The film is an important contribution to America's ongoing conversation about what it means to care.

The American Nurse follows the paths of five nurses in various practice specialties including Jason Short as he drives up a rugged creek to reach a home-bound cancer patient in Appalachia.

Tonia Faust runs a prison hospice program where inmates serving life sentences care for their fellow inmates as they're dying.

Naomi Cross coaches an ovarian cancer survivor through the Caesarean delivery of her son. Sister Stephen is a nun who runs a nursing home filled with goats, sheep, llamas and chickens, where the entire nursing staff comes together to sing for a dying resident.

And Brian McMillion, an Army veteran and former medic, rehabilitates wounded soldiers returning from war.

The American Nurse Project aims to elevate the voice of nurses in this country by capturing their personal stories through photography and film. In early 2012, photographer Carolyn Jones and her team began a journey across the United States, recording the unique experiences of nurses at work.

The photographs and narratives aim to inspire audiences to think about nurses in a way that they may never have before, with a newfound appreciation for this indispensable figure on the front lines of health and healthcare today: the American nurse.

Known internationally for her socially proactive medium-format photographic portraiture, Jones is also an award-winning filmmaker, having worked in a wide variety of film and video formats, primarily in documentary production.

Mercy Hospital Logan County is a small group of highly motivated people including Zen. She has been with Mercy since 2003 and is a 2005 nursing school graduate from the University of Central Oklahoma. She took a little time off from Mercy Hospital in Oklahoma City to go to graduate school in Texas to get a master's degree in counseling psychology. Just before she took her current job in March, she took a few months off to be a stay at home mom.

One month before she moved to Guthrie, her husband lost his job, and Zan wanted to go back to work anyway. Her position came open the same week and she fell in love with the idea of rural health care.

Her job provides her the opportunity to bring a lot of her varied skilled sets and education into one focus.

"I firmly believe primarily that I am here to serve the people who serve the patients," Zan said. Her psychology background, experience as a nurse on the floor and consulting in different roles provides Zan the opportunity to bring all of

her skill sets into one facility.

Mercy Hospital at Logan County is small enough that if nurses want to make a change, sometimes they make the change that day. They don't have to go through hundreds of layers of research and committees.

"We do our best practice research. We make the decision. We enact the decision," Zen said. "And everybody learns about it because it takes us two or three shifts to get the message out to everybody."

So there is a lot of power and flexibility among the nursing staff. Being a small group allows them to meet and take better care of one another, she continued.

Mercy Hospital Logan County is also the largest of Mercy's rural hospitals. It is also large enough that when a change is made, it makes a difference for the community, Zen said.

"In the last six months, we went to being the No. 1 in patient satisfaction scores in the Mercy ministry. Two quarters ago we were third in the ministry; both times ranking in the top 10 percentile," she said. "It's very encouraging."

The hospital is fully staffed. When Zen first arrived at the Guthrie

hospital, its census was down by eight nurses, two house supervisors and two nursing assistants. Zen said the environment Mercy is creating in Guthrie is a place where nurses want to be. It is also a place where their patients are telling them, they get highly personalized, individualized intimate care.

"That is a powerful thing," she said. "I love getting to be a part of that."

As a leader, Zan tries to talk to her staff everyday asking what they need to change for the betterment of patient care. She learns who needs to be recognized for exceptional work

"I try to make a presence to my day shift and my night shift," she said. "So I show up at their shift change. That's when I get here several days a week. I get here around 6:30 a.m. I firmly believe that the folks out their practicing are the experts in their practice. And if I am the person who serves the people who serves the people who serves the people, then I need to be listening to the experts and I need to take their word for it when they say something could be better, something could be fixed, or here's a new way to do something."

Mercy is also experimenting

to build a formal Shared Practice Council in a new way. They are building it in virtual space rather than in real space, she said. The advantage of virtual space is attendance, which is always difficult in a 24 hour facility.

"If you hold a meeting (in real space), you are by design neglecting somebody who is working that day who may want to be there," Zen said

Her hope is that she is creating a space where people believe in their own power.





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

Rudy Sparr, RN, BSN has worked with his hands most of his 59 years on this earth.

As he kid he worked in fast food and then went on to the lumber yard.

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

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OCU PA Program Gains Accreditation

Oklahoma City University's new Physician Assistant Program has taken an important step toward national certification from the Accreditation Review Commission on Education for the Physician Assistant, Inc. (ARC-PA).

The ARC-PA has granted Accreditation-Provisional status to the Oklahoma City University Physician Assistant Program sponsored by Oklahoma City University.

Accreditation-Provisional is an accreditation status granted when the plans and resource allocation, if fully implemented as planned, of a proposed program that has not yet enrolled students appear to demonstrate the program's ability to meet the ARC-PA Standards or when a program holding Accreditation-Provisional status appears to demonstrate continued progress in complying with the Standards as it prepares for the graduation of the first class (cohort) of students.

Accreditation-Provisional does not ensure any subsequent accreditation status. It is limited to no more than five years from matriculation of the first class.

"Achieving this status requires a review of hundreds of details about the program," said Dan McNeill, director of OCU's PA program. "Out of all of the details, the reviewers found no areas of noncompliance. This is a great way to start our exceptional program."

Oklahoma City University is only the third institution in the state to offer a PA program, joining OU Health Science Center programs in Oklahoma City and Tulsa. OCU's program will focus on educating physician assistants with a strong emphasis on providing primary care in community hospitals and clinics. Classes are scheduled to begin

in January, with an initial cohort of 36 students.

Effective therapy moves us away from these defense mechanisms and challenges us to get real with ourselves. The more vague we are about our behavior, the more disconnected we are from reality.


When Joe came to therapy to discuss his depression and marital conflicts, he mentioned in passing that he had an occasional beer. "Maybe just one or two, usually just on weekends, sometimes a shot or two of whiskey." As his sessions became more frequent he shared more about his "occasional drinking" and admitted that maybe he did have a problem. At this point it was suggested to Joe that he attend an alcohol treatment program and then continue to work on his other presenting symptoms.

Chris Anderson, MS, LMFT, a recovering gambler and alcoholic is a speaker who educates professionals on becoming more effective counselors especially in working with addicts. His goal of therapy is the following: "To help clients name the truth about themselves so that their own truth confronts their own lie ..to help clients live fully into the here and now reality of their lives, in order to live into a sense of vision that calls them forth."

OMRF team discovers cargo system that keeps brain cells on the right track

With the help of a simple little worm, an Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation scientist is unraveling the mysteries of a complex transportation system the brain uses to move the tiny cargoes that contribute to our can be regulated to allow the larger perceptions, thoughts and memories.

Brain cells, or neurons, have long tentacles called axons, through which they communicate with one another and with muscle cells. Some axons reach lengths as long as 3 feet in humans. To deal with these long distances, neurons have developed an amazing system of tiny "train tracks" and "engines" to quickly carry cargo long distances in both directions. The called "vesicles" that provide the signals for thoughts and memories, as well as larger sacs called "organelles" that help the neuron grow or repair an injury.

OMRF's Kenneth Miller, Ph.D., is seeking to understand how the cargo system is regulated to keep us thinking clearly, as well as how defects in the transport system contribute to neurological disorders.

Miller and his colleagues have discovered a new "conductor" that regulates the cargo movements in neurons. The conductor allows the tiny vesicle cargos that are important for our thoughts and memories to stay in axons where they are needed but sends the larger ones (organelles) back

to the cell body of the neuron so they won't clog up the axon or interfere with the signals that help us think

However, Miller said the system organelles to move into the axon when they are needed, for example, to help the neuron grow or recover from an injury.

Miller and his team made their discovery using C. elegans, a tiny roundworm with a simple nervous system. The new findings were published in back-to-back papers in the scientific journal Genetics.

"Neurons actively shuttle their cargoes consist of tiny membrane sacs cargo along tracks using motor proteins that essentially act as engines," said Miller. "The motors literally walk along these tracks, shouldering their cargo. We have found a neuron-specific transmission system for regulating the connection between one of these motors and its cargo."

> Neurons have several kinds of motors that can move cargo outward, but only one, known as dynein, can move cargo back into the cell body. Miller and colleagues discovered a new function in neurons, which they named the CSS system. The CSS system seems to act as part of dynein's transmission system, determining whether or not

the motor engages with cargo. Miller noted that a recent study found that as many as 14 neuronal diseases are connected to the dynein motor.

"We still don't understand the basis of a lot of neurological disorders, because we're still learning how nerve cells work," said Miller. "But this discovery gets us one step closer to revealing how the most complex cells in our bodies function at a molecular level. Once we understand how things are supposed to work at that level, we may be able to treat a person with a neurological disorder by targeting the malfunction with a drug or using new

methods of gene therapy."

"It's remarkable how studies of a tiny worm that has a very simple nervous system can be the key to unlocking a very complicated process that nerves use," said OMRF Vice President of Research Paul Kincade, Ph.D. "Every cell in the body has complex components, and in the case of neurons, it's important to sort what goes out and what comes back. Miller has used very elegant experimental approaches to identify one of the key players in this intricate process."

This research is funded by grant R01GM080765 from the National Institute of General Medical Sciences and the Oklahoma Center for the Advancement of Science and Technology grant HR14-003.

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
