

Every day there is someone who has it in their heart to care for people helping clients of Excell Private Care Services, said Crystal Warner, CEO.

Excell Private Care Services is a home care agency providing private duty, Veterans Administration Services, Medicaid а Advantage program, and case management for the state.



Certified nurse aides can provide 24-hour in-home care with bathing, cooking, cleaning, companion care, emptying a foley bag, meal prep, medication reminders, and shopping.

"We have RNs on staff. So, they would come in and do an assessment, and then we would find an aide that would work well with the family," Warner said. "We don't require a referral from a doctor. It's just anybody who would need in-home care."

Excell Private Care Services partners with home health and hospice services to help with skilled needs for an hour or two.

"Then they're gone. They're there to see them for that skilled need for a certain amount of time. Because our aides can be there for however long the family wants us there, having an aide there - they are less likely to return to the emergency room. They have someone to call. We have nurses on call 24 hours a day," Warner said.

The CNAs may stay with the patient for up to 24 hours. Private care aides only clean the house but can be prepared by a CNA to go to CNA school to earn their CAN license. There are also educational opportunities for LPNs to advance within the company.

Compassion is an indispensable element for the staff. Screening includes several different background checks to make sure the aide can provide a safe environment and has not committed a crime, Warner said.

Traditional BSN Program

"We go through CPR training, lifesaver courses," she added.

Family members can rest assured their loved on has a CNA or caregiver in the home with them if an emergency happens.

Sometimes a client does not need to go to an emergency room. It may be that they are scared during a storm or feel lonely. They may need to have somebody to ask questions to.

Having another set of eyes also helps hospitals that depend on Medicare to avoid unnecessary emergency room visits.

"We will also partner with communities and sit with the patient and do companion care," Warner continued.

Many health care providers were short on staff during the COVID pandemic. Family members knowing their loved one was at risk of a fall were thankful to have a CNA sit with their aging parent.

A lot of long-term health policies will pay for Excell Private Care Services, including VA insurance and Medicaid.

"If you have insurance that says it will pay for the service, it will take care of everything," Warner said.

The feedback that Excell Private Care Services has received has been exceptional. A recent family member wrote how much the family loves the CNA being so compatible and friendly.

"We love the conversation that we've had. 'She's helped us a lot with the house," Warner paraphrased a family member. "It's always nice for us to hear that because until we call around to do our checks and ask if they like the aide, we may not hear. So, it's nice when someone reaches out and lets us know."

Patients and family members understand they can call Excell Private Care Services whenever they need a resource as simple as providing a wheelchair.

They can call Warner seven days a week at any hour of the day or night, she said. Warner has gone to be with families until an ambulance has arrived at a client's home.

The company provides services throughout the Oklahoma City metro and also has an office in Tulsa. The staff also travels to Duncan and Lawton. There are not too many counties that Excell Private Care Services does not reach, except in the panhandle and the far southeast corner of the state.

"We're going to be opening a new satellite in Chickasha," Warner said.

The need for services is growing in demand as the population of older Americans continues to grow.

Many elders have no clue that they would be able to receive such a service.

"We'll help them go through the process even if they don't choose our company and they choose someone else," she said. "We'll help them get signed up so they will have somebody come to their house under the Medicaid program."

Being able to bridge a gap by providing community services is personally enriching for Warner.

"It's being able to help the people that need the help, and also help the families get through a tough time," Warner said. "Allowing a mom to still live in her home independently, allowing a daughter to be a daughter and not a caregiver, or a son being able to be a son and not a caregiver — it's being able to help those families." 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
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Collaboration Leads to High-Tech Surgical Visualization Device at OU Health

A conversation that began at the launch party for the Oklahoma City Innovation District led to a novel collaboration between the OU Health Sciences Center and energy technology company Baker Hughes. The result, an advanced surgical visualization device now being used in craniofacial reconstruction surgeries, embodies the purpose of the district -- to convene people from Oklahoma's diverse sectors to share their expertise and, together, create something new.

Representatives from Baker Hughes and the OU Health Sciences Center started talking that day in 2018 and soon began collaborating on a prototype device. The work leveraged augmented reality/mixed reality technology that Baker Hughes developed to create 3D reconstructions of rock specimens from computed tomography (CT) scans. Such visualization is highly valuable to geologists and oil and gas companies as they determine where to drill oil wells. That capability caught the attention of OU Health plastic and reconstructive surgeon Christian El Amm, M.D., who envisioned a headset/visor that he could wear during surgery that would allow him to both see his patient as well as 3D data that was superimposed on the patient, such as CT scans and reconstruction steps he prepared for the procedure.

"Our device represents the value of collaborative spaces - these types of innovations can only happen when you have an open forum where you can discuss and collaborate," El Amm said. "Developing a device like this requires engineering skills, computer technology skills, and a profound knowledge of what you're doing surgically."

The Innovation District encompasses about 1.3 square miles just east of downtown Oklahoma City and includes the OU Health Sciences Center campus, the city's biosciences sector and many other diverse companies. Katy Boren, CEO and President of the Innovation District, said the collaboration between the OU Health Sciences Center and Baker Hughes exemplifies the mission of the district.

"We convene and introduce people across industries who normally would not know each other, and we provide them an opportunity to advance their discussions," she said. "From those conversations, new inventions are created, new companies are started, new patents are earned, and it grows jobs and our economy. That's what we do every day - create interactions that allow innovations to spark and grow."

The Baker Hughes/OU Health Sciences Center collaboration has indeed flourished. Baker Hughes had advanced the technology to achieve mixed reality, which allows the person wearing the headset to see what is around him, as well as 3D images that appear as if they were part of real life. The technology became a virtual field visit for the oil and gas industry, providing extensive information about rock, like how porous it was.

"There were obvious analogies to the healthcare sector," said Jeff Potts, Advanced Analytics Leader for Baker Hughes. "We talked at length with Dr. El Amm and others from the OU Health Sciences Center and began a collaboration agreement. There were several key challenges that we needed to solve to move forward with a prototype that could be used in a surgical setting."

During the year-long collaboration, the team created solutions for those challenges which, until that time, were unsolved. Using artificial intelligence techniques, they "taught" the device how to recognize features of a human face, which was necessary to be able to superimpose 3D models on the patient in real time. The team also enhanced the accuracy of that process in order to meet the precision needed for surgery, and they enabled the device to track the surgeon's instruments in real time.

Since the official collaboration ended, El Amm has continued to develop the device, with significant input from Mohammad Abdul Mukit, Ph.D., a graduate fellow in electrical and computer engineering on the OU-Tulsa campus. Notably, they have programmed the device to respond to voice commands. That allows the surgeon to keep his focus on the patient rather than turning away to look at a computer screen or required an 18-step reconstruction of clicking a mouse. They also developed "markerless tracking," which allows the CT scan or other images to bones. "Each one of those bones be superimposed using artificial needed to be cut and moved in

markers to guide the way. El Amm compares the headset to what a fighter pilot wears - both need ready access to a lot of complex information, especially if they must make a splitsecond decision.

El Amm has begun using the device during surgical cases to enhance the safety and efficiency of complex reconstructions. Many of his patients come to him for craniofacial reconstruction after a traumatic injury; others have congenital deformities. Thus far, he has used the device for several cases, including surgery on a patient who was born without a right ear. The system took a mirror image of the patient's left ear, then the device overlaid it on the right side, allowing El Amm to precisely attach a reconstructed ear. In the past, he would cut a template of the ear and aim for precision using the naked eye.

In another surgical case, which the face, the device overlaid the patient's CT scan on top of his real

intelligence instead of cumbersome a precise direction," he said. "The device allowed us to see the bones individually, then it displayed each of the cuts and each of the movements, which allowed the surgeon to verify that he had gone through all those steps. It's basically walking through the steps of surgery in virtual reality."

The OU Office of Technology Commercialization is pursuing intellectual property protection for the invention. In addition, El Amm has begun partnering with his colleagues in neurosurgery, orthopedic surgery and OB-GYN to develop further applications. The future is promising for a groundbreaking device that was launched from a conversation and a desire to collaborate.

"This was a highly complex and challenging project, which made it exciting for everyone involved," Potts said. "We solved technical problems that no one else has, and we've done it right here in Oklahoma City. Our partnership was mutually beneficial, and it was only possible because the Innovation District provided the forum where we could discuss and collaborate."



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Coping with re-entry anxiety

As summer approaches, the M.D. But don't bet on anxiety U.S. is returning to something that looks like normal.

But after more than a year of masks, physical distancing and staying home, more than half of U.S. adults have experienced about returning anxiety to in-person interactions, according to the American Psychological Association.

Experts at the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation have tips for those feeling uneasy about returning to a world without pandemic precautions.

Start small

If the thought of being in a busy store or with a large group of people makes your stomach churn, start slowly, said OMRF physician-scientist Hal Scofield,

completely disappearing on its own.

"Find small ways to increase the time you spend around people and build up gradually," said Scofield. "A little discomfort can be a good thing. You'll slowly train yourself to relax in larger social situations over time."

But, added Scofield, if anxiety persists, speak to your doctor.

Unmasking not required

"If you're fully vaccinated and are not immunocompromised, masks are not necessary," said OMRF immunologist Eliza Chakravarty, M.D.

Any of the Covid-19 vaccines approved for use in the U.S. offers robust protection from severe illness or death. But after a

year of masks, says Chakravarty, there's no harm in continuing to wear one. And they could protect against other respiratory viruses.

"Masks work. If you aren't ready to go without in every situation, continue to wear one. They may come back into fashion in the winter if influenza returns to pre-Covid levels, so you'll be ahead of the game," she said.

Focus on full-body wellness In addition to high levels of anxiety, the APA study found since the start of the pandemic, 61% of American adults experienced unwanted weight change, 35% are sleeping less than they would like, and 23% coped with stress by drinking more alcohol. "Many

people managed the stress of the

last year in ways that can leave a lasting impact if they're allowed to persist," said Scofield.

Chakravarty agreed, adding that for those who became more sedentary or relied heavily on processed foods and takeout over the last year, a pivot in both areas can make an impact on anxiety.

To get moving, start with low-impact exercises like walking or yoga. And in the kitchen, fill your plate with vegetables, fruits and whole grains.

"When you take care of your body, you're taking care of your mind," Chakravarty said. "Your physical wellness should not be overlooked when trying to reduce overall anxiety about re-entry."

serious accident, a terrorist act, war/ combat, rape or other violent personal assault."

It's been difficult and demanding but they were so busy they were able to suppress and push through."

She adds, "Now that things are starting to relax, many caregivers are finally able to release what they have kept bottled up inside. This can be therapeutic but also unsettling."


