Mental Health Nurse Practitioner as the COVID-19 pandemic inflicts the nation and challenges the nursing industry.

"As much as we can — we will help fill a need to take care of people," Livingston explained.

OCU Kramer School of Nursing began formulating the program two years ago. The psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner track admitted a cohort of six students in the fall of 2020. Eight post-masters students will be admitted in the summer of this year. Students have welcomed the psychiatric track, Livingston said.

Five OCU Kramer School of Nursing students have switched from the family nurse practitioner track to the psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner track.

"They understand there is a niche for psychiatric mental health nurse practitioners," she said.

Livingston has always been interested in mental health issues and psychiatric nursing. The university has been supportive of accomplishments.

Coronavirus is taking a toll on the mental health of Oklahomans. Many

people have lost incomes, and have adjusted to social distancing, sometimes at the cost of participating in their usual family and friend gatherings. And political turmoil is stirring uncertainty within the United States.

These effects of traumatic events over the last year have caused a plethora of issues, some long-term challenges needing to be addressed.

Nurse practitioners take a holistic approach in responding to mind, body, and spirit.

"The advanced practice faculty at OCU Kramer School of Nursing are excellent to work with and truly care about our students," Livingston said. "Our mantra is that we are invested in our students' success. Our team works very hard to ensure we are helping students learn to be the best advanced practice nurses they can be. We are teaching in the classroom - masked and socially distanced - with increased disinfecting measures."

Livingston said COVID has increased the difficulty of obtaining preceptorships for students. However, some great community partners who have come through for the majority of students.

The advanced practice nursing programs (BSN-DNP: Bachelor of Science in Nursing to Doctor

Nursing Practice) began in 2011 with role in health care, there remains some a family nurse practitioner track, Livingston said.

OCU Kramer School of Nursing has since expanded to include the adult gerontology acute care nurse practitioner (AGACNP) and psychiatric mental health nurse practitioner tracks (PMHNP). Kramer also offers postmaster certificates for each specialty track for nurses already certified in another specialty.

OCU Kramer School of Nursing offers DNP completion for nurses with master of science in nursing degrees who would like to earn a terminal degree.

Livingston admires students who pursue any type of continuing education, particularly a four-year BSN to DNP program, she said.

The PMHNP serves patients across their life span. The PMHNP is prepared in pediatrics, adolescent, and adult psychiatric health. They can work with elders and be part of a health care teams within in-patient settings, Livingston said. The PMHNP can also do out-patient mental health and are educated to provide different types of psychotherapy. Some PMHNPs provide therapy in their own independent practice. Although society is gaining an understanding of the nurse practitioner's

misconceptions about their role.

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OCU nursing dean appointed dean emeritus

Oklahoma City University announced today that it will honor Dr. Lois Salmeron with appointment as dean emeritus of the Kramer School of Nursing, effective July 1. She has served since 2014 as dean of the school after joining the faculty in 2005. As dean emeritus and professor of nursing, Salmeron will continue to serve as a member of the faculty and will represent both the university and the Kramer School of Nursing.

"More than any person I've met, Dr. Salmeron embodies the Kramer Way - the core values of caring, kindness, and respect," said OCU President Martha Burger. "Her impact on our nursing program is immense, and equally strong is the impact she's had in nursing education in our community and state. Her leadership has increased access to quality nursing programs across Oklahoma."

faculty group that designed and developed the university's original doctoral nursing programs. The PhD in nursing was the first doctoral program on the OCU campus. The Doctor of Nursing Practice program at OCU was the first of its kind in Oklahoma.

Salmeron was instrumental in pioneering a partnership between OCU and Duncan Regional Hospital. With this partnership, OCU implemented an additional location to offer traditional BSN courses in a rural community. More recently, she has supported the development of Community Based Public Health education tracks in the MSN and DNP programs.

During her 58-year nursing career, Salmeron has received numerous awards and honors, including being inducted into the Oklahoma Higher Education Hall of Fame - one of only two

Salmeron was part of the OCU nurses to receive this high honor. The Hall of Fame recognized her achievement of creating the first distance education nursing program in Oklahoma, which was instrumental in supplying registered nurses to the state's rural population. Additionally, she was named Nurse of the Year by the Oklahoma State Nurses Association as well as the Nurses' Association of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (NAACOG). She received the Distinguished Professional Service Award from the Association of Women's Health. Obstetric and Neonatal Nurses (AWHONN). Salmeron was also named a National League of Nursing Fellow of the Academy of Nursing Education.

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

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OMRF seeks volunteers for anti-aging study

The Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation is recruiting healthy volunteers to study whether a diabetes drug can slow aging.

OMRF scientist Benjamin Miller, is investigating how Ph.D., impacts metformin insulin sensitivity and its link to the biological processes of aging. The 12-week study will take place at the Harold Hamm Diabetes Center in Oklahoma City and is open to adults between the ages of 40-75 without chronic disease.

"Aging is the leading risk factor for all chronic diseases. If we can slow the process, we may simultaneously slow or prevent the onset of conditions like cancer, cardiovascular disease, Alzheimer's and dementia," said Miller, a physiologist in OMRF's Aging and Metabolism Research Program.

Metformin is the world's most prescribed diabetes drug and is believed to be effective at slowing aging. In a 2019 study, Miller found the drug to be less impactful for this purpose when combined with exercise in sedentary adults. By understanding how metformin impacts the cellular function of healthy volunteers in the absence of exercise, Miller hopes to further show who it can - and cannot -

Volunteers will undergo a health screening prior to enrollment. Those with known heart disease, diabetes, bleeding disorders, cancer or other major illnesses do not qualify for the study. Strict Covid-19 protocols will be followed to ensure participant safety.

Once admitted, visits may range from 10 minutes to five hours and will include blood draws, muscle biopsy, a bone density scan and an insulin sensitivity test. Participants will be compensated for time and

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Reaching out and touching lives

Resident benefit from pen pal program

A tremendous response began last fall when Kellie Prather called for pen pals for the residents of Brookwood Skilled Nursing & Therapy on Facebook. Compassion took the form of an overwhelming bevy of letters and cards that continues being sent to residents.

Everyone has returned to the lost art of writing, Prather said. A whole new door opened both for the residents and the pen pals themselves.

"I didn't realize it was going to go viral," said Prather, the activities director for Brookwood Skilled Nursing & Therapy in Oklahoma City. "It went viral — it went all across the United States. It was crazy. I'm telling you, we heard from people all over Oklahoma from towns I had no idea existed."

Letters came from New York, Illinois, Alabama, Kentucky, Arizona, and Arkansas. At one point 300 letters streamed to the residents all at once. Since the end of September, residents posted cards behind their beds and doors in appreciation. One resident has 50 cards from people writing they want to be a pen pal. The nursing staff is amazed at the difference made in the residents' lives and take part in helping elders decorate their rooms with cards. Staff and residents spend time talking about the pen pals. Nurses and CNAs read the letters and cards to residents who are challenged with their vision.

"I've got a pen pal team that's called the Pen Pal Club," said Prather, who has served at Brookwood since March and has been with the parent company Grace Living Centers for 12 years.

Residents involved in the pen pal program respond to the letters. Prather said she has never seen such a transformation in the residents who had been mulling

over days of depression and routines. Letters come in for the bedridden residents as well. And Prather and her assistants write letter on behalf of those residents who are unable to do so.

"There's just been such a glow," she said of the letters from school children, high schoolers, college students, and others who write. Children are given a chance to learn how to write a letter and hear the experiences from elders.

Another program, this time with Zoom is being initiated.

"It's awesome. They have so much purpose now. My activity room is almost like a mailroom where there's a working station, a station where letters need to be mailed off, letters that need to be answered," Prather said.

It's heard repeatedly that America is divided over politics, but the pen pal program at Brookwood spells unity among people with different backgrounds with the common concern for the welfare of humanity.

"Isn't it beautiful?" Prather said. "It makes me happy to know that we're still together. When we get knocked down, we still help each other get back up. And it also makes me really happy that we're reaching out for our elderly, because they get to be the forgotten society too often."

Housewives and husbands have been sending not only photographs of themselves, but photographs of their dogs and the splendor of nature throughout the year.

"Everything is so beautiful, and it makes me so proud to be an American. It makes me so happy to know with all the muddy waters of political life, that we're able to still pay it forward - our kindness to others."

Residents who have been in lockdown without the ability to see family members or loved ones

have their lives touched by strangers who become pen pal friends with many pointes of discussion to stimulate the day with positive messages, Prather said.

"It makes them feel alive; it makes them feel they have a purpose and makes them feel like they're loved. And it makes them feel like they can extend themselves out to somebody else as well. So, it's a win, win, win situation."

The backdrop of Brookwood encompasses Bridges Health, a separate wing for skilled nursing and rehabilitation. Residents are able to focus on their rehab in an encouraging setting.

"We've got some excellent nurses in there, case managers and the therapy department is just wonderful," Prather said. "And

during the COVID-19 pandemic everybody works hard around the clock to make sure these residents are getting the skill nursing they need."
