Mercy Oklahoma City Named a **Newsweek Best** Maternity Hospital

Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City has again earned a spot on the list of best hospitals in the country to deliver a baby.

Mercy Oklahoma City is one of only 350 hospitals on the list of America's Best Maternity Hospitals determined by Newsweek and data firm Statista. The designation places Mercy among the highest echelon of more than 2,700 hospitals across the country offering maternity services.

The survey includes two performance categories: five-ribbon hospitals and four-ribbon hospitals. Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City is the only hospital in the state of Oklahoma to receive the highest award, a five-ribbon designation.

"This recognition as a best maternity hospital reflects our team's dedication to patient safety and creating the best experience for our patients and their families," said Dr. Chad Smith, Mercy OB-GYN and chief medical officer. "The kind of care they provide is known in our community and people want to have their baby at Mercy, creating exponential growth at Mercy Birthplace."

The hospital's labor and delivery and postpartum services have been at capacity for years. Construction on the Love Family Women's Center on the campus of Mercy Hospital Oklahoma City kicked off in summer 2022. The 175,000-square-foot, four-story facility, expected to open in fall 2023, will serve women and children. When construction is complete, the facility will have a total of 73 patient rooms,

nurse practitioner at Community Medical Clinic for three years and worked as Hospitalist at Hillcrest Medical Center in Cushing for two years.

Waren said the Perkins clinic has been growing.

"It has been building, and going strong ever since," she said. "We see anywhere from 20 to 30 patients a day. We love it here. It is a great community to be in."

Waren said being a Family Nurse Practitioner allows her to be a patient's primary care provider.

"I can essentially do most tasks that a physician can do (in a clinic setting), but in the state of Oklahoma we have to have a supervising physician to be able to write prescriptions," she said. "I have the same ability to diagnose and treat that a family practice doctor does."

Waren said the number of Nurse Practitioners in Oklahoma has risen since she began her career.

"When I started 12 or 13 years ago, there weren't enough Nurse Practitioners around for me to do my clinical rotations with," she said. "I did all my around physicians." Waren said Nurse Practitioners are helping fill a gap, especially in the rural areas.

"There is a severe shortage of family practice doctors," she said. "A lot of medical students are wanting to specialize in a certain field, and it has left a huge gap in family physicians. In a lot of ways, there is a need, and that is where we have come in and filled a void. There is a need there for those patients to be treated. I think it is important to have access to care. You have a lot of patients that don't have the means to drive 20 miles away. We have some patients that walk here, or ride their bike here. It is important that they have someone here local that they know and get taken care of."

Waren said the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the nursing field.

"I think there has been a large number of nurses with burnout," she said. "With COVID-19, especially, it has been a really difficult two years here in Oklahoma."

She added COVID also impacted how her clinic operated.

"It definitely impacted our clinic," she said. "We tried really hard from the beginning to wade through this, and do the best for our patients. We figured a way to make it work. We have done more tele-medicine than we have ever done at our clinic."

Waren enjoys spending time with her family, and also unwinds by cooking.

"I love to cook," she said. "I have always said that if I did anything else, that would be it."

Leann Laubach, Ph.D., is an assistant professor and the baccalaureate program coordinator in the Department of Nursing at the University of Central Oklahoma.

She has been teaching at UCO since 2005 and has 22 years of experience as a nurse in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit.

"They set their own goals so it's a more personalized experience. It's not the goals I set for you as the instructor," Laubach said of the program's online offerings. "They are related to your ultimate goal for your degree. I think that's really where we pride ourselves both in our RN to BSN and our master's program is the personalization of the degree and maintaining that close contact with our students so we can help you be successful in our programs."

The master's degree directly addresses the University of Central Oklahoma's mission to contribute to the intellectual, cultural, economic, and social advancement of the communities and individuals it serves.

The inclusion of 100 practicum hours facilitates the participation of students in transformative educational experiences that directly benefit the Oklahoma City metro community.

Nursing graduate students can choose from two-course pathways: nursing leadership or nursing education. A master's degree in nursing education will prepare students for academic positions in nursing education or positions in clinical staff education. The leadership pathway allows students to meet individual goals in areas such as health care leadership or administration.

The program is offered at a \$15,000 flat fee, even if a student is out of state.

"It's protecting students against inflation," Laubach said.

Laubach noted the flexibility of the program benefits students in ways that make it possible to advance their degrees.

"There's great value in that for someone who maybe is working full time and or has a family, they can carve those hours out in a time frame that works for them. I see that as very valuable for both programs. It makes it so students can do the work when they need to do the work and not at a time that works better for me."

The recent pandemic has created a divide for many nurses who enjoy their chosen careers but may feel burnt out in their current roles.

"I think now has challenged people to think outside of being at the bedside that whole time," Laubach said. "I think they are seeking education because they want that change. I think that's the future of where nursing is going that nurses are realizing they want to stay in nursing but they don't know if they want to stay at the bedside the whole time."

There is a definite opportunity for nurses to use their experiences to better the next generation of nursing through education or mentorship.

"I think for nurses who find they are passionate about teaching new nurses it's an advantage to come back and get an education or leadership degree," Laubach said. "A leadership degree would allow students to be the clinical leaders, the charge nurse and give them the skillset they need to be successful."

"The advantage of coming back to get your master's degree or even your bachelor's degree is expanding the way you think. The biggest thing is the growth mindset that occurs from the next degree to the next degree."

The first nursing class from the nursing department at the University of Central Oklahoma graduated in 1972. Since that time, more than 3,500 well-qualified graduate nurses have entered the workforce.

Graduates of this program are known for being some of the best nurses in the state of Oklahoma.

## **Cancer** Center Launches Historic **Trial for Cancer** Drug Developed in Oklahoma

OU Health Stephenson Cancer create a better version of the drug Center has announced a historic first for the campus and the state: A new cancer drug, called OK-1, which was conceived and created by an OU College of Medicine researcher and developed entirely in Oklahoma, without the support of a pharmaceutical company, is being tested in humans for the first time in a Phase 1 clinical trial.

The drug was created by researcher Doris Benbrook, Ph.D., whose work on the compound began more than 25 years ago. New drugs developed within an academic institution, without the aid of a pharmaceutical company, are exceedingly rare. The Food and Drug Administration approved the drug to be given to humans in the clinical trial, which is underway at Stephenson Cancer Center. The drug is initially being given to women with advanced-stage ovarian, endometrial and cervical cancer.

"It is very exciting to reach the point where we can test OK-1 in a clinical trial," said Benbrook, who is a professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology in the OU College of Medicine. "This drug is not available anywhere else in the world right now. We believe it has tremendous potential for treating cancer without causing toxic side effects."

OK-1 is derived from the natural compound vitamin A. The human body uses vitamin A to make retinoic acid, a nutrient that supports healthy functioning. Some forms of retinoic acid, as well as synthetic versions called retinoids, have been used to treat cancers such as leukemia. However, both are highly toxic, Benbrook said, and patients often become resistant to their effectiveness. Her aim was to

that is able to kill cancer cells but is less toxic to normal cells.

That effort has taken over two decades of experimentation. Benbrook worked with a collaborator to modify the drug's chemical structure and test the biological activity of new versions. The new drug they ultimately developed has been modified to such an extent that it works in a completely different way than vitamin A. Collaborators in the OU College of Pharmacy performed research that was necessary to test OK-1 in clinical trials. The work has been supported by millions of dollars in grants from the National Cancer Institute.

OK-1 works by taking away one of the "tricks" that cancer cells use to survive. When cancer cells develop, the body naturally tries to stop their invasion and growth. In response, cancer cells increase their production of "chaperone proteins," which act like "bodyguards" to keep the cancer cells from dying. The drug OK-1 is able to attach to the chaperone proteins, disabling them in the process. The body's immune system, or another drug like chemotherapy, is then better able to kill cancer cells because they are no longer protected by "bodyguards." The drug does not harm healthy cells because they do not need the chaperone protection.

Phase 1 clinical trials are conducted to determine the highest dose of a new drug that can be given safely without causing severe side effects. While OK-1 has been tested extensively in the laboratory and in animal research models, the true effect can't be known until it is given to humans. However, preclinical studies of the drug have proved that it is effective without causing severe side effects or birth

defects, Benbrook said. The drug is being given to humans in capsule form.

Kathleen Moore, M.D., Associate Director of Clinical Research and Director of the Oklahoma TSET Phase 1 Program at Stephenson Cancer Center, is leading the clinical trial. "The Phase 1 investigators are so excited to finally have this novel drug available to our patients," Moore said. "It is a completely new class of drug, which, in addition to having efficacy in and of itself, may help other current cancer therapies work better without adding toxicity. This is kind of the holy grail. We have many combinations that work better than the single drug, but the combinations are far too toxic for general population use. OK-1 gives us the opportunity to bring combinations into trials that may work better without compromising safety. The potential is so exciting."

At the conclusion of the Phase 1 trial. Moore and her team will have learned the optimal dose of OK-1. In subsequent trials, they plan to test the drug in combination with other cancer drugs already on the market. Benbrook has made patent applications

on several drug combinations; OK-1 appears to be most effective when given with other existing drugs.

"We found in our experimental models that when we add OK-1 to other cancer therapies like paclitaxel, which is the standard chemotherapy for endometrial cancer, we get a synergistic effect that is much better than either drug alone," Benbrook said.

Benbrook's preclinical research also has shown that OK-1 may be effective for preventing cancer. She plans to test OK-1 in an ovarian cancer prevention trial in the Cancer Prevention Clinical Trials Network, a program of the National Cancer Institute. The drug will be given to women who are going to have their fallopian tubes surgically removed. Because most ovarian cancers originate in the fallopian tubes, researchers will examine the effect of the drug on fallopian tube tissues. Ultimately, the drug could be given to women who are genetically predisposed to cancer, such as those with a BRCA gene mutation.

is the only such program in the state and is considered among the top 10 programs in the nation. As a National Cancer Institute-designated cancer center, Stephenson can offer patients first access to early-stage drugs like Benbrook's OK-1.

"This is a very exciting time to be conducting the first Phase 1 trial for a drug developed on our campus," said Robert Mannel, M.D., director of Stephenson Cancer Center. "It is only possible because of Dr. Benbrook's passion and determination and the ability of Stephenson Cancer Center to offer Phase 1 clinical trials. We have a very special team of doctors, nurses, researchers and staff who work together to safely give these new drugs to humans."

In addition to funding from the National Cancer Institute, Benbrook's research has been supported by grants from Oklahoma City-based Presbyterian Health Foundation, as well as the OU College of Medicine Alumni Association.
