who told me how amazing St. Anthony was. When that opportunity came it was just the whole package."

"I met with someone from St. Anthony and I will never work for another institution ever again."

Spiegel is the manager for the emergency room and has been with St. Anthony for six years. She began as an ER nurse and then moved to charge nurse at the south Healthplex campus.

"I would say 75 percent of the nurses employed at this facility live within Mustang or the surrounding area," said Spiegel. "They already were familiar with the different churches, community center and just different opportunities here.

"Being here they're able to represent St. Anthony by continuing to participate in the community."

Spiegel said it was the nurses who insisted they would bring health and wellness to the community.

Nurses are working on the Mustang Makeover Challenge which provides a host of services to community residents.

Free blood pressure checks are

routinely given. Nurses also offer their knowledge at various nutrition classes relating to different medical diagnoses.

"The nurses decided when we first opened here with Mustang being a very small, family-oriented community they felt people didn't know what we had to offer," Spiegel said. "(The nurses) know how great we are and how amazing the services we have here at this facility are they felt like their neighbors were unaware what we could offer them.

"We all had a meeting and they came to me with the ideas of how they could interact with the community to make the community more aware of the opportunities here. They take it upon themselves to see if there are different events they can participate in."

That includes the various Mustang city events as well as smaller events.

"It's amazing. It's what a nurse is designed to do," Spiegel said.

"We're not just here for when you need us but we care about the health of our community and we care about preventing persons from having to come to the emergency room.

"We want them to know we're here if they need us but we're really big on preventative care and education and this gives them the opportunity to do this in their nursing role."

The Critical Care Transport team at St. Anthony also goes out into the community.

St. Anthony brings an ambulance to local daycares to answer questions, let the kids look inside the rig and teach them what a career in healthcare entails.

Residents can also come to the St. Anthony Healthplex every Thursday for free blood pressure checks.

In Spiegel's mind it's just another instance of St. Anthony nurses fulfilling their calling each and every day.

ONA Executive Director Jane Nelson says nurses are always well received at the capitol and typically find the day very informative.

Access to efficient, competent health care is supported when Nursing professionals practice to the full extent of their scope of practice. Protection of the Nurses' Scope of Practice ensures the health and safety of every Oklahoman

Improving Oklahoma's health status will improve the physical, emotional, and economic well being of the individual, the family, and the community.

#### Education

Support only those educational proposals that do not put the emotional and physical well being of school children at risk.



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### OBU Celebrates Dedication of World Class Nursing Facility

Oklahoma Baptist University hosted a dedication and ribbon cutting for its state-of-the-art nursing building, Jane E. and Nick K. Stavros Hall, in February. The 32,000-square-foot facility is the new home to the OBU College of Nursing and is designed to provide cutting-edge nursing education for both undergraduate and graduate-level students. Members of the University community, local leaders, members of the health care industry, and University Board of Trustees members as well as health care leaders were on hand for the ceremony.

Stavros Hall includes five classrooms, a 109-seat lecture hall and a computer classroom, as well as spaces for students to study, meet and interact with faculty. The facility features six high-fidelity skills simulation labs, a medium skills lab, a health assessment skills lab, and a home health and bathing training room, totaling 24 beds.

The high-fidelity simulation labs are equipped with the industry's most advanced medical simulation solutions. They include lifelike human patient simulators that can blink, accept fluids,

and respond to a nurse's care. Instructors control the simulators and create changing symptoms for the students to respond to, ranging from fever, regurgitation, cardiac arrest, and more. The high-fidelity labs even include a birthing suite, with a simulator that "gives birth" to simulated baby, passing through all stages of labor.

Dr. Will Smallwood, vice president for university advancement, welcomed guests to the ceremony. Nico Gomez, CEO of the Oklahoma Health Care Authority, offered the opening prayer. Dr. David W. Whitlock, president, and

Dr. Lepaine McHenry, dean of the College of Nursing, both offered remarks.

In 2014, Nick Stavros provided the lead gift for construction of the new

facility for the OBU College of Nursing in honor of his late wife, Jane, who was the daughter of Victor C. Hurt, legendary OBU athletic director and football, basketball and track coach. The building is named in their honor. Members of the Stavros family also gave remarks during the ceremony, including Christina Stavros-Morton, Stephanie Stavros-Guinn and John Stavros.


In 1952, the Oklahoma State Board of Nursing granted OBU the approval for Oklahoma's first baccalaureate nursing program. The inaugural class of 11 students graduated in 1956.

OBU's nursing program now offers a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree, a BSN completion degree for nurses with an associate degree, an LPN to BSN degree, and a Master of Science in Nursing degree with a focus in either nursing education or global nursing.

# Leading Nursing Journal Explores He alth Effects on Women Who Consume Placenta

A growing number of women in the United States are choosing to consume their placentas after birth to achieve presumed physical and mental health benefits. However, strong scientific evidence to support these beneficial health claims is lacking, and the effect on women's health is relatively unknown.

In "Consumption of the Placenta in the Postpartum Period," Emily Hart Hayes, CNM, DNP, WHNP, explores the practice of placentophagy, or consumption of the placenta, and reviews evidence of the reported health benefits. Hayes' article appears in the January/February 2016 issue of Journal of Obstetric, Gynecologic, & Neonatal Nursing (JOGNN) from the Association of Women's Health, Obstetric and Neonatal Nurses (AWHONN).

Interestingly, almost all mammals consume their placentas; humans are one of the few exceptions. Women who do consume their placentas may have the raw or cooked placenta prepared for placement into capsules or they may swallow raw or frozen pieces whole or blend them with food or juice.

Proponents of placenta consumption claim it replenishes vital nutrients, such as iron, B vitamins, and hormones to improve symptoms of fatigue and postpartum depression in women. Other reported health benefits include improved mood, energy, and increased milk supply. In a survey of 189 women, 40% reported improved mood, 26% described increased energy and decreased fatigue, 15% believed they had improved lactation, and 7% reported decreased postpartum vaginal bleeding.

While more scientific research needs to be done to support these claims, evidence also suggests that the practice can pose serious health risks. By ingesting raw or improperly cooked/dried placental tissue, women can expose themselves to harmful toxins and increase their risk for infection. Since no state or federal regulations exist that address safety issues, placental tissue can become contaminated by unsafe handling. It can transmit diseases or dangerous pathogens, such as HIV or hepatitis virus.

Many women and their families are

unaware of the issues surrounding this practice. Given the rise of placenta consumption during the postpartum period, health care providers should be aware of the potential health benefits as well as the associated risks. They should also know how placentas are being prepared and consumed and understand how these options can affect women and their families.

"More research needs to be done to investigate the potential benefits and risks that may be associated with the practice of placentophagy," said AWHONN CEO, Lynn Erdman, MN, RN, FAAN. "Nurses are in an excellent position to better counsel women so they can make informed decisions about consuming placenta."

Q. I recently had an epiphany during my therapy session. Love without respect is worthless. Why did it take me two failed marriages and a series of dating to finally get it?

A. I think the fairy tale is more about falling in love. The movies are more about love. The commercials proclaim that "Love is in the air." Love is both wonderful and addicting.

But is it enough?

I think if love was enough the divorce rate would not be so high. There would be less couples in therapy. There might be less substance abuse and activity abuse. There might be less fighting.

Saying "I Love You" is easy. They can be the most beautiful words or the most damaging. The words by themselves with no respect attached are for the most part ...meaningless. It is sad that we have not made the connection sooner.

I have talked with many couples who are approaching divorce and still say they love each other. But they share MANY examples of disrespect. They love each other but do not like each other. When disrespect wipes out the relationship it takes a lot of work to repair it. Many of the resentments that develop are directly connected to lack of respect.

It is as if the two people "in love" become adversaries. If one of the partners does share that something is annoying and that person continues to do it .why wouldn't that person feel disrespected?

One good example is the following: Melanie and Rick shared in their counseling session that sex was rarely happening. Melanie stated she told Rick that she did not like him making advances while she was doing housework. She said if he would help get the chores completed then she would have sex. When they left therapy Rick said he would help out more and avoid his previous behaviors because he wanted physical intimacy with Melanie.

Two weeks later when they returned, Melanie shared that nothing had changed. Rick continued with his annoying behaviors and she did not want to have sex. Rick just shrugged his shoulders when asked why he disrespected his wife's request.

There has not been enough importance placed on respect. If there was more respect there would be less resentments. If Rick really cared about Melanie, then being attentive to what works for her would be more of a priority. We cannot meet every want and need of the person we love but I think we can tune in more to the necessity for respect.

### NICHE Publishes New Hospitals Reports

Reports identify positive healthcare outcomes and innovative initiatives related to older adult hospital readmissions and length of stay

NICHE (Nurses Improving Care Falls (N.Y.) Hospital - Readmission for Healthsystem Elders) announces the release of two NICHE Hospitals Reports that identify positive outcomes and innovative initiatives at NICHE designated healthcare organizations related to older adult readmissions and length of stay (LOS). The reports are part of a series published by NICHE that can be downloaded at: http://nicheprogram.org/ niche hospitals report series.

#### Readmissions Report

According to the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), a readmission is defined as an admission to a hospital within 30 days of a discharge from the same or another hospital. The Affordable Care Act added a section to the Social Security Act establishing the Hospital Readmissions Reduction Program that requires CMS to reduce payments to hospitals with excess readmissions. According to the CMS, 78% of hospitals are financially penalized for readmissions.

Hospitals and their initiative results related to readmissions included in the reporting are:

- Mercy Health Saint Mary's Hospital, Grand Rapids, Mich. - Surveys conducted by the hospital showed a 42% reduction in readmission rates of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease patients, a 16% reduction in readmission rates of pneumonia patients, and a 31% reduction in readmission rates of myocardial infarction patients.
- Palmetto Health, Columbia, S.C. - Readmissions went from a high of 24.9% in 2013 to 11.5% in 2015.
- John C. Lincoln North Mountain Hospital, Phoenix, Ariz. - Over a ten-month period, none of the 17 congestive heart failure patients transferred to participating skilled nursing facilities were readmitted to
- Bassett Healthcare Network, Little

rates declined from 11.3% to 3.44%.

• South County Hospital Healthcare System, Wakefield, R.I. - Readmission rates declined from 22% in 2013 to 13% in 2014.

#### Length of Stay Report

According to the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) Healthcare Cost And Utilization Project, in 2012 for adults over the age of 65 there were 12.7 million hospital stays in the United States, with an average LOS of 5.2 days. Length of stay reduction is a key driver for improvement. One of the intents of value-based purchasing is to reduce lengthy hospital stays.

Hospitals and their initiative results related to LOS included in the reporting are:

- Covenant Health, Chicago, Ill. - The hospital realized a 49.6% reduction in LOS.
- Carilion Roanoke (Va.) Memorial Hospital - Older adult patients had a shorter mean LOS (4.6 days compared to 5.3 days).
- ProMedica Toledo (Ohio) Hospital - This hospital reduced LOS from 5.54 to 3.94 days and saved \$600,000.
- Hunterdon Medical Center, Flemington, N.J. - This hospital realized a 17% decrease in LOS for intensive care unit patients with
- PinnacleHealth, Harrisburg, Pa.-LOS declined from 3.52 days to 2.75 days for older adult patients.

The initial report in the Hospitals Report series provides a summary of outcomes and initiatives from many care categories and healthcare settings. Earlier topical reports deal with delirium, dementia, function, operationalizing NICHE, safety, and transitions.

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
