Splitt uniting growing Norman Regional Health System

Richie Splitt's kids attended All Saints Catholic School, just a stone's throw away from the Norman Regional Healthplex.

He's watched as the Norman Regional Health System has solidified itself over the past 70 years as the provider of choice for Norman and Cleveland County residents alike.

And just a couple weeks into his new role as the health system's interim President and CEO, Splitt couldn't be happier leading one of Oklahoma's few remaining independent hospitals as it continues to evolve.

Norman's second largest employer, only behind the University of Oklahoma, the Norman Regional Health System has undeniably woven itself into the fabric of Norman.

without a viable medical reason. Charts are audited by her to ensure the care provided at Mercy Family BirthPlace aligns with the hospital's professional standards, Dufrene said. Even if the standard of care is being met, Dufrene delves into what can the nursing staff do to make the standard better for patients and nurses.

"I make sure that everything we do here is meeting the latest guidelines and standards so we can provide the best care possible for the moms and babies, too," Dufrene said. "So I am constantly reading journals, updating our policies."

She attends meets with other nurses in the state sharing her field of nursing. They discuss the latest standards of practice and how they assimilate the best care.

Dufrene has worked her entire nursing career at Mercy Family BirthPlace on the campus of Mercy Hospital. She earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at OSU/ OKC in Oklahoma City.

"I worked at Mercy when I was in nursing school actually," Defrene said. "As a CNA I floated all over the hospital and then I started working at the Family BirthPlace right after graduation," she said. "I've been at the Family BirthPlace for seven and a half years and Mercy for nine years."

She has been in her current position for four years come April.

She understands the dimensional layers of labor and delivery nursing and puts them in context in order to keep the already competent nursing staff alert for best practices.

Dufrene believes this is her purpose as a nurse. She believes learning is relevant to a better life and that having a baby is one of the most important times in a mother and father's lives.

"We are always improving," Dufrene said. "Our nurses bring a lot of process improvements, too. What I do at the Family BirthPlace has a lot to do with our nurses."

Nurses are primed to do the best job that they can so that they can educate mothers and fathers with the best up-to-date information available.

Nursing school only provides a snippet of obstetrics nursing, Dufrene said. Labor and delivery nurses at Mercy are trained from the moment they are hired about

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comprehensive labor and delivery care.

"So we meet on a regular basis. We try to do it daily depending on how busy we are," she said of the nursing staff. "So we have a big color board up there and they put ideas or issues up on the board. We talk about if there is a problem with anybody and what we can do to solve it."

A lot of patients come to Mercy Family BirthPlace feeling uncertain about what is going to happen. Their uncertainty fades as Mercy Family BirthPlace nurses walk them through the process step-by-step.

"When they're trying to deliver natural without medication, we're the support base for them," Dufrene said. "It's a privilege walking them through the most important day of their life."

Dufrene and other managers step out during times of a high birth census to take patients when needed, she said of the interwoven team process.

"This is a second career for me. I was a teacher before I became a nurse and the experience I had when I had my twins was so amaziing, I thought I could see myself doing that. And when I decided to go to nursing school my kids were age 2."

"I went back to nursing school and I knew I wanted to be an OB nurse," she said.

Dufrene enjoys spending her leisure time with her twins.

"So a lot of our activity on weekends centers on what they're doing," she said. "Baseball, swim team and things like that. I love summer. It's my favorite season and we are fortunate that we have a pool."

"My favorite thing to do is to go home, kick back, watch the kids swim, read a book and workout."

Splitt points to the health system's employees as the reason behind its successes, growth and the community's confidence in the level of care it provides.

"It's our people," Splitt said. "We can build beautiful buildings and bring in the latest technology and it matters not if we don't have the staff who can operate it and make it function to the best of its ability and more than that relate to our patients and provide to them that reassurance and confidence and quality of care they expect."

"It's our people who set us apart from everybody else."

Since May 2013, Splitt has served as the Chief Administrative Officer of the HealthPlex Hospital and Norman Regional Moore.

He has led the rebuilding efforts of the new Moore facility and established the EMSSTAT ambulance service in the community. Splitt has also been instrumental in the expansion of patient care services on the HealthPlex campus

"Richie will provide the continuity of leadership and organizational

stability that Norman Regional staff and physicians require in order to continue providing exceptional care for our communities," Authority Board Chair, Tom Clote said. "Splitt will provide strategic direction and work collaboratively with leadership, physicians and staff to ensure system initiatives continue, as well as future growth and development opportunities."

Splitt took on the additional duties after former President and CEO David Whitaker left after 17 years.

"My main focus today is the same it was the day before any of this transpired and it's our people," Splitt said. "As leaders we're called to provide a vision and a direction and reassurance and confidence and trust. I was doing that before and in this position it's even more critical."

The gains the health system has amassed are even more impressive considering the system operates as an independent entity and one of a shrinking number of municipal hospitals left in the state.

"I'm just one person in this process and I'm extremely humbled by this opportunity," Splitt said. "It's a great responsibility I've been given and I take that very seriously. I

know as a single person I will fail without the help of the team and people around me."

Splitt will soon engage Norman Regional staff with a series of town hall meetings.

"I'm attempting to provide information in a way they can have a better understanding about who I am and what I see for our organization through their eyes, their work and their healing hands," Splitt said. "I would like to get affirmation and I want to serve alongside them in the movement forward."

Over the past 70 years, Norman Regional Health Systemhas grown to become a multi-campus system that serves healthcare needs throughout south central Oklahoma.

NRHS is operated by Norman Regional Hospital Authority, a public trust, which serves the public interests and functions as a political subdivision of the State of Oklahoma.

The acute-care facility on the Porter Avenue Campus is licensed for 324 beds and offers a full range of services.

The new HealthPlex campus at Interstate 35 and Tecumseh Road, licensed for 136 beds, features Cardiovascular Services, Spine and Orthopedic Surgery, and Women's and Children's Services.

On May 20, 2013 a tornado struck Moore Medical Center destroying the building. In May the new Norman Regional Moore emergency department will open to serve the emergent needs of Moore and south Oklahoma City.

Asked him if the continued confidence the hospital receives from the community ever surprises him and Splitt doesn't miss a beat.

"I say no because I've been part of this community for many years of my life," Splitt said. "I've known about this system for quite some time and have always admired it from afar until I joined it and became part of it.

"This is a very loyal community, a very proud community and they want what we want and that's the best. They want the best for themselves and their loved ones and we want to provide the best possible care for them."





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CAREERS IN NURSING HOME IS IN THE HEART: GOLDEN AGE NURSING CENTER

Three employees at the Golden Age Nursing Center in Guthrie found there niche more than 30 years ago at Golden Age and have worked there ever since then.

Roy Givens, a 52-year-old maintenance worker for 35 years; Carmen Tarrant, a CNA for 32 years; and Amparo Zamora, a CNA at the center since 1988, found their nests long ago.

"Well for one thing, I like my job. I like to help my patients. They feel like family to me and this is real close to my house so I walk here every day. I like this place," said Zamora, 69.

She met Tarrant at the center, who was doing housekeeping at the time and the two became friends. She found the nursing staff to be good coworkers and nice people, she said.

Tarrant's mother Thelma Bright had worked at Golden Age as a CNA when she accepted her job.

And since then Tarrant said her role as a CNA has changed a lot through the years.

"We didn't used to use lifts as much. Now we use lifts which makes it easier on the residents and us," Tarrant said. "It was still a lot of fun back then. Our menus have changed a lot and the residents like it better. They get to chose what they want."

Back in the 1980s, residents were taken to the dining room and would eat the same meal. Now they get to chose their meals for breakfast, lunch and dinner and can request a meal at any time of the day.

"I'm trying to learn something every day.," said Tarrant, 65. "And most of the residents, if you listen to them will tell you something each day like what they had done in their lifetime that I'll never get to do. Most of them has traveled and have done all kinds of things that's very interesting."

Givens never gave a second thought about leaving Golden Age. A friend recommended that he apply there and after a few days he found he liked it, he said. He has also made close friendships among the staff and residents. Givens said the Chappell family are very nice and generous company owners to work for.

He likes to learn about the residents' histories, the work they have done and also their military life. Some residents are veterans of World War II, he said.

"It's interesting to talk to them about Japan. They are great. We talk about when they were younger," he said.

Givens said he admires Tarrant and Zamora for their longevity and dedication to Golden Age. When they first started working there, all of the nursing staff wore white uniforms, he said. They changed the color.

"Everything changed a lot," Tarrant said.

Zamora immigrated to the United States from Mexico in 1978. Her husband had been working in Guthrie since the 1970s. She didn't speak the English language at the time, but was determined to learn. At the time, she said her husband was one of few Mexicans living in town. She said it was hard to go to the post office and communicate at the time when sending money back to her family in Mexico. Golden Age workers such as Tarrant helped her a lot to learn English.

"She was real patient with me because she could understand me and I could understand her," Zamora said. "We worked together."

"You have to like what you do. You're not just here for a check," she said. "That's what keeps me here. I like my residents."

When she's not working, Zamora prefers to stay at home and do

house cleaning. Most of her time is spent at home with her grand children, she said. Her daughter lives with her along with her daughter's children. Zamora has eight sons and daughters, 25 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

Tarrant said it makes her feel good when she's out in the community and the families of residents greet her at the grocery store. Even after several years, people tell her they remember her face and will remind her who their mom or dad was at Golden Age.

"They say, 'I still remember how you took care of them. It makes you feel good that from years ago you are still remembered," said Tarrant, who has four adult children and 11 grandchildren. Her grandchildren like to play baseball.

"The twins, oh my God -they are terrible," she lovingly said with laughter. "They destroy everything. They broke my window playing baseball. I cannot keep them down."

She goes to garage sales during her leisure time and likes shopping for groceries.

"That's my favorite thing," she said.

Givens said he enjoys movies

and going out to dinner with friends. He enjoys knowing a lot of people in Guthrie.

Tarrant lives in nearby Meridian, far out in the country away from city life. She likes her privacy and has few neighbors. Her drive to work is only 15 minutes. She laughed when saying she has a dog and cares for six stray cats.

"You can go outside anytime you want, sit out and watch the sun and the moon come up," she said. "You don't have to worry about somebody coming up to your door. It's peaceful."

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Beauty Queen's Dream Still Alive

It was Chelsea Walker's crowning moment. The moment she had worked toward for the majority of her 21 years. She had just been awarded the title of Miss Southeast Oklahoma.

"When they called my name, I knew my life was about to change," Chelsea recalled. "I felt nothing but pure excitement pumping through my body when they first put the crown on my head."

That day was October 25, 2015. Less than one month later, on November 20, Chelsea had something else pumping through her veins: she was on intravenous (IV) medications, lying in a hospital bed.

It started with a headache.

"I thought it was a migraine," Chelsea said. She was in her senior year at the University of Oklahoma in Norman. "No matter what I did, it wouldn't go away. It got to the point where I didn't want to have any lights on." A few days after the headache started, Chelsea drove to her mother's home in Ada.

"I was concerned the minute she walked through the door," Angela Walker said. "Her face was swollen."

Angela, a nurse at Mercy Hospital in Ada, kept close watch on her daughter. Within a few hours, Chelsea's condition had deteriorated.

"I woke up to her vomiting," Angela remembered. "She told me it was the worst headache she had ever had and her facial swelling was getting even worse."

That's when Angela knew it was time to take her daughter to the emergency room. In the middle of the night, the two raced to Mercy Hospital Ada. For Chelsea, much of



however, remembers every terrifying detail.

"I was so scared. It is such a helpless feeling," Angela recalled. "You begin to wonder if every decision that you are making is the right one."

Tasked with the choice of whether or not to allow Mercy Ada's Dr. Theodore Ware to perform a lumbar puncture, or spinal tap procedure on her daughter, Angela started to pray.

"They wanted to insert a needle into her spine to collect and examine her fluid. I didn't want her to go through a painful procedure, but I also didn't want doctor's to miss a potentially deadly disease due to my decision. I didn't know what to do, I asked God to help and guide me to make the best decision for my daughter."

Angela said moments after she prayed, a nurse came into Chelsea's room and reassured Angela that the procedure was needed.

"She told me Dr. Ware would only do the procedure if it was absolutely necessary, and that he was very skilled at them. I was just so grateful the nurse provided me with such comfort," Angela said.

Chelsea was not suffering from a migraine. Doctors found an epidural abscess, a collection of pus and

that night was a blur. Her mother, swollen body tissue, between her skull and the lining of her brain. She was immediately given antibiotics and rushed to Mercy Hospital in Oklahoma

> "At that point, I was really terrified," Chelsea said. "There were talks of me having full frontal neurosurgery, which meant they would remove my sinuses and make an incision from ear to ear."

> Dr. Joseph B. Cox, a neurosurgery specialist in Oklahoma City, was one of the doctor's on call when Chelsea arrived.

> "Typically, an epidural abscess is a medical emergency," Dr. Cox said. "They are usually treated with immediate surgery."

> But there was something different about Chelsea's case. Doctors made a split second decision against operating.

> "Because of the size and location of the abscess, we decided it would be best for Chelsea to not have surgery," Dr. Cox said. "Fortunately, doctors in Ada had given her the right antibiotics at the right time, and she was responding well to them."

> Less than one week after she was rushed to the emergency room and one day before Thanksgiving, Chelsea walked out of the hospital without having surgery. The beauty queen

chalks up her miraculous recovery to those who cared for her.

"I found strength in my doctors and nurses," Chelsea said. "They kept telling me I was getting better, that I was going to be fine and I believed them"

Every single person who entered her room truly cared about her," Angela said. "Her nurses were some of the best patient advocates I have seen in all my years of health care experience. I trusted that when I had to leave her bedside, she was in great hands."

Chelsea continued IV treatments at

her mother's home in Ada, and just weeks after she was released from the hospital, Chelsea graduated from the University of Oklahoma.

"Just imagine being 21 years old, studying for finals and having a neurosurgeon tell you that you may need brain surgery," Dr. Cox said. "She never once complained. She handled every curve ball well and was a pleasure to take care of."

Her last visit to Mercy Hospital in January revealed the abscess in her brain had almost completely vanished. Today, she is back to teaching dance classes in Ada and Norman. She will compete in the Miss Oklahoma pageant in June, and if she wins, she will represent the Sooner State in the Miss America pageant.

Be careful who gets to hear your story and know what you want from them. If you just want to talk maybe share with a really close friend or a therapist.

Bottom line, if you don't want to hear what they have to say, walk away. It's your life.
