
Christy Olson, RD, LD, CDE, MS has been involved in the planning of the annual Harold Hamm Diabetes Care Summit for more than a decade now.

helps her to take pride in her work knowing families can take comfort in knowing their loved one is safe and secure when living at home is no longer the best option in care.

Roney began her career as a licensed practical nurse after graduating from the Western Technology Center in Burns Flat. She later graduated from Oklahoma City Community College with a nursing degree. She started in home health and progressed into wound care. Her RN license brought her to a totally skilled facility. She worked at a hospital but wanted to get to know her patients better so she ventured into a skilled rehab facility where she could see patients improve with smiles on their faces when returning home.

Teamwork is a story of success at St. Ann's Skilled Nursing & Therapy. She accepted her new career challenge at St. Ann's in January of 2020. A lot of the staff were new last year when the COVID pandemic emerged throughout Oklahoma. Roney is grateful to work where nurses radiate a caring spirit about the residents.

How St. Ann's nursing staff responded to the pandemic touched Roney's heart with grace. Families have been very supportive throughout all of life's challenges. They are like family, too. Life is more of a celebration at St. Ann's.

"We have birthdays, and our staff will go buy them birthday presents of what patients like. They enjoy seeing them happy," she said. "Our nurses are really compassionate, and you can't teach compassion. It's a natural personality trait. It's easy to train somebody their skills, but not to have compassion."

Roney recalls a patient who had COVID. She had spent a month hospitalized and it was touch-and-go regarding her survival. The woman returned to St. Ann's and is stronger than ever. Seeing someone's health overcome dark struggles is one of the reasons to be a nurse, Roney said,

"Something that has changed my life, my perspective while being at this facility is the support that we have gotten from our families in the community during the hard times," she continued.

The past year represents one



thread of a career that flourished while helping others. As a child she would watch TV shows about medicine. The nurses portrayed seemed so awesome. She earned her CNA license when in high school. It was a natural fit for a teenager who enjoyed making other people feel better.

"I just like taking care of people. If I can make their day better, I feel like I've done my job," she explained.

She has a lot of praise for certified nurse aides. They are the hardest workers, Roney said.

Having been a CNA deepened her understanding of the dignity of life. Being a nurse means more than taking care of a patient, she said. Patients are people with individualized needs.

"Some people prefer to have their hair fixed, smell good and to wear nice clothes," she said. "That's their preference and it is a dignity. Most of the geriatrics, when they grew up, they dressed to impress all the time. That has helped me as a nurse when looking at the smaller things."

Small things like wearing glasses, how residents rest in bed matter to them. And Roney said if she didn't start out as a CNA that she might have missed that.

About 50 percent of CNAs become nurses at St. Ann's, Roney said. But some of them don't.

"They love what they do. That's their calling."

St. Ann's offers a nursing scholarship through the Bridges program. Each employee also has an educational fund with options that Bridges will pay for.

"That's what I feel like is really good about this facility is we're home-grown and we like to grow people."

workers from diverse communities in Oklahoma.

"I think just being part of the group for the day and seeing the broad range of the summit is probably what I'm looking forward to the most."

The Harold Hamm Diabetes Care Summit, co-sponsored by the Association of Diabetes Care & Education Specialists, is the region's premier, annual continuing-education conference for diabetes.

Online registration continues now through the beginning of the event, which will be held virtually this year after a one-year hiatus due to Covid. Olson said the event has been providing information for almost two decades now.

"Most of us - whether you're working in the hospital or in the outpatient setting, or in healthcare in general - deal with diabetes everyday," said Olson, MS, RDN, LD, CDCES. "We have some great, well-known speakers."

Expert presentations include updated clinical approaches for diabetes patient management and interprofessional strategies for diabetes self-care and education. Participants can earn up to seven CE credits. Keynote speakers will discuss

several notable research topics. Steven Kahn, M.B., Ch.B. is a

Professor of Medicine, and director of the Diabetes Research Center at the University of Washington and VA Puget Sound Health Care System.

His research interests include the role of the B-cell in the pathogenesis and treatment of prediabetes and type 2 diabetes. He has performed physiological studies and actively participates in a number of large multicenter clinical trials to prevent and treat type 2 diabetes, which include the ongoing Restoring Insulin Secretion (RISE) Study that he chairs. Aside from his clinical studies, he has an extensive basic research program examining the loss of B-cells in type 2 diabetes.

Rochelle Naylor, M.D. is an Assistant Professor, Biological Sciences Division, Department of Pediatrics, University of Chicago Medicine

Dr. Naylor is a pediatric endocrinologist, specializing in the care of children and adolescents with diabetes and other endocrine disorders, including disorders of growth and puberty, thyroid disease and adrenal disease. An active researcher, Dr. Naylor focuses on the diagnosis and treatment of monogenic diabetes -- a rare form of diabetes caused by genetic mutations.

She studies a subset of monogenic diabetes known as maturity-onset diabetes of the young (MODY). She aims to determine the prevalence of MODY, and establish treatment protocols. As a part of this work, Dr. Naylor maintains the MODY section of the Kovler Monogenic Diabetes Registry, a nationwide database of individuals affected by this rare form of diabetes.

In her first year on the planning committee, Jones said she quickly found out the offerings are userdriven.

"What I could tell was this group really didn't want to do a repeat performance of summits done recently," Jones said. "That's another wonderful thing about the summit is it's always fresh. The speakers are always bringing something that hasn't been discussed recently and there's that opportunity for new knowledge development."

While the event will be virtual this year due to Covid, both planning committee members agreed the format offers more flexibility in terms of offerings.

time allowed the committee to bring in speakers that otherwise might not have been able to attend. The online format also allows for participants from different settings such as rural communities to get the educational offerings as those closer to the larger metro hospitals.

"I think it does open up an entire new pathway to bringing knowledge to Oklahoma clinicians who work in diabetes," Jones said.

"My biggest challenge is understanding that every patient's outcome will not be the outcome that we want for them."





"We've all been here together for





really admire that they have the heart to be in this line of work and continue to do what they are doing with the long hours and stress. They are very adaptable and compassionate."

Her life is often touched by the gains she witnesses in her patients' lives. She recalls when one of a gentleman was first admitted to Perry Green Valley on hospice about four years ago.

"We didn't think we had very long with him," she said. "He has gotten better over the years. When he first came, he was bedridden, didn't talk and was very contractured. And now he's walking — he's participating in activities — he's very happy and gets along well with all the staff. We all love him. It was just really inspiring to see someone go from not being able to do anything, and now he's doing activities. He doesn't even use a walker. He is our miracle story."

It's important to understand that how a patient behaves with dementia is not the way they lived in decades past. Dementia changes them, she said. "You just have to have a good relationship with the family, communicating with them to see how they were — what things did they like," Edgar continued.

Research points to redirecting people with dementia when they act as if they are living in the distant past. Perhaps a loved one had died, and they don't realize it. Nurses are trained to meet the resident where they are in life.

"If they are in 1970 at home and we're their kid, then you go with that, because there's more behaviors if you try to tell them 'No, you're wrong. You're not there. Your mother is dead,' or things like that. It's traumatic for them and they're having to relive that every five minutes, if that's how long it takes their brain to process. You just have to be in their world. That's what we are learning."

Many of the nursing home residents were farmers or farming wives. Many of them know and grew up with each other in rural surroundings.

Cancer Institute (F31CA239331) that investigated inequities in tobacco retailer density in the U.S. and associations between retailer density, tobacco use and COPD-related hospitalizations. Kong's study found that substantial racial, ethnic and socioeconomic inequities in the locations of tobacco retail outlets persist in the U.S. Additionally, she showed that county-level tobacco and convenience store density were associated with daily adult smoking, COPD-related hospital discharges and number of days spent in the hospital. Her study highlights the need to reform national and local policies related to neighborhood retail tobacco product outlet density.

Currently, Kong is co-leading a grant funded by the Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center that uses a social ecological and health geography approach to explore racial and socioeconomic inequities in substance use and health care seeking behaviors among cancer survivors during the COVID-19 pandemic.

While earning her degrees in public health, Kong recognized her passion for research, which centers on understanding the inequitable availability and marketing of unhealthy commodities, such as tobacco and alcohol products. She values collaboration with practitioners and community partners to translate science and evidence-based research into sustainable and effective proequity public health policies.

"I am thrilled to be joining the TSET Heath Promotion Research Center," Kong said. "I look forward to working with my colleagues to promote health equity in Oklahoma and nationally by continuing to build my research on understanding place-related effects on tobacco use and cessation and cancer prevention and control."

ANA Urges US Dept of Health and Human Services to Declare Nurse Staffing Shortage a National Crisis

The American Nurses Association (ANA), representing the interests of the nation's 4.2 million nurses, urges the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to declare the current and unsustainable nurse staffing shortage facing our country a national crisis. In a letter to HHS Secretary Xavier Becerra, ANA calls for the Administration to acknowledge and take concrete action to address the current crisis-level nurse staffing shortage that puts nurses' ability to care for patients in jeopardy.

"The nation's health care delivery systems are overwhelmed, and nurses are tired and frustrated as this persistent pandemic rages on with no end in sight. Nurses alone cannot solve this longstanding issue and it is not our burden to carry," said ANA President Ernest Grant, PhD, RN, FAAN. "If we truly value the immeasurable contributions of the nursing workforce, then it is imperative that HHS utilize all available authorities to address this issue."

ANA calls on the Administration to deploy these policy solutions to address the dire nurse staffing shortage crisis. HHS must:

• Convene stakeholders to identify short- and long-term solutions to staffing challenges to face the demand of the COVID-19 pandemic response, ensure the nation's health care delivery system is best equipped to provide quality care for patients, and prepared for the future challenges.

• Work with the Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) on methodologies and approaches to promote payment equity for nursing services and remove unnecessary regulatory barriers to APRN practice.

• Educate the nation on the importance of the COVID-19 vaccine to provide resources for widespread administration of the COVID-19 vaccine and any subsequent boosters.

• Sustain a nursing workforce that meets current and future staffing demands to ensure access to care for patients and prioritize the mental health of nurses and other health professionals.

• Provide additional resources including recruitment and retention incentives that will attract students to the nursing profession and retain skilled nurses to the demands of patient care.

"ANA stands ready to work with HHS and other stakeholders on a whole of government approach to ensure we have a strong nursing workforce today and in the future," said Dr. Grant. "Our nation must have a robust nursing workforce at peak health and wellness to administer COVID-19 vaccines, educate communities, and provide safe patient care for millions of Americans. We cannot be a healthy nation until we commit to address underlying, chronic nursing workforce challenges that have persisted for decades."

OMRF receives grant for ovarian cancer research

The National Institutes of Health has awarded the Oklahoma Medical Research Foundation \$450,000 to research promising new ovarian cancer treatments.

OMRF scientist Magdalena Bieniasz, Ph.D., received the two-year grant to test combinations of drugs that may be more effective than current treatments for aggressive forms of ovarian cancer.

"There is a receptor protein that signals tumor cells to multiply faster and survive better," said Bieniasz, who joined OMRF in 2016 from the Huntsman Cancer Institute in Utah. "We are studying drugs that could inhibit this signal."

The presence of this receptor signal is one reason ovarian cancer often develops resistance to traditional therapies. After chemotherapy treatment, this signal promotes the growth of any cancer cells that weren't stopped, producing a new tumor resistant to the previous medicine.

In an effort to slow or prevent this resistance, Bieniasz's lab team plans to pair the compound blocking receptor signaling with a chemotherapy-type drug.

"We know that to achieve the

strongest response, there has to be a combination," Bieniasz said. "Two drugs combined may be better than the sum of each by itself."

These drug combinations will be tested on cell models that represent tumors of patients at the University of Oklahoma Health Stephenson Cancer Center. OMRF scientists will use a targeted approach to treat the models, applying different drug combinations based on cancer type and stage.

"In targeted therapy, drugs are matched to specific tumors that have specific features," said Bieniasz. "We characterize the samples so we know which tumor would be a good candidate for each treatment."

Bieniasz noted this project will focus not only on what works, but why. Understanding the mechanism of the receptor signaling inhibition will help set up future studies for more effective treatments.

"The signaling protein is present in nearly half of ovarian cancer patients, and each one of those patients could benefit from this," Bieniasz said.

The grant, No. R21 CA264573-01, is funded by the National Cancer Institute, a part of the NIH.
