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

He encouraged graduates to love their neighbors.

"Continue to love our God and love our neighbor. It's going to stretch you, it's going to challenge you, but the closer you stick to our Lord Jesus, the greater your love for your neighbor will be. Don't give up, don't give in. Stay close to Christ and pour out the love that He has given you."

Dr. Nichole Jackson, simulation director and assistant professor of nursing, delivered the address to graduates focusing on certainty versus uncertainty.

"It seems in times of change, our instinct is to shift our focus from what we know, what we are confident in, to what we don't know," she said. "In doing this, all the things we are uncertain of become magnified while all of the things that we know to be true seem to be almost invisible. Whether you're in a patient's room trying to figure out what's wrong, that you can't quite put your finger on, or you are

facing the unknown in life's current circumstances, we have to intentionally shift our focus back to where it belongs, which is back to things we can be certain of even in times of uncertainty."

**Jackson** encouraged students to make an impact as they enter their nursing careers.

"I don't know what comes next, or all the details of your lives from this point forward, but I do know that you are the change that I want to see in the world," she said.

Next, Megan Smith, assistant professor of nursing, discussed the significance of the ceremony, how it is a celebration of the transition from the student role to the professional role.

# Standing in the Gap

# Northwestern forging tomorrow's nurses

Nursing has always been a profession that has stood in the gap, taking care of those who need it the most.

So when the Covid pandemic came, leaders at Northwestern Oklahoma State knew their students needed their education now more than ever.

"One of the things we've been able to do since the pandemic is we're continuing to forge ahead and maintain face-to-face classes and clinicals," said Shelly Wells, PhD, MBA, APRN-CNS, ANEF, Division of Nursing Chair & Professor. "That's in all three of our programs."

Tight-knit clinical partner relationships coupled with one of the state's lowest student-to-faculty ratios kept Northwestern students in the classroom and at the bedside during a once-in-a-lifetime event.

Long-known as one the most affordable nursing programs in the state, Northwestern features nationally-award-winning faculty and small class sizes.

It's no wonder there's such high interest in the school's three different options.

The traditional BSN program is offered at four different sites including Alva, Enid, Woodward and University Center in Ponca City.

The online RN to BSN program offers a 12-month cycle with no clinical hours and a liberal course transfer policy. It was rated the #1 RN-to-BSN program in Oklahoma in 2020 by www.intelligent.com.

The hybrid BSN to DNP program has also taken off. "There's been a lot of demand for both online and hybrid," Wells said. "We are one of only two public universities that offer a family nurse practitioner emphasis and we are the only program in the state that has an emphasis on rural nursing and the needs of rural communities."

The decision to stay in class and the hospital came with much planning and cooperation.

A Nightingale Award of Nursing Excellence

recipient from the Oklahoma Nurses Association, Wells takes pride in her low faculty-to-student ratio and the relationships her faculty has forged at healthcare facilities across northwestern Oklahoma.

Allowing students to learn in their communities creates a natural draw.

"Part of it is because we are offered at four different sites so we have limited numbers at each site," Wells explained. "We're able to maintain that social distancing in the classroom. Part of it is the partnerships we've established with our clinical agencies."

This spring some of those clinical agencies are supporting paid internships for senior nursing students.

"The hospitals are paying these students to do their clinical hours," Wells said.

The BSN programs are accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing, Inc. (ACEN) and is approved by the Oklahoma Board of Nursing (OBN). The BSN-to-DNP program is accredited by the Commission for Collegiate Education in Nursing (CCNE) and approved by the Oklahoma Board of Nursing.

With more than 30 years of teaching experience in nursing, Wells has closely followed the national trend calling for more BSN-prepared nurses.

"All the hospitals we have talked to in Oklahoma prefer to hire BSN-prepared nurses and they are encouraging their staff to go back and complete their BSN," Wells said. "We're seeing those numbers increase."

# Oklahoma Woman Returns to Pickleball Court Four Days After Stroke

Joyce Sterling and her husband had just finished a round of pickleball and were beginning another game when she started to feel a strange sensation.

"My left leg gave way," said Joyce Sterling, an active 66-year-old retiree. "It felt like a noodle. I couldn't make it do what I wanted it to do and then my left arm started tingling."

Sterling was having a stroke but her urgency to get medical help had her back on the pickleball court just four days later. While the tingling feeling lasted a short while, then subsided, Sterling told her husband she didn't feel comfortable playing another game, and they decided to leave.

On the walk back to their truck, her symptoms returned and went away again. They drove to the closest emergency department at Mercy Edmond I-35. She walked in without issue, told the front desk about her symptoms and was immediately taken back for care. As she climbed on to the stretcher, the sensation returned.

The ER staff immediately called the stroke team at Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City, an Advanced Comprehensive Stroke Center certified by The Joint Commission. This special designation

means the hospital has the most advanced imaging capabilities, 24/7 availability of specialized treatments and staff with the unique education and competencies to care for complex stroke patients.

Sterling was taken by ambulance

to the Oklahoma City hospital. Mercy neuro hospitalist, Dr. Jeff Craig, and the stroke team were waiting when she arrived.

"As soon as I got to the hospital,

the attacks came again in waves," Sterling said.

Dr. Craig ordered a CT scan of Sterling's brain and determined she was having an ischemic stroke, which happens when a blood clot or obstruction blocks the supply of blood going to a part of the brain. The majority of strokes are ischemic and can lead to death or result in permanent brain damage or disability.

Sterling was a candidate for tPA, or tissue plasminogen activator, the gold standard treatment for ischemic strokes.

"tPA is a powerful blood thinner that is our primary treatment for these types of strokes," Dr. Craig said. "If you get to the hospital in time, we can give you medication to help bust up the clot and restore blood flow to that part of your brain."

The treatment has to be given

within three to four hours of having a stroke, making it critical to seek treatment right away. After receiving the medication, Sterling's symptoms were gone. She was transferred to the neuro intensive care unit and closely monitored for 24 hours.

Two days after her stroke, Sterling was released from the hospital with no side effects. She made a full recovery and by Wednesday, she was back to playing pickleball. Sterling credits the stroke team at Mercy with saving her life, but it was her knowledge about the signs and symptoms that got her the care she needed quickly, and allowed her to return to a normal life.

"I am so very fortunate," Sterling said. "Too many people wait to get medical care and you just can't think like that. You need to get care as fast as possible."

# **BEFAST!!** for Stroke

Up to 80 percent of strokes are preventable and it's the thing most likely to disable you and make you dependent on your family for your needs. A stroke, or brain attack, happens when blood flow to your brain is stopped. It is a medical emergency. Call 911 if you think you might be having a stroke or stroke symptoms. Anyone can have a stroke at any age. Your chance of having a stroke increases if you have certain risk factors. Some risk factors for stroke can be changed or managed, while others can't.

Risk factors for stroke that can be changed, treated or medically managed: \*High blood pressure \*Heart disease \*Atrial fibrillation-irregular heartbeat \*Diabetes \*Smoking \*Birth control pills (oral contraceptives) \*History of transient ischemic attacks (TIA) \*High blood cholesterol and lipids \*Lack of exercise \*Obesity \*Excessive alcohol use \*Illegal drugs Risk factors for stroke that can't be changed: \*Older age-for each decade of life after age 55, your chance of having a stroke more than doubles. \*Race-African Americans have a much higher risk for death and disability from a stroke than Caucasians. \*Gender-Stroke occurs more often in men, but more women than men die from stroke. \*History of prior stroke. \*Heredity or genetics.

#### **BEFAST!**

The acronym B-E-F-A-S-T( B=Balance: E=Eyes, check for vision loss, F=Facial Droop, A=Arm weakness or drift; S=Slurred Speech; T=Time to call 911) is a simple tool to educate everyone about the most common warning signs and symptoms of a stroke, and to call 911 instantly if they even have a suspicion that a possible stroke has occurred. NO aspirin, water, food, NOTHING IN MOUTH. Teaching your children or loved ones BEFAST could save your life.
