OU Health and Mercy in Oklahoma City have launched Mercy Clinic - Neurosurgery, a collaboration that provides patients with advanced medical and surgical treatments for disorders of the brain and spine.

OU Health's existing practice of nine neurosurgeons have been performing surgeries and providing 24-hour neurosurgical coverage at Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City since May. The opening of Mercy Clinic - Neurosurgery is a new addition to the growing relationship and will be

by being part of their lives and love them and care for them."

Golden Oaks Village is located on 40 acres in Stillwater in a wooded country setting that is filled with ponds and wildlife. A peaceful view accompanies a paved walking trail. Independent and assisted living facilities serve more than 100 seniors and the elderly every day.

Her affinity for working with the senior population began in nursing school. Schenck earned her education at Shelton State Community College, located in her hometown of Tuscaloosa, Ala. At first, she thought she would enter the field of labor and delivery. She had already married at age 18, started a family with three children, and went into nursing at 25.

"Then I did my preceptorship in a nursing home. I had one patient that was mine that I took care of," Schenck said. "I got to sit and talk with her. I had never really got to visit nursing homes. I had never been in that environment, and I just realized it's not a very glamorous part of nursing — long-term care. But they just need people who care."

Her patient in Alabama related that she was at the end of her life as they looked through photographs of her children. Some of the woman's children had already died. She was a picture of peace while telling stories about her life and had accepted that her life would end.

"I realized that they all need someone who can care for them and love them and be kind to them at that end stage of life," Schenck said. "I felt the calling."

Seniors also share their life story at Golden Oaks. By doing so, the residents share a similar time of their life that Schenck currently enjoys in her 30s.

"And so, it helps me to go home to love my husband and love my kids, and appreciate the moments every day, because they're fleeting," Schenck explained. "I think sometimes you forget that in life. So, I think it's grounded me about how precious life is, because I get to work with seniors all the time."

The nursing staff forms loving relationships with residents and their families. Her work teaches her the value of patience, empathy and

kindness — all the things she wants in life. Schenck said nursing is more than just a job for the Golden Oaks staff members. Compassionate nursing is what the staff choses to do every day.

their residents fiercely," she said. "That's what attracts me with the staff here. I feel we are like-minded in that way."

residence to be a bit stressful when leaving one's home for assisted living, Schenck said. She recalls one man who was a little grouchy. So Schenck set her course to help him adjust and win him over.

"The girls are like-minded. And we did, we had won him over. We'd go in there and he would pat our hands and pat our face. He loved that. We loved him, wanted to care for him and support him as he was going through what he was going through," she continued. "He did pass away, but it was very special. As he was declining, he almost craved our touch as we went in there."

There are many couples living at Golden Oaks. Whenever a spouse becomes very ill, the nursing staff comes to their side to nurture both spouses. Being a nurse is not just taking care of a sick person, but supporting both spouses, Schenck said.

"If their spouse is acutely ill, "It's a tight-knit group that loves then their heart is hurting, so I see the staff rally around that person and offer support and love," she said. "It's a great group here."

After work, Schenck goes home It's normal for a change in to be with her family that has grown to nine kiddos, she said. She and her husband play with them outside or sit in their chairs and watch them.

> Her oldest daughter is 19 and already has nurturing qualities. Naturally she feels like a nursing career is in her future, too.

> "I come home and talk about the things that touch me and share it with my kids," Schenck said. "I feel like it is so important every day to realize how precious moments are."

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Our daughter, Ellie, was born in November 2008. When she was 3 months old, we found out she had a liver problem. We went to Children's Hospital in OKC, but were soon sent to a transplant center in Nebraska for evaluation. On March 18th, Ellie was put on the list for transplant. We came back home to wait. Ellie was treated at Children's twice a week, until she began to lose weight in May. We went back to Nebraska the day after Mother's Day, and she was admitted to the hospital. While there, I was evaluated as a living donor for Ellie, and we soon learned I could give her part of my liver. Ellie's transplant was on May 22, 2009. It was the hardest thing that I've ever done, but the

easiest decision of my life. We came home Father's Day weekend.

Dr. Stetson has an excellent reputation in the community, and we are delighted that he has joined the OU-Mercy team," said Ian Dunn, M.D., Chief Physician Executive at OU Health and Professor and Chair of the Department of Neurosurgery in the OU College of Medicine.

"For years we've had a strong neurology program at Mercy offering the most advanced stroke treatment and an excellent movement disorders program, but the addition of two dedicated neurosurgeons helps us expand our program," said Jim Gebhart, president of Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City. "We're grateful to join OU Health to provide aroundthe-clock coverage for patients experiencing neurological trauma."

Stetson, a board-certified neurosurgeon, brings significant expertise to Mercy Clinic -Neurosurgery. He has practiced in the Oklahoma City area for eight years. He holds memberships with the American College of Osteopathic Surgeons and the Oklahoma Osteopathic Association.

"There's a real need in our community for additional neurosurgery offerings in the emergency and outpatient setting," Stetson said. "Quality of life is a huge factor for these patients; we're talking about restoring their ability to function and enjoy life again and I think this joint effort will help expand those options for many more patients."

Stetson earned his medical degree from the University of New

England College of Osteopathic Medicine, followed by an internship at Peninsula Hospital in Far Rockaway, New York, and residency training at John H. Stroger, Jr. Hospital of Cook County in Chicago and at Northwell Health Neuroscience Institute in Manhasset, New York. He also earned a master's in Healthcare Improvement and Innovation from The Dartmouth Institute for Health Policy & Clinical Practice in Hanover, New Hampshire.

Also joining Mercy Qinic

Neurosurgery is Jenna Taylor, an advanced practice registered nurse. The team will diagnose and treat a complete range of disorders of the nervous system, including the brain, spinal cord, spinal column, skull and peripheral nerves. Stetson and his colleagues have advanced numerous training in neurosurgical techniques, including complex and

minimally invasive spinal surgery; skull-base surgical approaches; advanced techniques for glioma surgery; endovascular approaches

for aneurysm and stroke; and many others.

Stetson and his colleagues will only see patients at Mercy but will remain on faculty and teach students at the OU College of Medicine. Plans are also underway for residents to train at Mercy.

"If we've learned anything as a health care community over the last year and a half it's that we serve our community and our patients best when we work together instead of competing against each other," said Matt Wright, chief operating officer



of Mercy Clinic. "We're leveraging the strength of OU Health with the mission of Mercy to create an even better program together."

preeminent nursing As а Oklahoma program, City University's Kramer School of Nursing continues to innovate its offerings to produce some of the most highly skilled nurses in our region. The school fosters a learning environment where students are challenged to think critically holistically, and encouraging them to use their passion and knowledge to advance the profession of nursing. With students consistently exceeding the national licensure pass rates for the traditional Bachelor of Science degree and certification pass rates for the Doctor of Nursing practice family nurse practitioner, and high job placement rates after graduation, it's not a surprise to see that OCU's Kramer School of Nursing was included in the Nursing Schools Almanac's 2020 rankings of the best U.S. nursing schools.

The fall of 2020 brought additional career advancement opportunities for OCU's Kramer School of Nursing students. LPNs now have the option of an LPN-BSN degree track. In addition to the programs, OCU's KSN enrolled their first cohort in the BSN-DNP, Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner track, the first BSN-DNP PMHNP program in the state.

The Meinders Simulations Center offers a seven-bed highfidelity laboratory mirroring the hospital environment, allowing students to practice with realistic patient care scenarios.

Crystal Westmoreland, PhD, MSN, RN, Chair of Traditional BSN Education at Kramer, states, "I love the collaboration between faculty, staff and students. The mentorship program allows faculty and staff to really get to know students as individuals, helping them through life's obstacles as they pursue their degree. As with all of our programs, Kramer doesn't have wait lists and offers students a variety of full-time and part-time options."

KSN offers an outstanding RN-BSN program in which RNs can complete their BSN in just two semesters, with no prerequisites required. "We have small, individualized classes taught by a group of amazing faculty, who love working with practicing nurses" said Pam Tucker, MSN, RN, Chair of the RN-BSN program. "The RN-BSN program continues to be an excellent career advancement path for nurses." The program features the best of both worlds with nursing courses meeting face-to-face half day per week and the remaining elective/ general education courses offered online. The program is currently offered at OCU, Mercy Hospital-OKC, and Norman Regional Hospital. No nursing exams, care plans or clinical hours are required. The MSN currently offers tracks specializing in Education and Leadership, and Community Based Public Health.

Elizabeth Diener, PhD, RN, PNP, CNE Chair of Graduate Education discusses the Doctor of Philosophy degree. "The PhD degree prepares expert nurses in the roles of nursing education, research, and leadership to serve the community, state, and nation," she said. Students meet on campus for 2-3 days at the beginning of each semester and then complete courses online over the remainder of the semester.

The Doctor of Nursing Practice Completion program is for nurses with careers in all types of health care settings who already hold a master's degree in nursing, advanced practice, or a related field. The program is 30-32 credit hours, post-masters. Focus areas include clinical, community based public health, and executive leadership in organizational or educational settings. Post master's certificates are also available for advanced practice nurses who seek additional certification in an advanced practice role.

Gina Crawford, DNP, APRN-CNP, FNP, CNE, Assistant Dean and Chair of Advanced Practice Programs points out, "Kramer School of Nursing was the first to offer a post-bachelors Doctorate of Nursing Practice program in the state of Oklahoma. It's been very fulfilling to see this program grow and see the success of our alumni who are now working in a variety of clinical settings and some who own their own clinics." Kramer School of Nursing is the first in Oklahoma to offer the BSN-DNP Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner option.

Dr. Rachel Mack is a certified family nurse practitioner, certified nurse educator, a Gallup certified Strengths Coach, and the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs at Frontier Nursing University (FNU). She is the National League of Nursing AARP representative for the American Indian/Alaska Native workgroup. She is also a committee member for the National League of Nursing Taking Aim series which is focused on developing Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging workshops and webinars. Dr. Mack is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society and many other professional organizations. Her doctoral research was focused on prescription drug abuse, which opened many doors, including assisting in the development of the Oklahoma State Plan to decrease prescription drug abuse and she continues to be actively involved with this committee. She has traveled as a consultant for government hospitals in the Middle East with American Gulf International Consulting and has taught the Certified Professional in Infection Control course in the Middle East with the American Institute of Healthcare Quality. Dr. Mack continues to work a few days each month in a family practice setting and full-time at FNU. November is Native American Heritage Month! This week we are highlighting Sonya Frazier, a Native ONA member.

Sonya Frazier is Choctaw and Chickasaw. She has been a registered nurse for 19 years and an officer in the United Public Health Service Commissioned Corps (USPHS) for 14 years. She helped create the first Oklahoma Indigenous Nurses Association (OINA), a chapter of Oklahoma Nurses Association and elected to be their first President. She has created Indigenous cultural educational training for nursing programs to address the health and social disparities and health equity in Indigenous populations.

As a descendant of a boarding school survivor, she is also the founder of the Regalia Making Relatives organization that envisions thriving Indigenous communities through networking, collaboration, mentoring, and regalia making. This organization works closely with local Johnson O'Malley programs and the Oklahoma State Department of Health to encourage, educate and assist Native American children in foster care and adoptees to stay connected to their Indigenous heritage.

Sonya was recently selected for her expertise in Indigenous health care to the National Commission to Address Racism in Nursing. This committee involves the American Nurses Association (ANA), National Black Nurses Association (NBNA), National Association of Hispanic Nurses (NAHN), and the National Coalition of Ethnic and Minority Nurses Association (NCEMNA) and Oklahoma Indigenous Nurses Association (OINA). The Commission created to help advance the work and achieve the vision of a nursing profession that exemplifies inclusivity, diversity, and equity creating antiracist praxis and environments. Her goal in life is to lead the way for healing by reconnecting to our Indigenous ways.
