

OSU's RN to BSN program offers convenience, flexibility

Oklahoma State University RN to BSN student Sage Holder had long known she was interested in a healthcare career. When two of the most important people in her life – her grandfather and mother – received a cancer diagnosis in the same week during her first year of college, her career path came into focus.

"I knew I wanted to be in the healthcare system. I just didn't know exactly where or what that was going to look like when I started college. I knew I wanted to be successful, a person that others needed, and to care for the sick," Holder recalls.

Holder began taking pre-medicine classes but during the second semester of her freshman year, she had what she calls an "aha" moment.

"I was either in class or in the hospital, spending time with my family during my grandpa's chemo treatments or my mom's cancer appointments. I began to notice the nurses. I wanted to be the person that the patient could look to for a smile, a laugh, or a shoulder to cry on."

Confident in her decision to pursue nursing, Holder completed prerequisite courses and went on to earn an associate degree in May 2021 and become a Registered Nurse (RN). She landed a job at the Emergency Room at Stillwater Medical Center.

Ready to continue her education by pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Holder found the perfect fit in OSU's fully online RN to BSN program.

"I knew the program would offer flexibility with my lifestyle and allow me to continue working as an RN while taking classes," Holder said. "The faculty have been approachable and easy to reach and to communicate with. I feel like they want me to succeed."

OSU's RN to BSN program, which launched in Fall 2017 and is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), provides students with a convenient and flexible option to complete their bachelor's degree in as little as one year.

OSU students expand their professional nursing knowledge from practical, foundational skills they learned during their associate degree, learning the why behind past education.

"Our students are challenged with a wide array of topics that range from leadership and current trends in nursing to global, cultural and public health, as well as nursing theory," RN to BSN program director Dr. Alana Cluck said.

Ultimately, the mission of the RN to BSN program is to prepare nurses to practice professional nursing that meets the dynamic

health care needs of individuals, families, groups, communities and global populations. With this degree, graduates are qualified for leadership roles in a variety of healthcare environments.

"Faculty communicate extremely well, especially considering it's an online program. They offer a variety of ways to share information and foster relationships with our peers, which allows us to be successful. Kobey Trower, a 2019 graduate of the program, appreciated the experience of his peers and the collaborative nature of courses.

"All of the students were working full-time jobs," Trower said. "We had some people who worked in ICU, some in labor and delivery, others in clinic and research settings. The accessibility of the coursework helped us keep on the same page for group projects. It was super convenient for me to work full time and still have a life without being tieddown. That aspect of it helped keep my attention and keep me moving through the program."

Holder's experience as a student in the program has been first rate. She encourages any RN considering a four-year degree to explore OSU's program.

"Set up a meeting or a zoom call with a faculty or administrative member and give them the chance to provide information and answer questions that are of concern. That is what I did and it sold me. The faculty were so welcoming and flexible."



Healthcare is changing and nurses are at the forefront.

That's why Oklahoma Wesleyan University is proud to offer a doctoral program designed to help create tomorrow's nursing leaders today.

Rosa Ketchum, DNP, RN is an associate professor and director of the school of nursing's new DNP program.

"One thing that is exciting is just the role of the DNP," Ketchum said. "It's becoming more evident in view of the pandemic that nurses have a very important voice in health care and they are a huge piece of the puzzle and their experience and value and perspective on health care is needed to help address practice and policy development."

Designed for working adults, this program offers two doctoral learning pathways: a Post Master's DNP and the BSN to DNP.

The **Post Master's Pathway** enables Advanced Practice Nurses, Nurse Informaticists, Nurse Educators, Nurse Administrators, and other master's prepared specialty nurses to obtain a DNP in Executive Leadership. Additionally, BSN-prepared nurses with a master's degree in a related field may also enter this pathway.

Similarly, the **BSN to DNP Pathway** allows bachelor's prepared nurses to earn their doctorate of nursing practice.

Within this pathway, students choose a focus in either Nursing Administration or Nursing Education. OKWU has designed this curriculum for experienced nurses seeking terminal degrees in practice-focused areas. Moreover, OKWU prepares nurses to function as an advocate and leader, improving healthcare and patient outcomes through innovation and involvement in practice and policy.

Most importantly,
both pathways provide
graduates with advanced
practice skills to serve as
providers and organizers of the
healthcare delivery process, or as faculty
members in a nursing education program.

Translating that bedside knowledge and pairing it with evidence-based practice is the focus of the DNP program.

Ketchum completed her DNP in 2019.

"I wanted a degree that focused on patient outcomes. That's where my nursing heart is, helping the patient whether it's one patient or a population, I wanted to impact patient outcomes," Ketchum said.

"That is part of the focus of the DNP and I wanted a piece of that. I wanted to be better able to do that whether it be through teaching students or through direct patient care."

OKWU's Doctor of Nursing Practice in Executive Leadership program is designed to equip nurses to serve at the highest level of nursing practice. The DNP program develops nurse leaders who improve patient outcomes and health systems by

translating research into practice, all from a Christian worldview.

A new group of students begins each semester, three times a year. While most programs only accept advanced practice nurses, Oklahoma Wesleyan accepts any kind of master's prepared nurse.

"Their ideas and perspectives may be a little broader because we have nurses that are coming from an

administration background, or education background or advanced practice background so we're getting to see them all together," she said. "The perspective is broader than some programs but they all want to impact health care and they all want to make our health care system a little bit better."

Delivery of the **program is 100-percent online** with no required visits to campus. Classes are delivered one at a time, eight weeks in length.

"Our program is designed for the working adult and that's better facilitated because they are only taking one class at a time. For eight weeks they can focus on one class at a time and I think that helps them be able to balance life, work, family, school better than if they were in a more traditional semester setting," Ketchum said.

The BSN to DNP program is 54 credit hours with anticipation of three years to graduate. The post-master's DNP is 36 hours allowing for completion in roughly two years.

Simulation Suite Prepares OBU Alumna For Various Challenges of Pandemic

The simulation suite of **Oklahoma Baptist University's nursing program** is not only why Abbie Richardson came to OBU, but also why she has returned.

Richardson graduated from OBU in 2020 with a bachelor's degree in nursing and has returned to the School of Nursing as an Instructor of Nursing and the Director of Nursing Simulation.

"I started as a brand-new nurse during COVID, and it was the hardest thing I have ever done in my life," Richardson said. "People were so sick, and I was devastated by loss every day. I thought back to simulation so often during that time because the patients in the simulation lab prepared me to take care of my real patients that desperately needed safe nursing care."

More than that, the students' conversations with faculty in debriefing about caring for grieving families, holistic patient care, and the integration of faith into practice gave Richardson the tools she needed to survive as a nurse in the pandemic.

The simulation experiences enabled her to care for critically ill patients, cope with loss and challenges, and provide hope to others in the darkest of times.

"Without the foundation that our faculty The **OBU** and simulation program gave me, I don't think like a hospital.

I could have fought through the Pandemic alongside my fellow nurses," Richardson said. "That is why I returned as the simulation director at OBU."

OBU is not only preparing students for success in the classroom, but also equipping them for a meaningful career in the medical field.

Home to this cutting-edge OBU program is the **Jane E. and Nick K. Stavros Hall,** a 31,600-square-foot nursing education facility.

OBU's simulation suite has six functioning hospital rooms. The program's three standardized adult mannequins, birthing mother, and pediatric mannequins are the top-tier of high-fidelity simulators. They react like a real patient, capable of breathing, talking, sweating, bleeding and reacting to medications. These display vital signs such as blood pressure, pulse and respiration, preparing students for a full range of healthcare situations they will encounter as nurses. These mannequins are limitless in the disease processes they can portray, meaning faculty can place students in almost any nursing situation and expose them to more complex patient scenarios.

The **OBU** simulation lab is meant to function like a hospital.



During simulation experiences, students get to be the nurse. What is incredible about that is by the time they leave our program, they have spent over 70 hours in simulation thinking like a nurse, making the decisions, and providing patient care. The decisions they make regarding nursing care are their own and that is where the best learning happens. We have audio and visual technology within our simulation rooms that allow observing students to watch the scenario, while actively providing feedback and problem-solving with their peers.

After a scenario is complete, the students and faculty come together for a time of de-briefing.

Richardson said, "As faculty, this is where we see the lightbulbs go off and we get to watch them turn into compassionate, safe, and caring nurses. I owe so much to our simulation program, and I am thrilled to have a front row seat to the student transformations that take place in our program."

PREPARES NURSING GRADUATES FOR WORKFORCE

Nursing is a career that attracts graduating high school seniors but also provides a second career for those who are ready for a change.

Some students are ready to enter the field as young adults, but many people see the importance and value of nursing care through their own life experiences and then choose to make a career change.

Redlands Community College in El Reno, Okla., is not only preparing these students for a successful future in health care but also working to address the staffing shortage in rural and tribal health care facilities. The college received a grant that is providing more resources to expand programs designed to support and retain nursing students as well as implement educational programs to attract youth to the field.

With a **100% job placement rate**, Redlands offers a two-year degree program that prepares graduates to successfully take the National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX) for licensure as a registered nurse and to enter the workforce immediately.

"The benefit of earning an associate degree in nursing at Redlands is that graduates are well-prepared for the licensure exam that will allow them to begin working quickly," said Dr. Jalelah Abdul-Raheem, director of Redlands' Nursing Program. "Once they have completed this stage, they are able to focus on their career as a registered nurse or continue their education at a university to earn a bachelor's of nursing degree."

Redlands has two nursing program options: the **traditional RN program** and a track for **Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs)**. Students

who are enrolled in the LPN-to-RN cohort earn articulation credits in the first semester, allowing them to graduate in three semesters instead of four. This helps get them out of the classroom and into the community where they can do the most good.

From a young age, Redlands nursing graduate Cory Michael Williamson knew he wanted to be a nurse. His life had been impacted by a nurse who cared for his father after a terrible car wreck. "When my father was in the hospital, there was a male nurse who really showed kindness and compassion to me during that time," Williamson said.

Since graduating from Redlands, Williamson has worked in different intensive care units while he pursued a bachelor's degree at Oklahoma Panhandle State University, and now he serves as a nursing supervisor in a tribal health clinic. Williamson said his experience at Redlands taught him to look beyond a patient's diagnosis. He learned "to get to know my patients and their families to help them in more ways than just what they came to the hospital or clinic for."

Redlands is a solid, affordable choice for students because of the scholarships available as well as the personal attention and opportunities it provides. The college's partnerships with several area health facilities provide students with challenging, hands-on experience during their clinical rotations.

"Fortunately, our location just outside of Oklahoma City gives our students the opportunity to serve in both rural and urban areas, exposing them to the different types of nursing care available and helping them figure out what is the best fit for them" Abdul-Raheem said.

Alyssa Rapoport chose nursing because she wanted to be able to help others on their worst days and celebrate with them on their best days during recovery. A 2021 graduate, Rapoport appreciated Redlands' convenient location, affordability and caring faculty, especially Professor Kayla Zimmerman.

"She was always there to listen and support me and my classmates," Rapoport said. "I felt like she was someone who respected the students as much as we were taught to respect the staff."

With a Cooperative Arrangement Development Grant from Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institutions (NASNTI) Part A to support outreach and retention efforts and additional funding to update campus simulation labs, the Redlands Nursing Program is providing a high-quality learning experience led by dedicated and well-trained faculty.

"At Redlands, everyone is friendly, and the faculty is excited to be part of students' lives," said Abdul-Raheem. "We are committed to helping our nursing students succeed, and our faculty and staff are dedicated to supporting them throughout their time in the program."

The five-year cooperative grant is designed for Native American and low-income students and is 100% funded by the U.S. Department of Education as part of the NASNTI program.

Nurses Find Home at OHH

A bucket list.

For most, it's a lofty list of things that one day in the future they would like to accomplish.

For nurses and staff at Oklahoma Heart Hospital, the bucket list is a way of life.

"One of the things Oklahoma Heart Hospital is exceptional with is fostering employee culture," said Cindy Miller, RN, MSN, Director of Transformation for OHH. "We have several things in place that assure peoples' opinion matters and nurses have the ability to make change."

The bucket list was developed 18 years ago.

"It's basically a tool that any nurse can put forth of suggestion, comment or complaint and it is reviewed by hospital executives every day. If possible, we make whatever the proposed change is," Miller said. "If it's not something that can be done we let people know why it can't be done at this time and if there's a possibility in the future."

"Over the years it has evolved."

From stocking banana popsicles to new patient safety initiatives, the bucket list has brought forth change throughout the halls of OHH.

"I think it's just a marvelous tool

for people giving feedback and knowing their opinion matters," Miller said. "I think nurses want to take good care of patients. That's why they went into the profession. They see they are able to take care of patients because they have input and they don't have to tolerate what they might feel like are inappropriate policies and procedures that are a barrier to good patient care."

This physician-owned hospital was designed by cardiologists to ensure that patients receive expert, individualized care with utmost comfort. OHH is the first of its kind in Oklahoma and the first all-digital hospital in the United States.

And nurses feel not only a sense of purpose but a sense of ownership.

"I do believe it is because they have a voice in patient care as well as in the workplace," Miller said of the hospital's retention rates. "The patient is the center and that's important for nurses to know they are making a difference. We do have the best nurse-to-patient ratios probably in the nation. That's a big commitment to allow for better patient care and job satisfaction on the part of nursing."


A flexible work schedule is another bonus when it comes to advancing one's degree at OHH. Tuition reimbursement and advanced certifications are two more bonuses.

"We celebrate achievement and progress throughout the profession academically," Miller said. "We also hire many students who are working on their basics to get into a professional program or who are in a program. We have a very robust nurse extern

program where we take a large number of nurse externs twice a year. We have a very high retention rate with those externs.

Quite simply, OHH is a place where nurses stay.

"Our mission is serving the state and leading the nation," Miller said. "We are a small hospital but we serve every county in Oklahoma and many of the surrounding states. We've also had patients from other countries who have chosen our hospital. I think it goes without saying this is the place to



work if you want to take good care of people."

And most nurses want that on their bucket list.

Getting ready for nursing college Can be easier than you think

Graduating High School? Thinking about college? There's so much to consider when it comes to getting ready for college: where to go, what to study, how to apply, how to pay for it all, and more.

It's never too early-or too late—to explore your options for

college. Inside this Guide are some key steps in preparing for college and resources that can help you along the way. You'll have to take the time to research and understand your options, but you don't have to do it alone. This Guide Can Help!

Why go to college?

More money, more job options, and more freedom. With less than a high school diploma the average income is just over \$34,000 per year. With an Associates degree your earnings jump to more than \$58,000 per year and \$75,000 with a Bachelor's

degree. Earnings soar ever higher with a Master's and/or Doctoral Degree at over \$100,000 per year.

Checklist.

As a student or the parent of a student about to start college, the following checklists will help you get ready.



- 1. Work hard all the way to graduation—second-semester grades can tell you about deadlines, other aid can affect scholarship eligibility.
- 2. Stay involved in after-school activities, and seek leadership roles if possible.
- 3. As soon as possible after its Oct. 1 release, complete and submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®), at fafsa.gov, along with any other financial aid applications your chosen school(s) may require. You should submit your FAFSA® by



the earliest financial aid deadline of the schools to which you are applying, usually by early February.

- 4. After you submit the FAFSA, you should receive your Student Aid Report (SAR) within three days to three weeks. This document lists your answers to the questions on your FAFSA and gives you some basic information about your aid eligibility. Quickly make any necessary corrections and submit them to the FAFSA processor.
- 5. If you haven't done so already, register for and take the standardized tests required for college admission. Check with the colleges you are interested in to see what tests they require. pply to the colleges you have chosen. Prepare your applications carefully. Follow the instructions, and PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO **DEADLINES!**
- 6. Well before your college application deadlines, ask your counselor and teachers to submit the required documents (e.g., transcript, letters of recommendation) to the colleges to which you're applying.
 - 7. Complete any last scholarship applications.
 - 8. Visit colleges that have invited you to enroll.
- 9. Review your college acceptances and compare the colleges' financial aid offers.
- 10. Contact a school's financial aid office if you have questions about the aid that school has offered you. In fact, getting to know your financial aid staff early is a good idea no matter what-they

for which you might wish to apply, and important paperwork you might need to submit.

- 11. When you decide which school you want to attend, notify that school of your commitment and submit any required financial deposit. Many schools require this notification and deposit by May 1st.

Harding's nursing graduates are well-equipped to enter the field, with high job placement rates and a 97.3% first-time Family Nurse Practitioner National Certification pass rate since the program's first graduates in 2017.

The first of its kind in Arkansas, the master's entry into professional nursing program prepares graduates for eligibility to take the national licensing exam to become Registered Nurses. The program provides on-campus, state-of-the-art simulations and diverse clinical experiences in Searcy, Little Rock and surrounding areas to aid students in understanding patient clinical skills, administration and leadership in nursing. Applicants with any undergraduate degree can apply. There are Arkansas nursing prerequisites.

What if I have a degree in another field but have decided healthcare is my passion? The Master of Science



in nursing – master's entry into professional nursing option is a great path for students who already have a bachelor's degree in another area of study. The accelerated Bachelor of Science in nursing in Northwest Arkansas is a good option as well.

How do the programs interact with the community? Students assist in a variety of community clinical settings that serve diverse patient populations. They also provide health screenings at area churches and various Universitysponsored events.

Does Harding offer a study abroad program? For more than 40 years, Harding has been training nurses for careers not only in traditional healthcare settings but also in health missions.

Nursing Pioneers: WOSC a leader in SW Oklahoma

Diane Fairchild, MSN, RN had a recent conversation with a former graduate.

A smile crossed her face as the graduate related heartfelt thanks for the learning opportunities he had received at Western Oklahoma State College.

And by the time the school's nursing program director finished the conversation, she had a volunteer for IV skills lab day walking down the hall to meet with their former instructor.

"He wanted to be a part of that because he felt like he had received an excellent education here and he loved nursing and wanted to give back to the students by letting them stick his arm," Fairchild said. "He appreciated the relationship that he had developed with his instructors and they were so caring and kind to him that he just wanted to give back."

"It's a wonderful feeling, very fulfilling."

It's stories like these that keep Fairchild and her faculty going. Western Oklahoma State has one of the only ADN programs in southwest Oklahoma and has three campuses.

Established as Altus Junior College in 1926, it is the oldest original municipal two-year college still in existence in Oklahoma.

The Nursing Program at Western Oklahoma State College was established in 1981 and has an outstanding success rate for preparing qualified nurses.

The WOSC nursing program is offered at three campus sites: Altus, Lawton, and Elk City. Western's ADN program has several program tracks.

Face-to-face classes for both general and advanced standing entry students are available as well as online classes with a face-to-face clinical component for advanced standing students. Students in the face-to-face track are able to take daytime classes at all three campuses.

"One of our major goals is to meet the needs of Altus and the surrounding areas by having a high-quality nursing program and having nurses go into our communities and stay and help with the nursing needs of the people in that community," Fairchild said.

One of the school's most popular programs is the online LPN-to-RN track.

"We even have students coming from Texas and Oklahoma City," she said. "With this program and testing you can complete the program in one year and still be able to work as an LPN while you are completing the program."

NCLEX pass rates for the LPN to RN have exceeded the national average for the past two years.

"I feel like we have excellent support with our clinical sites, the different hospitals in the area that allow us to do clinicals there," Fairchild said. "We have excellent clinical adjunct instructors that provide very good clinical teaching to our students where they can really build on their bedside skills and bedside interaction with patients. They really build upon their ability to care and give compassion to patients."

Fairchild said oftentimes clinical instructors are employed at the facilities where clinicals occur which only adds to the learning



"They know what they need and are able to teach that to the students. A lot of our hospitals do nurse intern programs during the summer and it's very beneficial to the student and it's beneficial to the school because they're continuing their education through work in the summer," Fairchild said. "The students are getting to know the nurses there and developing relationships and when they graduate and become nurses a lot of times they are hired in those facilities and help with the nursing shortage."

Springtime is always an exciting time for healthcare facilities in and around campus.

"I know they say it's very difficult to find RNs to come to southwest Oklahoma so they're always thankful when it comes to graduation time and they know some of those RNs are going to be able to stay in that area," Fairchild said.

And some even come back to their alma mater to pay it forward.

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
In 2019, construction began on a state-of-theart addition to the main hospital at Stillwater Medical. The new three-story addition would add much needed surgical suites, an updated labor and delivery unit to include 14 birthing suites, and expansion of the Intensive Care Unit.

In early 2022, the original plans were updated when Stillwater Medical President & CEO Denise Webber announced that the hospital would also be elevating newborn care by adding a Level II NICU in partnership with Oklahoma Children's Hospital as part of the Women's Health Center expansion. This addition would allow Stillwater Medical to care for babies born as early as 32 weeks and those that require extra care, such as breathing and feeding support and IV medications. The NICU will include 10 beds, a nursery, 2 family sleep rooms, a waiting area, hospitality room, and bereavement room.

"Not only will the addition of a newborn intensive care unit at Stillwater Medical help keep babies closer to home, it will also allow Oklahoma Children's Level IV NICU to have room for the most critical cases. This is important for families in Stillwater and surrounding areas," said Pediatrician Melinda Webb M.D. "The addition means that families can stay together and be closer to home. And we know that this increases positive outcomes for babies and mothers. Bonding, breast feeding rates, and healing all improve when families can be together."

Trent E. Tipple, M.D., F.A.A.P., chief of neonatology at Oklahoma Children's Hospital and chief of neonatal-perinatal medicine at OU College of Medicine explained that premature babies often must be sent out of state because there are simply not enough NICU beds to keep Oklahoma families together. The 98-bed Level IV NICU at Oklahoma Children's Hospital is frequently operating at maximum capacity.

Level IV NICUs offer the most comprehensive care to the most seriously ill newborns needing complex medical and surgical care. Tipple said Oklahoma Children's Hospital receives many patients from Stillwater Medical and surrounding hospitals who need Level II care, underscoring



how the creation of a Level II NICU at Stillwater Medical makes perfect sense.

The Stillwater Medical Foundation quickly jumped to the task of assisting the hospital with the funding of the new NICU. Understanding the need and the funds required to make a Stillwater NICU a reality, Stillwater based OnCue knew they wanted to help and contributed the single largest gift in history to Stillwater Medical of \$1,000,000.

OnCue President, Laura Aufleger said, "We knew our gift would make the NICU a reality and our commitment would have an impact on children and families in Oklahoma for decades to come. Our stores have been serving the Stillwater area for 55 years, and I am beyond grateful that we can make this investment to save lives in our community."

Michal Shaw, Stillwater Medical Foundation Executive Director explained that along with the historic gift, OnCue will have the sole naming rights to the NICU.

"Stillwater Medical and the Stillwater Medical Foundation are grateful for OnCue's vision and generous investment in Stillwater and all of north central Oklahoma," said Shaw. "We are excited to say that the OnCue Neonatal ICU is scheduled to open in the spring of 2024."

nursing's future

When Julie Hoff, PhD, MPH, RN, first stepped into her role as dean of the University of Oklahoma Fran and Earl Ziegler College of Nursing, she understood the need for nurses in Oklahoma. "I needed to build relationships and understand priorities," Hoff said of her first order of business. "You can't address big complex problems alone. As the flagship college of nursing, I am responsible for nursing workforce development in Oklahoma and regionally.

So Hoff decided to take a three-pronged approach. The first was to build academic programs that aligned with the health sector's needs. From there, Hoff focused on building and strengthening the nurse workforce through enrollment and established academic pathways that advanced the education of practicing nurses.

Finally, she aligned the college with other sectors through strategic partnerships to drive change and influence policy.

The approach was dubbed OK-WINS, which stands for Workforce Innovation in Nursing, and healthcare entities and nursing students throughout the region are reaping the benefits.

"Addressing the nursing workforce shortage takes coordinated efforts of many with the goals of increasing the number of nurse faculty, supporting students through academic success programs and scholarships, and strengthen the nursing education infrastructure," Hoff said. "We have to collaborate across the state and work together with a unified vision of all that is necessary to strengthen the nursing workforce and how doing so will improve the quality of care and health outcomes for all patients." There is little doubt of the vital role nurses play in

keeping our families, friends, and communities safe and healthy. Nurses are indeed the oxygen of the healthcare system and the impact they have on society is significant.

"Often on the frontlines of crisis, it is nurses who provide unconquerable spirit, clinical expertise, revolutionary thinking, and healing needed to rally those around them," Hoff said. "We saw this during the pandemic when nurses were involved in changing how care was delivered; nurses created many new products and processes, and nurses found solutions to connect patients to their loved ones." That's the everyday focus for Hoff and OU. In the last few months,

OU has announced a number of exciting partnerships to reach that goal.

Most recently, USAO and Murray State partnered with OU to create a pathway to nursing through a direct entry program. Murray State Associate degree nursing graduates can now complete a baccalaureate degree in nursing online at OU.

OU also established a Nurse Intern Program that supports clinical education through paid internships. More than 400 nursing students have participated, and practice partners report a narrowing of the academic-practice gap and improved recruitment and retention post-licensure.

OU has also added new nurse practitioner programs to meet

specialty care needs in neonatology and mental health.

Just a few months ago, Hoff announced partnerships with Norman Regional Hospital and Duncan Regional Hospital to increase access to OU nursing education by opening programs at those locations.

The expansion adds to the college's existing locations that offer the traditional BSN – the OU Health Sciences Center in Oklahoma City, the OU-Tulsa Schusterman Center, and Cameron University in Lawton.

"At OU, OK-WINs means we collaborate to build and strengthen the nursing workforce," Hoff said. "Last year OU committed to accept all qualified candidates to our baccalaureate nursing program, increasing prelicensure enrollment by 103 students and overall total enrollment by 185 students.

Hoff pointed out this year's incoming prelicensure nursing class — which has grown from 341 students in Fall 2021 to 439 students in Fall 2022 — is the largest it has ever been.

Tapping multiple resources, OU established the **Degree Accelerator Program**, a tuition-free, workforce investment program for practicing nurses to **earn a BSN**, **MSN**, **DNP or PhD degree**.

"This program dismantled financial, social, and attitudinal barriers to enable practicing nurses to advance academically and professionally, thus positioning them to exercise their knowledge and power to transform care and improve health outcomes for all Oklahomans," Hoff said.

That partnership across sectors is helping to drive synergistic change, influence policy to modernize nursing regulation, and foster collaboration to ensure sustained investment in nursing education.

"To ease the nursing shortage in Oklahoma it takes all of us working together innovating, integrating, and strengthening academic programming, workforce development, and policy," Hoff said. And it's all been a part of the plan.

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Kramer School of Nursing

Offering Wide Variety of Career Opportunities



Oklahoma City University's Kramer School of Nursing continues to implement opportunities that enhance the future of its students, staff and faculty.

One such venture is the Saints and to a good start. Stars Partnership.

Saints and Stars is a five-year agreement between SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital and Oklahoma City University's Kramer School of Nursing. The partnership allows OCU students to work part-time with SSM Health while they complete their nursing degree, while also receiving a \$3,500 annual scholarship from SSM Health and a \$5,000 annual discount from OCU.

In addition to employment and financial benefits, the partnership will allow OCU nursing students the opportunity to take part in clinical rotations at SSM Health; to engage in paid leadership clinical hours; to participate in a summer nurse extern program; to complete service-learning hours at SSM Health; and to be assigned a nurse mentor.

In addition, up to two SSM Health employees may enroll in OCU's Master of Science in Nursing Education program. OCU will reciprocate by emphasizing the hiring of the program's SSM Health graduates to serve as clinical adjuncts to supervise Stars and Saints students completing their rotations at SSM Health.

"As one of the nation's leading nursing education programs, we are invested in helping address the nursing shortage," OCU President Kenneth Evans said.

Casey Cassidy, PhD, RN, CMSRN, CHSE, Associate Dean & Associate Professor School of Nursing said the Saints and Stars program has gotten off

"So far, really well, our students are just very appreciative of the financial assistance, but also the opportunity to, you know, gain more experience while they're in," Cassidy said.

The Kramer School of Nursing also focuses on Community Based Public Health which positions KSN to meet the future health care delivery needs of individuals within the context of population focused

Nurses interested in a Doctor of Nursing Practice degree with a Community Based Public Health (CBPH) focus are typically employed in non-acute care settings such as public health departments, school health settings, faith-based health programs, occupational health clinics, volunteer health organizations, community health centers, and outpatient care clinics.

These degrees are designed to provide advanced nursing education through the synthesis of nursing and public health theory applied to promoting and preserving the health of populations.

"We have a well-established Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) program and a Doctor of Nursing Practice program," said Toni Frioux, DNP, APRN-CNP, FNP-BC, CNE.

Associate Professor School of Nursing.

Nurses with a CBPH focus are ideally positioned to help achieve prevention-oriented care by addressing: • The social determinants of health • Increasing access to care across the care continuum Engaging systems facilitators and identifying barriers
 Bridge delivery of health care needs in the community • Strengthen diversity among the nursing workforce

Frioux said the advanced CBPH leader will be provided the tools to improve the populations health to prevent problems from happening or recurring, limit health disparities, promote healthcare equity, quality, and accessibility by exploring the application of public health actions through nursing practice.

"There's increasing awareness that we need to do something about the extensive amount of dollars that are spent in acute care, disease treatment at the end of life and, so we really need to change that paradigm where we are doing more health promotion and disease prevention services so that we are helping people maintain their health longer and keeping them out of those expensive hospital-based services

to capitalize on saving dollars," she said.

The Doctor of Nursing Practice, community based public health track is designed for advanced nurses with careers in non-acute care settings who already hold a master's degree in nursing, master's in public health, or similar master's degree. The program is 32-credit

Frioux said the Master of Science in Nursing degree with a CBPH focus is a good fit for nurses with a minimum of a bachelor's degree who are interested in applying and integrating public health science into their nursing skill set to improve the health of the community and the population through out-patient practice settings.

Kramer School of Nursing's Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and Doctor of Nursing Practice Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner (DNP-AGACNP) students collaborated with Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT) students to care for a client in the acutecare setting while focusing on patient safety, teamwork, and communication.

In January 2023, the Kramer School of Nursing joined the Physician Assistant Program and Physical Therapy Program in viewing the OCU's theater department performance.

After the performance, breakout sessions with students from all three departments were led in an interprofessional discussion.

"We had a great response, and we had over 100 students that participated," Frioux said. "We had the theater students. In addition to that, who actually read the play. It just gave us an opportunity to introduce in a very different way some of the concepts that we have to deal with in healthcare."



"I appreciated the flexibility of the online program - I was running a COVID-19 + only unit in the middle of a pandemic, working two jobs and raising two kids while trying to get my B.S.," she said. "The online program at UCO provided the flexibility I need that allowed me to work when I could. At UCO, I knew the standards I would be held to would help make me a better nurse and stronger leader."



For those who have earned a traditional bachelor's degree in another field and are ready for a career in nursing, Central's Fast Track in nursing is for them. Upon successful completion, students will have earned a B.S. in nursing. The fast-track program can be completed in just 16 months and provides the flexibility of hybrid courses.

Garrett Collins graduated from Central's fast-track program in 2022, he currently works as a nurse resident at Integris Baptist in the transplant ICU. For Collins, the clinical opportunities available gave him first-hand insight into hospital culture and specialties. "Having the opportunity to do clinical hours at different hospitals across the metro prepared me for deciding where to apply for work," he said. The clinical rotations also helped me learn how to apply the skills I was learning in class to real life."

Online M.S. in Nursing

The Master of Science in nursing degree program at UCO offers working RNs flexibility through fully online courses with both partand full-time options available. The program can be completed in as little as 16 months, if pursued full time. The online Master of Science in nursing can be completed for as little as \$15,000. Nursing graduate students

Kiersten Snider is a registered nurse at OU Children's Hospital in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Ranger Pride Northwestern grows healers

Leslie Collins, DNP, MS, RN still remembers the conversation with her Northwestern Oklahoma State University mentor.

"They said you educate every day and I think you could make a difference in students' lives," Collins recalls.

From there, she took a job in her alma mater's nursing program skills lab. Thirteen years later, she's chair of Northwestern Oklahoma State's Charles Morton Share Trust Division of Nursing.

And she couldn't be more proud of the impact her faculty has on students.

"I love it because of our ability to make a difference, to be one-on-one with the student and really help them," Collins said. "I stay here because of the faculty and our administration. Our administration's support is like no other."

"It was a starting point for me and I love being that starting point for students."

We hope this, and have seen in the past, will translate into what type of nurse they become."

Collins said many Northwestern students go on to practice in rural settings, but others go on to larger facilities.

There's a common thread in the employer feedback Collins receives.

"They speak on how well-prepared our graduates are," Collins said. "Also, they speak about how professional they are, how caring they are and how they work well with the teams. Not only are they a good nurse, prepared and ready for patient care but they're also good team members and ready to make a difference in the nursing world."

Collins said the university is looking at expanding its offering to help meet existing needs throughout

healthcare, in whatever setting that may be.

"I feel like we do a really good job of ensuring students put patients and their families first and we also include how to have self care as a nurse and how important that is," Collins said. "For so long, it's been all about the patient and the client and it should continue to be, but we also have to remember we have to care for ourselves as well."

New Admission Criteria

In our nearly 55-year history, OSU-OKC has committed itself to providing high-quality nursing education to help meet the workforce demands of the Oklahoma City Metropolitan Area and the state. Future applicants to the program will notice a new pre-admission testing process and points structure, moving away from costly pre-admission testing requirements for students and placing a larger emphasis on science GPA, which has been revealed as the most consistent predictor of student success for graduation and successfully passing the NCLEX-RN licensure examination.

Career Ladder & Traditional

OSU-OKC welcomes LPNs and Paramedics looking for a pathway to being eligible for Registered Nurse licensure. With proof of active, state licensure and required prerequisite courses, LPNs and Paramedics will complete a transition course, then the final two courses in the program. Upon successful completion of the transition course, students are awarded 17 credit hours of advanced standing credit for their licensure. The coursework for this pathway is provided online. Simulation Center

This decreases student anxiety and boosts student confidence in their ability to care for patients.

Interprofessional Simulation

OSU-OKC nursing students, OSU-OKC paramedicine students, OSU-OKC diagnostic imaging, and OSU-Center for Health Sciences resident physicians come together to rescue, triage, and treat patients with a variety of injuries and illnesses. The goal is for these different groups to learn to work together as they will in the actual healthcare arena. Student volunteers and staff take on the role of patients and may simulate suffering anything from a traumatic injury requiring being rescued by our paramedic students to a mental health crisis and any other healthcare emergency in between. Not only do students learn to work together as a team, but they will also learn to prioritize care based on the severity of the simulated patient.


