

"My fellow coworkers are like my work family and they make coming to work fun and interesting," she wrote.


The stories are highlighted throughout the system.

with a work environment that allows for and encourages caring.

McGill said the hospital has created a number of programs to highlight The Norman Way to prospective nurses coming out of school.

Norman Regional's student nurse partnership allows final semester nursing students to get paid for their clinical hours while working on the floor as a patient care technician.

Norman Regional Health System student nurse partners and externs have consistently passed the NCLEX at a rate of 96 percent since the program began in March of 2021.

Those numbers are impressive, especially considering the state pass rate average is 83 percent. Nationally, those taking the NCLEX have dropped to an 81 percent success rate.

"The intention with all of them is to bridge that gap from the academic experience to the professional setting," McGill said. "We've seen throughout these programs a great success in those students transitioning post-graduation, passing of the NCLEX and being immersed into their new professional role."

Students are surveyed after each phase of the

program.

"That speaks volumes. Their learning experience and environment is a direct result of our healers providing that positive experience for them," McGill said. "So our healers know about the importance of tomorrow's future and they know the purpose of these programs is to invest in the profession of nursing.

"And it speaks to our culture as a health system."

Putting words to faces helps Minnis and his

"It's absolutely critical. We work in a relationship business and to reflect the faces of the healers who work here and give the care to the patients and families I believe it symbolically represents, recognizes and celebrates those individual healers," he said. "That individual healing and caring is a very personal experience. For us to be able to showcase that healer whether it be a patient care tech or a nurse ... means all the world."

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OU College of Nursing continues mission

For 21 straight years now the nursing profession has been named the most trustworthy in America.

Quite simple, nursing is the lifeblood of healthcare. And for those charged with training the next generation of nurses, the responsibility for the future is

held sacred.

Faculty at the University of Oklahoma's Fran and Earl Ziegler College of Nursing stand in the gap when it comes to nursing education.

Each has their own unique story, but all share a passion for nursing education.

Stacy Frisbie, DNP, RN, CNE serves as the BSN Track Coordinator and Curriculum Chair for the college.

"Nursing is the absolute oxygen of the health system," Frisbie said. "Nurses advocate for their patients on a daily basis and are often the first to notice a change in a patient's condition. Decades of research not only supports the value of nurses regarding patient satisfaction, but also their impact on morbidity and mortality."

Unfortunately, Oklahoma has fewer nurses per capita than 48 other states. That's a crisis in care for our state.

"The importance of nursing care has been increasingly recognized across the world," Frisbie said. "By vastly increasing the number of nurses we are able to educate across our five sites in the past year, and again for this year, the Fran and Earl Ziegler College of Nursing is making a difference to Oklahomans

needing care across the state."

"I am confident the students we graduate will continue the tradition of nursing excellence we are known for, and my hope is that our partners across the state who are supporting our new graduates in healthy work environments will be able to keep them here for years to come."

Lori McElroy, DNP, RN, CNE is an assistant professor and ABSN and degree completion track coordinator.

She's proud of the college's mission and its results.

"It is a bit cliche to say that nursing education is attempting to make changes to keep up with the rapidly changing healthcare landscape because we have been saying this for decades," she said. "At the Fran and Earl Ziegler College of Nursing, located in the heart of the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center, we truly believe that nurses are the oxygen of the healthcare system and they are educated to adapt and make changes continuously to improve health outcomes with a holistic approach while considering self-care and a healthy work environment."

"We are growing by leaps and bounds, which happens when you provide more oxygen. We have doubled student enrollment in the undergraduate programs, tripled the number of student affairs staff to offer more student resources and student support, and expanded clinical partnerships across the state. We are working to expand and enhance our facilities to accommodate more students and create consistency across the state at each teaching site."

With that, McElroy noted the school continues to hire more faculty and staff to support the incoming students.

"This exciting time of change, innovation, and reenvisioning of teaching, learning, and clinical experiences provides infinite possibilities to improve nursing education, patient care, and outcomes for our Oklahoma communities,"

Brayton J. Amidon, MSN, RN, CHSE is a clinical instructor at the college. Primarily teaching in the college's Experiential Learning Center, Amidon helps students apply what they learn in the classroom to real-life patient scenarios.

It's this type of learning that closes the gap between classroom and the patient room.

"Our primary mechanism for this instruction is simulation - whether that be skills education or realistic patient scenarios," he said. "Our goal in the Experiential Learning Center is to narrow the theory-to-practice gap and prepare our students to excel as newly licensed RNs. We have created a safe place for students to learn and practice their critical thinking and clinical judgment. Our Experiential Learning Team across the state works together closely to ensure that our students have the best possible learning experience."

Nursing Pioneers: WOSC a leader in

SW Oklahoma

Diane Fairchild, MSN, RN had a recent conversation with a former graduate.

A smile crossed her face as the graduate related heartfelt thanks for the learning opportunities he had received at Western Oklahoma State College.

And by the time the school's nursing program director finished the conversation, she had a volunteer for IV skills lab day walking down the hall to meet with their former instructor.

"He wanted to be a part of that because he felt like he had received an excellent education here and he loved nursing and wanted to give back to the students by letting them stick his arm," Fairchild said. "He appreciated the relationship that he had developed with his instructors and they were so caring and kind to him that he just wanted to give back."

"It's a wonderful feeling, very fulfilling."

It's stories like these that keep Fairchild and her faculty going.

Western Oklahoma State has one of the only ADN programs in southwest Oklahoma and has three campuses.

Established as Altus Junior College in 1926, it is the oldest original municipal two-year college still in existence in Oklahoma.

The Nursing Program at Western Oklahoma State College was established in 1981 and has an outstanding success rate for preparing qualified nurses.

The WOSC nursing program is offered at three campus sites: Altus, Lawton, and Elk City. Western's ADN program has several program tracks.

Face-to-face classes for both general and advanced standing entry students are available as well as online classes with a face-to-face clinical component for advanced standing students. Students in the face-to-face track are able to take daytime classes at all three campuses.

"One of our major goals is to meet the needs of Altus and the surrounding areas by having a high-quality nursing program and having nurses go into our communities and stay and help with the nursing needs of the people in that community," Fairchild said.

One of the school's most popular programs is the online LPN-to-RN track.

"We even have students coming from Texas and Oklahoma City," she said. "With this program and testing you can complete the program in one year and still be able to work as an LPN while you are completing the program."

NCLEX pass rates for the LPN to RN have exceeded the national average for the past two years.

"I feel like we have excellent support with our clinical sites, the different hospitals in the area that allow us to do clinicals there," Fairchild said. "We have excellent clinical adjunct instructors that provide very good clinical teaching to our students where they can really build on their bedside skills and bedside interaction with patients. They really build upon their ability to care and give compassion to patients."

Fairchild said oftentimes clinical instructors are employed at the facilities where clinicals occur which only adds to the learning

experience.

"They know what they need and are able to teach that to the students. A lot of our hospitals do nurse intern programs during the summer and it's very beneficial to the student and it's beneficial to the school because they're continuing their education through work in the summer," Fairchild said. "The students are getting to know the nurses there and developing relationships and when they graduate and become nurses a lot of times they are hired in those facilities and help with the nursing shortage."

Springtime is always an exciting time for healthcare facilities in and around campus.

"I know they say it's very difficult to find RNs to come to southwest Oklahoma so they're always thankful when it comes to graduation time and they know some of those RNs are going to be able to stay in that area," Fairchild said.

And some even come back to their alma mater to pay it forward.

Murray State Offers Paramedic to RN Career Mobility Program

Murray State College offers a paramedic. hybrid online fast track program that is Murray State College offers a hybrid online fast track program that is designed for Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs,) Licensed Vocational Nurses (LVNs) and Licensed Paramedics. It allows them to advance their careers by earning a registered nursing (RN) degree.

This Nursing Paramedic to RN Career Mobility track was ranked number one as the best in the nation for 2023, according to https://www.registerednursing.org.

Certified paramedics who have been licensed within the last three years do not have to take the challenge exam prior to applying for the program. The hybrid online track includes a nursing role transition course to address the responsibilities of a nurse versus a

Graduates of this program are eligible to apply for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN). From there, students have the opportunity to continue their education toward earning a bachelor's and master's degrees, and doctorate.



Tulsa Nurse Creates Dosage Calculation App

Latoya Smith has been a practicing Registered Nurse for 15 years, and saw a need to help nursing students with correctly doing their medication dosage calculations in school.

As a result, Smith, who works as a RN in Tulsa, wrote an ebook "The Trap Guide To Nursing Dosage Calculation with Latoya, RN," that shows nursing students how to break down and solve dosage calculation problems and pass dosage calculation class.

"I was helping out in a student nurse Facebook group, and I saw they were struggling with dose calculation," she said. "A lot of our Facebook students were failing and not being able to go on to become nurses because they were failing this critical thing because you need to know how to calculate dose appropriately. Nursing costs students a lot of money and time. It is costing us bodies in the nursing profession.

We need these people to graduate and come to work."

Smith said her book has been successful in helping nursing students.

"It has done really well, and has helped hundreds of students to pass dosage calculations," she said. "One thing they kept asking for was an app to practice anytime, anywhere. Over the last couple of years, I have been working to develop that. This is all something that we can benefit from, both practicing nurses and nursing students."

Smith worked with app co-founder Carmen Bourlon on developing the Dose Calc App which will be available starting May 6

"I do all of the questions and the video for the app, and she is the one who actually builds it," Smith said. "We are really excited about it, and I think nursing students will be excited about it and be successful in nursing school. This is one of the

most crucial and foundational things you need to have to be a successful nurse. You can practice dosage calculation anytime and anywhere with this app."

Smith attended and graduated from Ponca City Senior High School. She graduated from Northern Oklahoma College with a Degree in Applied Science in Nursing in 2008. While Attending Northern Oklahoma College, Smith was on the Dean's Honor Roll, the President's Honor Roll, and a member of Phi Theta Kappa. She was the Nurse of the Day at the Oklahoma State Legislature in March of 2020.

Smith said she hopes the new app will help improve the skills of practicing nurses and nursing school students.

"My goal is to have a safer need for this app, healthcare place, a better world for our patients, and a better world thing," she said. The goal is to help make patients safer and /dosecalcapp.com/





improve medication safety."



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

OSU's RN to BSN program offers convenience, flexibility

Oklahoma State University RN to BSN student Sage Holder had long known she was interested in a healthcare career. When two of the most important people in her life – her grandfather and mother – received a cancer diagnosis in the same week during her first year of college, her career path came into focus.

"I knew I wanted to be in the healthcare system. I just didn't know exactly where or what that was going to look like when I started college. I knew I wanted to be successful, a person that others needed, and to care for the sick," Holder recalls.

Holder began taking pre-medicine classes but during the second semester of her freshman year, she had what she calls an "aha" moment.

"I was either in class or in the hospital, spending time with my family during my grandpa's chemo treatments or my mom's cancer appointments. I began to notice the nurses. I wanted to be the person that the patient could look to for a smile, a laugh, or a shoulder to cry on."

Confident in her decision to pursue nursing, Holder completed prerequisite courses and went on to earn an associate degree in May 2021 and become a Registered Nurse (RN). She landed a job at the Emergency Room at Stillwater Medical Center.

Ready to continue her education by pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Holder found the perfect fit in OSU's fully online RN to BSN program.

"I knew the program would offer flexibility with my lifestyle and allow me to continue working as an RN while taking classes," Holder said. "The faculty have been approachable and easy to reach and to communicate with. I feel like they want me to succeed."

OSU's RN to BSN program, which launched in Fall 2017 and is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), provides students with a convenient and flexible option to complete their bachelor's degree in as little as one year.

OSU students expand their professional nursing knowledge from practical, foundational skills they learned during their associate degree, learning the why behind past education.

"Our students are challenged with a wide array of topics that range from leadership and current trends in nursing to global, cultural and public health, as well as nursing theory," RN to BSN program director Dr. Alana Cluck said.

Ultimately, the mission of the RN to BSN program is to prepare nurses to practice professional nursing that meets the dynamic

"Faculty communicate extremely well, especially considering it's an online program. They offer a variety of ways to share information and foster relationships with our peers, which allows us to be successful. It's easy to have a positive experience when you feel your efforts are not only noticed, but also celebrated," RN to BSN graduate Lacy Smith said.

Kobey Trower, a 2019 graduate of the program, appreciated the experience of his peers and the collaborative nature of courses.

"All of the students were working full-time jobs," Trower said. "We had some people who worked in ICU, some in labor and delivery, others in clinic and research settings. The accessibility of the coursework helped us keep on the same page for group projects. It was super convenient for me to work full time and still have a life without being tieddown. That aspect of it helped keep my attention and keep me moving through the program."

Holder's experience as a student in the program has been first rate. She encourages any RN considering a four-year degree to explore OSU's program.

"Set up a meeting or a zoom call with a faculty or administrative member and give them the chance to provide information and answer questions that are of concern. That is what I did and it sold me. The faculty were so welcoming and flexible."



Oklahoma ranks in the top 5 states for the highest concentration Practical Nurse Licensed employment according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. This field is expected to grow up to 12% in the next five years, making jobs in nursing both high-demand and readily available to individuals looking to join or advance in this rewarding industry. Moore Norman Technology Center is dedicated to training the next workforce generation of nurses and continuing to provide continued classes for existing RNS to grow in knowledge, technical skills, and experience.

High school students considering a career in nursing or healthcare,

can start training junior year. MNTC offers multiple career programs that utilize a realistic clinical setting for training students in basic nursing care. 


Traditional Nursing Program

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
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
