### **OMRF** receives \$3.7 million for autoimmune disease research



OMRF scientist Christopher Lessard, Ph.D.

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation \$3.7 million to continue research on Sjugren's syndrome, an autoimmune disease.

OMRF scientist Christopher Lessard, Ph.D., received a five-year grant to identify genes associated with the disease. The work will aid in the development of strategies to diagnose and treat the condition.

In Sjugren's, immune cells attack moistureproducing glands, causing painful dry eyes and mouth. It can result in irreversible tissue damage and complications like neurological problems, lung

disease, and cancer. There is no known cure for the condition, which disproportionately affects women and is estimated by the American College of Rheumatology to affect as many as 3.1 million people in the U.S.

"Current treatments for Sjugren's only address its symptoms, and just diagnosing the disease is notoriously difficult," said Lessard, who's been studying Sjugren's at OMRF since 2007. "It shares features with many autoimmune diseases. This can lead to misdiagnosis, which ultimately makes studying the disease challenging."

The grant will allow the researchers to collect and analyze more than 10,000 DNA samples donated by Sjugren's patients from around the world. The samples are available thanks to the OMRFled Sjugren's Genetics Network, or SGENE, an international network of 26 research groups dedicated to identifying the genes associated with the disease. "Thanks to these international efforts, we've pinpointed 20 genes associated with Sjцgren's in recent years. But we suspect there are many more. In contrast,

scientists have identified more than 150 genes associated with lupus, which is another related autoimmune disease," Lessard said.

At OMRF, researchers will use biopsy tissue samples to determine how genetic variations in Sjugren's might change the regulation of genes associated with the disease.

Lessard hopes to separate patients into sub-groups based on individual characteristics of their disease, develop better clinical tools to diagnose patients earlier, identify patients at high risk for cancer and other serious complications, and identify existing medicines to treat the condition by associating the disease to genes involved with other conditions.

"This ambitious work will result in the largest genetic study of Sjugren's to date," said Patrick Gaffney, M.D., head of OMRF's Genes and Human Disease Research Program. "By combining analyses of genetic factors, we should have a much clearer view of the underlying causes of this puzzling disease."

The work is funded by grant number R01AR073855 from the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal and Skin Diseases, a part of the NIH.

Trixie Davis, BSN, RN works in advanced endoscopy in the Integris Health System.

But you might also see her working at the zoo, painting houses for needy Oklahoma City residents, working a volunteer medical clinic or tidying up at a local elementary school.

That's because Davis is a member of the Integris CREW, the health system's employee volunteer corps.

Its mission is to improve the health of the people and communities the organization services through compassionate community outreach.

The CREW will provide an improved vehicle to tap into the vast employee resources needed for INTEGRIS Health's participation in community events and projects.

The ICrew is the next iteration of what used to be the Baptist Brigade, which was a popular volunteer group inside the health system many years ago.

"I'm a firm believer in being a volunteer and helping the community

out so I tried it a couple years ago and really liked it," Davis said. "I found it very satisfying."

That first outing for Davis was at the Oklahoma City Zoo. That day Integris volunteers helped prepare a zoo exhibit for new animals coming to OKC.

There was something about being around other Integris employees and uniting for a common cause outside of the hospital walls that really stuck with her.

Any Integris employee can become a member of the CREW. In fact, the hope is to have a huge response from staff members who have an interest in serving others in the community.

All that's asked for is a commitment to the mission, and participation in at least one community project each year.

Employees will have the opportunity to volunteer their time working on Integris community outreach/wellness programs, community development and

enhancement projects (OKC City Rescue Mission, United Way Day of Caring, Regional Food Bank, etc.) and other activities deemed appropriate in all Integris Health communities.

Last year, Independent Sector - a national organization focused on nonprofits and corporate giving programs, released its annual estimate of the value of volunteers.

Independent Sector announced that the latest value of a volunteer hour is \$25.43 – up 3% from the previous year. That figure, estimated from data collected in 2018, shows the incredible contributions volunteers make to their communities and our country.

Currently, about 63 million Americans volunteer about 8 billion hours of their time, talent, and effort to improve and strengthen



their communities.

volunteer at the Harrah Senior Citizens Center, answers phone calls while the kitchen full of fellow RSVP of Central Oklahoma volunteers moves in a swift, almost rhythmic, motion.

Since the pandemic, the Center's volunteers, all seniors themselves, and four staff members have not skipped a beat. When COVID-19 hit, the Center closed for gatherings, but the small but mighty team shifted into high gear, meeting a big need in their community for seniors now stuck at home-meals.

"We went from serving 60 meals a day before COVID to

### Innovation continues at Northwestern

When Shelly Wells PhD, MBA, APRN-CNS, ANEF began developing Northwestern Oklahoma State University's DNP program, she would talk extensively about it with her BSN students.

The division chair and professor would be bringing something new to the school and the surrounding communities.

And for student Christina Erford, BSN, RN, NPD-BC, she wanted to be part of that first class.

Already sold on the program, she carried out her due diligence.

"When I started looking into programs and comparing it you couldn't beat the cost point for a doctorate and you can't beat the staff," Erford said. "The faculty is amazing."

Her ninth and final semester will end this spring. Outside of 192 clinical hours per semester, Erford will have completed the majority of the program online.

She also completed a week-long session in the summer where students check in on a Sunday and spend the week in immersive learning until Friday afternoon

When Erford graduates this May she wants to find either a clinic or urgent care to begin her career.

A Nightingale Award of Nursing Excellence recipient from the Oklahoma Nurses Association, Wells takes pride in her low faculty-to-student ratio and the relationships her faculty has forged at healthcare facilities across northwestern Oklahoma. Allowing students to learn in their communities creates a natural draw for students. The NWOSU Charles Morton Share Trust Nursing program is among the top in the state in national RN licensing examination (NCLEX) pass rates

This year will mark the inaugural graduating class for the BSN-DNP program.

"They're all educated as family nurse practitioners with an emphasis on the

needs of a rural healthcare community," Wells said. "It will be a fairly good sized class - more than we ever anticipated when we first put this together."

Planning for the program incorporated a focus on creating health care for surrounding communities.

"Our focus was to increase primary care access to rural Oklahoma because rural Oklahoma is in such dire straits when it comes to health care providers," Wells said.

There's little doubt the Alva university is educating nurses to provide healthcare to rural Oklahomans for generations to come.

"They are going to be prepared to walk into a primary care clinic or office and care for patients across the life span," Wells said. "They will have leadership skills that excel many peers - I've been told that by preceptors."

With more than 30 years of teaching experience in nursing, Wells has closely followed the national trend calling for more BSN-prepared nurses.

The attraction of Northwestern has

always been a quality, affordable program with the flexibility of offerings.

The RN to BSN completion program is offered online with no campus requirement. With no traditional clinical hours the program can be completed in 12 months.

"It works well for the working nurse," Wells said.

The traditional BSN program is delivered at four different sites in Northwestern Oklahoma with full-time faculty at each site.

Small class sizes and a low facultyto-student ratio is also a draw. Eighty percent of faculty are doctorally-prepared, a rarity in a rural state.

"We're a busy, dynamic little place up in northwestern Oklahoma," Wells laughed.

For the next step, Wells is helping Northwestern work towards an acute care practitioner certificate.

"That will help round out the health care provider needs for rural Oklahoma," she said. Visit www.nwosu.edu/school-ofprofessional-studies/nursing



to do EVERYTHING and to become a donor and save lives.

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

we would have lost some of our seniors."

Shirley McKinney has volunteered with the Center for 25 years. In fact, she says, she started volunteering before she was even a senior herself. She has done a little bit of everything over the years

for a few weeks. Volunteers make phone calls to check in with the homebound seniors. Some of the programs have recently opened back up—medical appointments and shopping trips, and patio bingo just started. Reynolds hopes that the Center will be completely reopened by early November.

"It is a very important social connection for our seniors," said Reynolds. "If we weren't here during this time, I'm concerned

from serving on the board and filling out daily Nutrition Program reports to preparing meals, selling dinner and auction tickets.

"Being here for me and for a lot of the seniors is like having another family," she said. "It helps people to have a place to go to and get out among people. That's why it's been so important to stay connected with our seniors during COVID. The Center helps people to not be so lonely."
