There is something exciting taking place in Bethany, OK. It is the new opening of Bethany Behavioral Health! "Today is the first day that we're open to see patients," says Rob Lake, CEO. "It took a lot of people to make this work and it's nice to see everything come together so well. This is the old Deaconess Hospital so it has come a long way. The whole place has been renovated and everything is brand new, along with the latest equipment. New business, new facility, new everything," Lake said.

Bethany Behavioral Health is a 57-bed psychiatric hospital meaning more mental health crisis beds for the Oklahoma City metro. "Of course, as our patients grow in number, our facility will grow also. Our program will help adults over the age of 55 with major mental

January of 2015 before his daughter was born.

"It's a funny story what got me in the medical field," Dennis said. "She likes to watch Gray's Anatomy. And we started watching it and the next thing you know she started suggesting I try to become a nurse. She talked me into trying to get into an LPN program and I actually got into it right out of the oil field."

Kelsey studied to be a nurse at Meridian Technology Center in Stillwater and Dennis earned his CNA license after attending the Kiamichi Technology Center in Stillwater where he also attended LPN school.

Dennis had to delay his LPN training in order to move to Edmond where he said he found better opportunities.

"I love it and you couldn't get me to go back to the oil field," he said. "I love the interaction. I love working with people."

He would show up at the oil field to work whether he was sick to his stomach or at his best. But not at Grace, he said. A sick staff member at Grace is told to rest at home, he said. Dennis said he's not

used to going home when he's sick but appreciates the flexibility he has found.

"They work with appointments," Kelsey said. "Just like tomorrow we have to be gone for appointments. We just let them know ahead of time and they work with our schedules. We don't have any problems."

He has a plan laid out to become an LPN and is sticking to it. Dennis said that Kelsey pushes him with encouragement like he has never been pushed before. He will earn his CMA license and in the spring, Dennis will apply for an LPN program.

"I fully intend on furthering myself here. There's no reason to go anywhere else," he said.

He describes himself as a talker, so it's fun chatting with the residents, he said.

"People with backgrounds that go further than what most people realize," he said. "I've met world renown people here. You wouldn't know it just by looking at them, but world famous people with famous histories."

One resident's grandfather rode with Pancho Villa. Another man is know as a well known sculptor, he

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Kelsey said it's nice to have someone at home knowing what their spouse is going through at work.

"I love it," Kelsey said of Grace. "There's a great DON and ADON. It's some of the best management I've ever worked for. There's wonderful aides here. I have excellent support staff. I never have trouble finding help."

Any questions she has can be answered immediately, Kelsey said. "I can get hold of my ADON night or day. It's wonderful and I love it here."

Kelsey does not remember a time when she did not have an interest in nursing. She lived nearby Meridian Technology Center in Stillwater for a while and decided to enroll. She has worked in long-term care nursing since graduating.

Dennis works on the rehabilitation hall. He said there's better money to be made while working in the oil field, but working at Grace makes him feel worth more.

"I love seeing people get stronger. I love seeing them leave," he said. "I love helping them get there. I love being the guy that they ask, 'Hey, where's Dennis at?' That makes me feel better than I ever did working in an oil field."

The couple loves to spend their leisure time together at parks with their kids.

"We take the kids out every chance we get," Kelsey said.

Dennis and Kelsey met when he was still working in the oil field. He was drilling for oil outside of Guthrie behind a golf course. Kelsey was moving into some apartments nearby Grace Living Center Edmond.

"The first time we actually met I helped her move into her apartment," Dennis said. "And it just kind of went from there. She decided to let me come back and I couldn't stand being away from her."

illness disorders," Lake states. "We will have in-patient only. There will be a 5-day stay for adults and an 11-day stay for geriatrics. That number will change as we fill to capacity and I know we are going to grow in time. The patient will receive treatment for their individual needs and there will be an assessment before discharging them. We have the highest quality of care here," Lake adds.

Lake attended school at Texas Tech University, where he got his Bachelors and his Masters. Beginning his career in the medical field in 1987, he spent 20 years as CEO of different hospitals in different states. "This is the 7th hospital that I have been at," Lake says. "I've been at hospitals in Texas, Arkansas, New Mexico and several cities in Oklahoma. Traveling to different states gives me the chance to join in on a progressive and innovated opportunity to motivate companies for healthcare. With this being a new healthcare facility, it gave me the chance to hire all new people. Recruiting all new people

was fun, yet challenging. Right now, we have 45 employees. We have high quality employees and they were all hand-picked. I am very proud of each one of them. Our main concern here at Bethany Behavior Health is to help the patients with their problems. will focus on the patients and the quality of medical care as we see them. Right now, we have the chance to make this the best hospital it can be. Everyone needs to work as a team, doing their very best and we can make it happen. I think this is what makes everything run so smoothly," Lake said.

Some warning signs that could indicate a senior should seek help are: anxiety/agitation, confusion/disorganization, depression, fear/paranoia, fluctuations in weight, hallucinations/delusions, memory loss, mood swings, sleep disturbances, social withdrawal, suicide thoughts and wandering.

"Do you see any challenges that you might face as time goes on?" I ask Lake. "Well, like any new facility, I'm sure we'll face a few problems but nothing that we can't handle. I know I have the best employees and I see how well things have gone so far. I look forward to

the future and watching how much Bethany Behavioral Health is going to grow. I like my job and I like the way it makes me feel, even if I do face some challenges ahead, I can do it," Lake commented.

When not working, Lake stays active in many ways. Triathlons, golf, tennis and cycling. "Exercise is very important to me," says Lake. "My wife is an occupational therapist and she stays active too. We have 2 sons, Cody, 24, and Kyle, 23. Both boys will graduate in May of this year. We are so proud of both of them." Lake comments.

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CAREERS IN NURSING LPN GINGER ROBERTS DANCES THROUGH RESEARCH NURSING

Thirty-six years in nursing have gone by for Ginger Roberts. Her career has spanned from clinic to hospital and now finds her on the cutting edge of research nursing working at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation.

And it all started when she wanted to be a nurse to coincide with the hours her kids would be in school.

Nearly four decades ago she went down to the local nursing school at Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas and applied.

Her first job had her in an allergy clinic. She made allergens and administered the shots to patients.

In her 26 years she worked the night shift in OBGYN post-partum. She went to a medical surgical floor and then came to Oklahoma when her husband was transferred.

She started her Oklahoma nursing career on the south side of the city at Hillcrest on the orthopedic floor.

She worked chart audits before coming to Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation.

As luck would have it, she had just left her job and picked up a local newspaper to find an ad for an opening at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation.

"To me that sounded so exciting to be in research," she said.

The secretary for Dr. Judith James soon called and set up an interview and she was quickly hired.

From day one, it was up to Roberts to recruit patients from James' clinic for studies, complete their paperwork, take blood samples and run things from start to finish.

"We started with one study and now I'm at 34," she said.

Not all the studies run concurrently but Roberts is responsible for making sure all the paperwork is in order for yearly inspection by the foundation's institutional review board

Currently, she's running 12 studies. The number of study participants range from a handful to more than a hundred.

"You have to be highly organized and you have to know who's on first," she said. "I have file cabinets to prove everything is dotted."

In her nursing career Roberts feels like she's ending on a good note.

"This is the best," she said. "What I do is a little bit of everything so there is something new all the time. Throughout the history of my employment I learned different things at each place and I can use that information here. This is kind of the icing on the cake. It's really a nice place to work."

Unless the Powerball comes through, Roberts says she plans on spending three or four more years working at OMRF.

"I work with probably the nicest physician I've ever known in my years," she said. "She's great to work for. She respects you and gets your input on things. She's so smart and she's taught me a lot about every disease we've studied."

"It's been a great big learning process for me. When I started here I didn't know anything about rheumatology. Every study we do I learn a little bit more."

With 11 possible symptoms, lupus is one of the hardest diseases to diagnose and even harder to treat.

When the immune system loses the ability to distinguish between dangerous interlopers—like viruses, bacteria and fungi—and its own cells, the body's defense mechanisms become weapons of self-destruction. The resulting barrage of friendly fire can cause more than 80 different diseases. Chief among them is lupus, and OMRF has emerged a world leader in the study and treatment of this life-threatening illness.

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

an international consortium that has identified 13 genes specifically associated with the disease. The massive research project, which involves 150 scientists and nearly 7,000 research volunteers, has opened new frontiers in the quest to unmask the genetic culprits behind the disease.

Roberts says she learns something each day. Seminars and conferences are always available for Roberts to increase her knowledge

Around OMRF, Roberts has picked up the reputation of being a stickler for detail. She's meticulous when it comes to her patient records and super protective of her filing cabinets they reside in.

"I think they call me the HIPAA queen or something like that," she said with a chuckle.

On this day, the records of more than 3,000 patients that Roberts has coordinated over the years were being pulled and put into a new filing system.

"It's a big day. It's a little stressful," she said. "This week and next week I'm learning four new computer systems. I'm a little stressed

"My file cabinets are a really big mess right now."





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

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

In 2003 the World Health Organization published a report about clinical trials researching the effectiveness of acupuncture, discussing more than 100 Seneca Dewbre, M.A.O.M., indications across the following conditions: L.Ac. psychological, neurological, musculo-skeletal,



respiratory, gastrointestinal, gynecological, cardiovascular and others. We would like to introduce our acupuncturist, Seneca Dewbre, M.A.O.M., L.Ac. Dewbre has a Masters of Acupuncture and Oriental Medicine and is currently completing her doctorate specialization in gynecology. 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OMRF scientist discovers new multiple sclerosis biomarkers

In new research from the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation, scientists have discovered subtle biological signs in the development of multiple sclerosis that point to the need for highly individualized treatment plans for patients suffering from the disease.

MS damages the nervous system's ability to carry signals to and from the brain. The disease can cause a wide variety of symptoms, including problems with vision, tremors, paralysis, muscle spasms, imbalance and cognitive changes.

of international researchers, OMRF scientist Robert Axtell, Ph.D.,

completed a study to identify patient responses to different MS therapies, including the popular treatment interferon-beta. The findings were published in the journal Neurology, Neuroimmunology Neuroinflammation.

According to Axtell, the wide range of patient responses to medications is one of the biggest hurdles in treating MS, as the disease can be caused or affected by a variety of factors. Researchers measured 50 immune molecules in the blood and found that certain subsets of MS patients responded well to standard treatments while others did not.

"We looked for biomarkers that indicated the presence of disease, because they can help us identify which patients respond to specific therapies," said Axtell. "We collaborated with a lot of folks and received blood samples and clinical data from a sizable MS patient population. It took a lot of effort from many clinical and basic scientists to complete this study."

By knowing which biomarkers are associated with specific reactions or responses to certain drugs, said Axtell, scientists will have a better idea of how individual patients will respond to specific types of therapy. "Our study definitely showed us that MS is not biologically the same in every patient, and that lets us know that a personalized approach is needed when it comes to treatment."

Harald Hegen, M.D., Ph.D., of the Medical University of Innsbruck, Austria, who collaborated with Axtell on the study, believes that the research provides helpful information to guide patient treatment.

"Given the large and increasing disease-modifying number of treatments for MS, there is a strong clinical need for biomarkers that enable treatment allocation in the individual patient," said Hegen. "In the present study we observed that MS patients can be grouped by specific patterns of immune molecules, which were predictive for response to interferon-beta therapy."

Axtell said these results may eventually help scientists use these immune molecules as a predictive test for MS.

"We need to do many other studies to verify the molecules and refine the testing before this can be taken forward commercially," said Axtell. "But this research lays the groundwork for developing tests for prediction of MS or patient treatment options for the disease."

OMRF scientists Christopher Lessard, Ph.D., and Indra Adrianto, Ph.D., also contributed to the work, which was supported by grants R00NS075099 from the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke and P30GM110766 from the National Institute of General Medical Science, both a part of the National Institutes of Health.

MetroCare Hospital Day connects career programs and community partners

Careers Center (HCC) started a project-based learning experiment called MetroCare Hospital Day that has since evolved into a multifaceted success involving several career programs and community partners.

For many years, HCC students practiced classroom curriculum by setting up a mock hospital and "treating" fellow students and staff members who had simulated injuries. But last year, HCC Lab Simulation Coordinator and MetroCare organizer Josie Scott wanted to take the project to another level.

"Last year we decided to add a mass casualty component that could include more career programs and outside partners. This made the project even more engaging for students," Josie said.

The scenario was a bus crash full of students from one of Metro Tech's sending high schools. Since these students weren't yet enrolled at Metro Tech, this also served as a unique recruitment tool. Whereas in years past "victims" simply walked into the mock emergency room, last year Paramedic Program students from OSU-OKC transported patients by ambulance.

In 2016, the scenario was a school shooting, which allowed participation from even more Metro Tech career programs and community partners. This scenario was also used as a high-level drill for the Metro Tech Incident Command Team, which is comprised of employees trained to handle crisis situations at the district level.

Eight years ago, the Health shooting were the Oklahoma City Fire Department and the Shawnee County and City Police Departments who were assisted by the Metro Tech Law Enforcement Services students. Students observed building clearance and crowd control as they learn in their classroom curriculum.

The victims wore tags identifying their injuries and were transported to the mock hospital at HCC by OSU-OKC Paramedic Program students. Victims were then admitted and treated according to severity of injuries by students from Information Technology Center (ITC) Medical Office Program; HCC Health Careers Certification Program, Practical Nursing Program, Medical Assisting Program, Surgical Technology Advanced Unlicensed Program, Assistant Program and Radiologic Technology Program. MetroCare Hospital Day was filmed by South Bryant Campus (SBC) Video Design Program students who also interviewed victims, medical personnel and event organizers.

Josie plans to continue expanding MetroCare Hospital Day each year.

"Students tell us it helps them connect theory and practice. It helps them think outside the box and work on skills in a chaotic situation. These are skills we can't teach them in a classroom alone," she said.



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



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
