# Mercy's New ER and Primary Care Clinic in Edmond Now Open




Mercy has again expanded services in Edmond with the addition of a new emergency department and primary care clinic. The new facility is now open just south of the original facility on Mercy's Edmond I-35 campus.

Mercy broke ground on the \$30 million, 49,000-square-foot building in January 2018. The facility is two levels. The first level ER is an extension of Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City's emergency department and features 11 exam rooms, ultrasound, imaging services, full laboratory services, an infectious disease isolation room and a generator that allows the facility to run on full power in the event of an outage.

Fifteen emergency medicine physicians, 20 nurses and several support staff will take shifts serving patients around-the-clock. Patient care will be streamlined thanks to the ER's modern design and dedicated, in-house lab and imaging services.

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in oncology. "I love my job here. I got into nursing because I like to help people; I like to get to know the patients and hear their story; after all, that's what it's all about! When the patient gets here, they tend to get overwhelmed due to fear. They feel like they are being pulled in many different directions and are scared of the unknown. I consider myself fortunate to be able to talk to the patients, make them feel at ease and help guide them through their time of need," she replied.

"Now as far as oncology goes, never in my wildest dreams did I think I would land in oncology but God had other plans for me. I always imaged that I would work in OBGYN, helping to deliver babies. I can tell you, I have never delivered a baby," she said with a laugh. "I felt like God led me to work in oncology and that is where I have worked for twenty-one years." she said. have worked with many of these co-workers for a long time. I like working for Mercy because they really care about their patients. The end goal is getting the patients the best care that can be given," Paige added.

Paige's favorite part of her job is when she helps guide the patient through the steps that take place after a suspicious lung module is found - from the beginning visit to the last. "We have had a few patients that were diagnosed with lung cancer after they had a CT lung screening scan and it is very rewarding to be able to guide them through the process. They want to know what the next steps are, who they will see next and where they will go from here. I feel fortunate that I help them through their journey. I end up building friendships because we become close during this process," Paige commented.

What is special about a LDCT, which is also called a CT Lung Screening? It is a fairly new test that has been approved for patients that have smoked cigarettes who are at high risk for developing lung cancer. "It is quick and painless and can detect lung cancer at an early stage. We are trying to educate patients about LDCT scans. Previously, we would find stage IV lung cancer when it was not curable but with a LDCT, we can find it at an earlier stage when it is curable. I love to hear success stories and I hope to hear that many more success stories and cure that many more patients."

When asking Paige what she wanted to be when she was a little girl, she replied, "When I was little, I wanted to be a nurse or a teacher. That was because of my grandmother. She had seven kids and she was always nurturing and caring for them and that really stood out to me. I remember thinking how I wanted to be a nurse someday, just like my After I became grandmother! a nurse, there were quite a few nurses that I looked up to and who helped me go even farther. I could ask them anything and they were always there for me, no matter what the situation was."

How would you describe yourself? "That is so hard to do," she said with a smile. "Well, people say that I am bubbly, compassionate and a good listener. I am very detail-oriented and I believe in doing everything to the best of my ability, going above and beyond. That is just the way I was brought up," she replied.

Paige's hobbies include gardening, decorating (especially for the Christmas season) and the all-time favorite, shopping!

Asking Paige to sum up her life in one word, she said, "It would be, BLESSED."

On the second floor, Mercy Clinic will have 16 primary care providers including family medicine and pediatrics.

Dr. Jesse Campbell serves as chief administrative officer for Mercy Clinic and has seen patients as a primary care physician at Edmond I-35 since the first building opened in 2014.

"We have had multiple patients come into our I-35 facility looking for an emergency room," said Dr. Campbell. "I can't tell you how many times we've had to call an ambulance to take those patients to an emergency department, ultimately delaying their care. Now, we'll be able to take those patients downstairs from the primary care clinic or across the parking lot from the specialty care clinic building for the appropriate, convenient care they need."

Through Mercy's comprehensive electronic health record, care team members at the new Mercy Edmond I-35 facility will have immediate access to patient records, electronically creating a seamless experience for current Mercy patients.

"Over the last two years, we know most Edmond residents have visited



a Mercy hospital or clinic," said Jim Gebhart, president of Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City and regional strategy officer. "By expanding our Edmond I-35 campus, we are now able to serve even more people and make a significant impact in our growing community."

The original Edmond I-35 facility features an outpatient surgery center, imaging, laboratory, specialty physician offices, a first-of-its-kind wellness center and Mercy Sports Performance powered by EXOS.

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## CAREERS IN NURSING END OF LIFE CARE: VALIR HOSPICE CARE

Hospice care: Care designed to give supportive care to people in the final phase of a terminal illness and focus on comfort and quality of life, rather than cure.

It takes special people to work for Hospice. One special person is Keisha Newson, RN working at Valir Hospice Care. Keisha is the Director of Clinical Operations. Growing up in Okemah, OK, Keisha attended school at Moore Norman Technology Center for her LPN and Platt College for her RN.

Keisha has been a nurse for fourteen years and has been with Valir for almost five years. "I love my job here," Keisha said. "Ever since I was in high school, I knew that I wanted to be a nurse. I have always liked helping people. Here at Valir, I am the one that assigns the nurses and aides where they need to go and when. I am in charge of the clinical and that means that there are about thirty to

thirty-five nurses and aides that I deal with. The others fifteen are non-clinical and our Vice President covers the social workers, chaplains and the volunteers," Keisha stated. "We have a satellite office in Kingfisher and between the two offices, we cover people in several counties; Enid, Watonga, Pauls Valley, Chickasha and even Wewoka. We stay pretty busy. Sometimes, a nurse will travel quite a way to see a patient; it could be a patient that needs to have someone there with them for four hours or it could be several days. I do the assessments on the patients to see if they qualify for Hospice. I'll admit that it takes a special kind of person to travel and care for terminally-ill patients."

Asking Keisha what her main focus is about her job, she replied, "We need to make sure the patient is as comfortable as possible, and talking with the family members when their loved one is close to

it is a hard time for anyone to go through. My first job as a nurse was working in a nursing home. I feel like I can handle the older patients and their families better "I feel than some," she said. like working with Hospice was my calling," Keisha added.

Asking Keisha to describe herself, she said, "I am definitely a straightforward person. I tell it like it is! I like being my own self and I always stand up for what is right. I feel like I am very dependable in everything. I do have another side to me, "she said. "I have a real passion and compassion when it comes to taking care of older people. I have a lot of respect for others. I guess you could say that is my softer side," she said with a smile. Keisha's motivation comes "They keep me from her family. going," she added.

What qualities do you think

passing is very important. I realize make a good nurse? "I think a nurse needs to have passion and compassion and really care about the patient. They need to be sympathetic and empathetic and be dependable. They also need to know that they are not just taking care of a patient; it is extended to the family of that patient. And above all, they need to feel that certain love that comes from the heart," Keisha replied.

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

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

Dunlap has established herself as a champion for early literacy, which led to the founding of the Reach Out and Read program at The Children's Hospital. For two generations, the program has promoted the benefits of early reading, not only in enhanced learning and academic performance, but the parent-child bonds that are built through reading together. Reach Out and Read partners with healthcare providers to offer free books to patients at their well-child visits with pediatricians. More than 85,000 books are distributed each

"Studies have discovered direct links between the parents who read aloud to their children and how those children achieve greater educational success," said Dunlap. "With the powerful influences in today's culture – social media and other screen-time activities – parents are challenged to carve out meaningful time with their kids. As healthcare providers, we care not only about physical health but also about the overall well-being of the child. As we interact with parents, we're coaching and advocating, too."

To bolster the Reach Out and Read program, The Children's Hospital providers and staff host an annual Green Eggs and Ham breakfast fundraiser. Funds are used to replenish the supply of books given away on a daily basis.

Having worked there once before, she knew what she would be coming back to when she accepted the position of Interim Department Head of Nursing and Allied Health.

"Redlands is very community and family oriented," she said. "Everybody looks out for everybody. It's a real strong network and very supportive."

Maybe that's why Redlands graduates are some of the most sought-after in Oklahoma.

Community support is huge in Canadian County for the school and vice versa.

The Canadian County Health Department has requested Redlands students work with their OB nurse practitioner. Students have adopted a mission in El Reno treating recently released inmates and recovering drug and alcohol addicts.

Students serve in the twicemonthly, bilingual health clinic.

Redlands admits students one time each year to the traditional day program.

LPN to RN admission occurs for a handful of individuals in the spring.

The program threads theory and simulation together to help build understanding of the specific content being taught. Simulations enhance student understanding, build confidence prior to clinical as to what to do, say, and provide appropriate interventions for patients.

Program Nursing Redlands graduated its first class in 1981. The program is a two-year nursing program with new classes beginning

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in the fall of every year.

Students graduate with an Associate in Applied Science Degree and upon graduation, are eligible to take the NCLEX exam to become a Registered Nurse. Redlands also offers options for LPNs attending the nursing program. LPNs who meet admission criteria are given credit for Fundamentals of Nursing.

Walking into a facility with her Redlands name badge on is always a treat for Abdul-Raheem.

"We have a very positive perception," Abdul-Raheem "(Employers) know community based. They have a lot of good things to say about our students and because we like to partner with others our name really gets out there."

A small faculty to student ratio allows Redlands instructors to team teach. "Students are able to get more one-on-one instruction and they're able to get more of a mentorship from faculty that they hang on to," she said.

With a small ratio of students per instructor, a simulation lab, great employment opportunities graduation and a live NCLEX review, Redlands has one of the best nursing programs in the area.

The Redlands Nursing Program is a two-year program, with new classes beginning each Fall. Patrick Cody, DO, created the event to fill the gap in continuing education opportunities for licensed paramedics. He also said it would be a great recruiting tool for EMSSTAT, the emergency services provider for the cities of Moore and Norman. Dr. Cody said the annual conference has been very well received.

"Probably the most rewarding feedback came from one of the ER nurses," Dr. Cody said. "After an EKG session, she said she had learned more about EKG in that 20-minute lecture than she had learned in nursing school. I took that as a nice compliment."



The conference gives attendees the chance to learn from the state's leaders in disaster medicine.

"This event helps us get the information the physicians want us to have and use it on patients for better outcomes when we get them to the hospital," said Steve McCune, EMSSTAT paramedic and Oklahoma City firefighter.

Participants attended sessions on several topics, including trauma, cardiology and tactical medicine which ended with an active shooter simulation.

"We learned how to quickly make a tourniquet and how to move patients from the hot zone into the warm zone then cool zone so that they can receive the care that they need," said Amber Sharp, OSU-OKC EMT student. "There was a lot of information that reiterated what I'd learned in class. I got a much better understanding of those concepts, and the exercise itself was actually a lot of fun."

This is the fourth year Norman Regional has hosted the Central Oklahoma EMS Conference.
