for patients in and around the Mustang area on December 11, 2014. The new facility is located at the corner of State Highway 152 and Sara Road.

Services include a full service Emergency Room, Diagnostic Imaging Center, Procedure Suites, and Breast Center. The second floor is occupied by St. Anthony Physicians Group primary care physicians and specialist physicians.

Bond - and nurses just like him - were able to literally come in on the ground floor of this ambitious St. Anthony project that brought quality healthcare to the Oklahoma City suburban community.

Sleeves were rolled up and egos were pushed aside.

For the 47-year-old Bond it was a breath of fresh air to his 15-year nursing career.

It was a homecoming in more ways than one for Bond, who worked for St. Anthony when he first entered nursing.

"I went to some other opportunities and then came back for a variety of reasons," he said. "One was I was excited about being part of the commitment and a new facility and being close to home."

For Bond, the location is perfect. Living between Mustang and Tuttle, Bond attends church at LifeChurch in Mustang. "I can usually get here legally in seven minutes," Bond said with a grin.

Key features of the facility include a comprehensive, state-of-the-art electronic health record integrated with St. Anthony partner hospitals throughout the state, spacious emergency area with attention to unique lighting and materials to ensure quietness and a soothing atmosphere. Patient-focused details in each emergency exam room will offer the feeling of a hotel rather than a clinical setting.

The Breast Center borrows spa-like design features to enhance the patient experience. The Diagnostic Center and Procedure Suites enable more high-quality outpatient healthcare services.

Bond entered nursing from a different route. He was an athletic trainer and then worked in physical therapy before beginning emergency medicine as a basic EMT then progressing to paramedic.

"Honestly, I got into nursing because of ministry," Bond said. "One

reason I love St. Anthony is I love the philosophy of treating patients from a physical, emotional, mental and spiritual standpoint. That's my philosophy. I felt like I was called.

"I feel like God has led me to become a nurse and minister to people who are broken and need healing."

The St. Anthony community in Mustang is tight-knit. With close to 19 full-time nurses, 10 part-timers and another 15 ancillary staff, everyone pulls their own weight and then some.

"It's kind of like a big family," Bond said. "We all kind of chip in to do everything from housekeeping to security."

The community has embraced the new ER.

"There was a lot of anticipation," said Bond, noting the facility even had an emergent patient show up on its doorstep two days before opening. "The word is getting out and we're reaching people. Some come all the way from Elk City or the other side



"Rob and I have been friends since Mid High and High School at Edmond Memorial. There are about 5 or 6 of us that make up a core group that have remained close all these years. When I got my driver's license I checked the box to become a donor, but I didn't think much about it until Rob told me his kidneys were failing."

of Chickasha. It's not shocking to me but on the other hand they're hearing it from a family member we've taken care of or word of mouth."

The community is excited that nurses like Bond are taking care of them.

"We have enjoyed working with the St. Anthony officials, and are excited about the expansion of healthcare services in our community," said Mustang Mayor Jay Adams. "This facility will have a significant impact on the quality of life and economy of our community."

Bond sees his career continuing with St. Anthony. Taking time off recently to focus on a parent with health issues, he says he more than likely will begin a route towards an APRN designation soon.

"There's a lot of opportunities for growth personally for me," said Bond, who has children ages 23, 19 and 15. "St. Anthony is a big organization and there's a lot of room for upward movement, whether that's in a charge nurse role or within the St. Anthony organization."

Health Services with Lippe leading the medical portion. Perri Jo Johnson is the Activities Director/CMA with Vicky Justin, CNA and Tina Adams, CNA also providing care and friendship.

The program utilizes music therapy, horticulture, arts and crafts, current events and other programs to help clients maintain a high level of functioning.

"We're thanked every day by almost all of them as they come through the door as they pick up mom or dad or brother or sister," Lippe said. "I never knew how much it meant because we are with them maybe 40 hours a week. They are with them all night, evenings and weekends and they just come in here drained sometimes. It gives them that respite that they've never had.

"It means so much to them to be able to get that break they need and know they are safe. And it still lets them live their life."

Lippe says it's a sad reality that many seniors end up in long-term care facilities simply because loved ones can't take off from work to care for them or they don't know day centers are available.

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
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
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Kamp Joins Mercy Clinic Edmond Santa Fe

OCU Named a 'Best in the West' College by Princeton Review

Oklahoma City University is one of the best colleges in the West according to The Princeton Review (www.PrincetonReview.com). The well-known education services company lists OCU among its "Best in the West" recommended schools in its 2016 Best Colleges: Region by Region website feature that posted earlier this month.

"We are pleased to be recognized again by The Princeton Review," said OCU President Robert Henry. "Inclusion on this list reflects Oklahoma City University's commitment to providing high quality education and academic rigor."

The feature is accessible at www.princetonreview.com/bestwestcolleges. Only 125 colleges in 15 Western states made the "Best in the West" list for 2016. Collectively, the 649 colleges on The Princeton Review's "regional best" lists constitute about 25 percent of the nation's 2,500 four-year colleges.

In its website profile on OCU, The Princeton Review stated that students describe the college as a "close-knit community" and provides them with the resources to "accomplish as much as possible."

"Undergrads love OCU's size which translates to, 'big enough to have exciting things happen all the time but small enough so you see people you know and don't feel overwhelmed," the review added.

"We chose OCUand the other outstanding institutions on this list primarily for their excellent academics," said Robert Franek, The Princeton Review's senior vice president of publishing. "We also gave careful consideration to what students enrolled at the schools reported to us about their campus experiences on our student survey for this project. We designed our 80-question survey to include questions that prospective applicants might ask on a campus visit. Only schools that permit us independently to survey their students are eligible to be considered for our regional 'best' lists, and only schools at which we see a strong level



of satisfaction among their enrolled students — whom we consider their customers — make it to our final slate of regional 'best' college selections."

The Princeton Review editors made their selections based on data the company collected from its survey of administrators at several hundred colleges in each region, as well as its staff visits to schools over the years, and the perspectives of college counselors and advisors whose opinions the company solicits.

The Princeton Review survey asks students to rate their colleges on several issues — from the accessibility of their professors to the quality of their science lab facilities — and answer questions about themselves, their fellow students, and their campus life. Comments from surveyed students are quoted in the school profiles on The Princeton Review site

Some student comments in the OCU profile included "enthusiastic," "ridiculously intelligent" and "incredibly personable" professors. One impressed senior stated: "They are motivating and expect the best out of their students. After we graduate I know we will be supported and helped in any way to find a career."


The Princeton Review also scores the schools on its"Best Colleges: Region by Region" lists in six categories. The scores — which are ratings on a scale of 60 to 99 — appear on the school profiles. They are tallied primarily from institutional data the company obtained from the colleges. Some also factor in student survey data. OCU had strong ratings for having accessible professors [93] and interesting professors [88].

The 125 colleges that The Princeton Review chose for its "Best in the West" 2016 list are located in fifteen states: Alaska, Arizona,

Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming. The Princeton Review also designated 225 colleges in the Northeast, 159 in the Midwest, and 140 in the Southeast as best in their locales on the company's "2016 Best Colleges: Region by Region" lists.

The Princeton Review does not California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, rank the 649 colleges, either overall, by region, or in various categories.

A friend of mine recently told me she thought I was a relationship addict. I'm not sure I really understand what that is and I certainly don't think that is me. But now I am curious. What is a relationship addict?

Relationship addiction can show up in any number of ways: as an obsession, for example - a constant thinking, ruminating about the person you're in a relationship with. Or there may be a compulsive quality about the behavior - for instance, making frequent detours just to drive or walk by the partner's workplace. There may also be signs of tolerance increase. In the relationship addicts case, this translates into needing more and more of the other person's presence to feel OK.

Jealousy and possessiveness may surface as the need "to protect the supply" occurs. And there is most definitely the symptoms of withdrawal. When a separation from the person is experienced he or she may become anxious, depressed and unable to focus on activities of daily living.

The crucial distinction between relationship addicts and other people who fall in love is that the former expect this fleeting phase of a relationship to become a utopian endless summer that sustains forever the poetry, the ecstasy, and the feelings of merger they experience in their infatuation.

Not only have women been socialized to nurture and take care of men in relationships, but they - in particular - have believed the myth of romance. As women, we have accepted the notion that if only we find the right person, we'll fall in love and live happily every after - as fairy tales promise.

Given this stage setting, it is not surprising that even women who are not relationship addicts show many signs of dependence. But obsessions, compulsions, and the temporary high of being "in love" are neither love nor proof of love; on the contrary, they are the signposts of falling in love - that tempting ecstatic feeling that can so easily lead to dependence and addiction.

One of the safeguards to avoiding addiction to relationships is to lead a balanced life. Think of the recreational runner you know, for instance. Those least likely to become addicted to their sport are the ones whose lives have variety: they include time for work, for fun, for friends, for family. The people to be concerned about are those who become impatient at anything that interferes with their single-minded pursuit of their "drug."

If any of this information sounds like your behavior please seek out "Leaving the Enchanted Forest" by Stephanie Covington. It is an eye-opener!!

2015 Jim Thorpe Courage Awards Gala

For 21 years, INTEGRIS Jim Thorpe Rehabilitation has presented Courage Awards to individuals who display exceptional bravery and grace through the most difficult of circumstances.

We are proud to announce this year's winners: Sam Allton, Mac McCrory and Jason Wisdom.

Sam Allton's voice was at a whisper when he arrived at INTEGRIS following a massive stroke. The road to recovery would be a long, tough one. Allton's stroke left him nearly speechless, nearly completely paralyzed on both sides of his body and with limited swallowing capability. Beloved co-workers visited him regularly – his smile and good humor leading the way through grueling physical therapy sessions. The effect of Allton's uplifting outlook was apparent as he began to eat a regular diet, hold telephone conversations with his children and regain use of both sides of his body. Today, he can even walk short distances with minimal assistance. Now living in Tennessee with his daughter, Allton continues his therapy efforts and sends regular updates to his Oklahoma home about his persistent progress.

Mac McCrory was unable to walk after suffering the effects of multiple embolic strokes. He thought the worst was behind him. His physical therapy progressed as he relearned daily living activities, and he consistently completed tasks to improve his memory/recall awareness, also affected by the numerous strokes. Although showing definite signs of improvement in all areas of his therapy, McCrory sustained another setback when he learned he would require cervical spine surgery. But this news didn't deter his hard work to reach his goals. Through the help of this therapists and the support of his family, McCrory accepted the challenge not only by facing his obstacles head on, but by encouraging other patients along their rehab journeys. McCrory's recovery continues as he is now able to walk independently and has regained use of his upper extremities.

Jason Wisdom's life changed dramatically on Oct. 13, 2013. A mosquito bite left him paralyzed with one of the worst documented cases of West Nile virus. After two months of exhausting hospital treatment in which he experienced a multitude of life-threatening respiratory issues, Jason was admitted to the INTEGRIS Jim Thorpe Rehabilitation. Once a family man, entrepreneur and triathlete; 38-year-old Jason now required complete assistance. Eating was particularly worrisome since the threat of choking was ever-present. His faith never wavering, Jason pushed himself in every aspect of his recovery. The consummate athlete, he participated fully in his sessions and even set personal goals on the side as his therapies continued. From his discharge date on Feb. 21, 2014, Jason keeps in constant touch with his therapist friends to apprise them of his continued improvement, visiting the unit frequently to encourage others. Nearly one year to the day of his ICU arrival, he completed the INTEGRIS Jim Thorpe Courage 5K Run. Although fatigued and tired due to back pain, he refused a wheelchair to finish.

INTEGRIS Jim Thorpe Rehabilitation will honor these courageous individuals at the seventh annual Courage Awards Gala.

The event will take place Saturday, Aug. 22 at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum, 1700 NE 63rd St., Oklahoma City. Doors open at 6 p.m. and dinner and awards ceremony will begin at 7:00 p.m.
