someone, and it makes you feel good," George said. "You know how you've changed somebody's life and helped them. Especially if they've been here a day or so, I feel I've made an impact with my personality or something I've done for them by being thorough or extra caring."

She was a licensed practical nurse for six years and became a registered nurse in 2020. She graduated from OSU/OKC during the COVID-19 pandemic. A lot of her coursework was online except for her clinical studies with SSM Health and INTEGRIS Health hospitals.

She was loving her work in orthopedic surgery when a friend persuaded her to apply at Community Hospital in 2021. George knew that nursing is a diverse career offering a variety of opportunities. And she hopes to explore those different areas of nursing throughout her career. She likes that healthcare is diverse for recruitment reasons during a shortage of registered nurses. They can teach or work in different departments such as case management.

"There's so many areas of nursing that you have to find what's right for you," she explained.

Nurses fresh out of school can expect to work alongside a mentor or

preceptor for a 90-day period. There are some things a nursing student will not be taught in school that they can learn on the floor, George said.

"Me, I'm very tactile. I want to

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tough it out and do it myself. So, they get the opportunity to fully delve into that for their 90 days," she said. "So, they are more comfortable when taking patients on their own. It's safer for the patients than just having someone brand new from nursing school."

George said the staff is what impresses her the most about Community Hospital, especially the way they care for patients from the moment they check in for surgery and leave for home, George said.

Because of her soft spot for people, George has always been an empathetic person.

"I definitely feel like it has made me stronger," she said.

George is not naive to the circle of life. Life is valuable, she said.

"Nursing makes you realize that, especially if you're having a bad day

when you see what you go through sometimes or in other places, people fighting for their lives and things like that, it makes you more positive about being appreciative about every day."


nursing staff to enjoy. She signed the card, "To George and staff."

"We like to shop and hang out with our friends. We'll go out and have a nice dinner. But the pool right now is important. It's too hot outside."

# CAREERS IN NURSING:

## PREPARED FOR EMERGENCIES - ER NURSE ENJOYS VARIETY AND TEAM SPIRIT

One-on-one patient contact is what Tracy Allison loves about being a nurse. The well-seasoned LPN is a clinic nurse at Mercy Clinic Primary Care - Guthrie Academy, located on the campus of Mercy Hospital Logan County.

"I like it when I find someone that I'm able to help, maybe that has a special need," Allison said. "I will go above and beyond to help take care of that for a patient."

Allison said she was very quiet and shy in high school before becoming a nurse.

She has gained self-confidence. During nursing school, she realized that opportunities would present themselves through learning.

Since graduating from a 12-month nursing program at High Plains Technology Center in Woodward, Allison's career has been rich in a variety of nursing experiences. Many years were spent working at what became AllianceHealth Woodward.

She worked 10 years there as a scrub nurse in surgery helping to set up the surgical procedures.

Her career has also involved skilled nursing, radiology, anesthesiology, and two years at a smaller rural hospital in Alva. There was a nursing shortage at that time, too. So, Allison learned a variety of surgical skills in Alva before the role of a licensed practical nurse became more limited regarding patient care. Allison had done a lot of things that an LPN today would not do.

"The types of surgeries I did, working in the emergency room, ICU, helping put in PICC lines, there's a lot of things I did that they have limited LPNs to do now," she said.

She loved the surgical aspects of nursing but found the hours too demanding to blend with her family life when she and her husband were raising their

children. Due to staffing shortages, she was on call every other night.

"So, we would get called out and work during the night and have to turn around and be there for surgery in the morning," Allison said.

But being a nurse offers her options. She discovered clinical nursing back in Woodward, and it allowed her to be home in the evenings with her family when most moms were home. She didn't have to work nights, weekends, and holidays. But she would sometimes work in the ER and ICU during staffing shortages.

"There are nursing shortages everywhere, but it's really hard in the rural areas. Schools aren't necessarily available, so there's a lot of challenges," she explained. "I've got to see people with a lot of different backgrounds, economics, different races, different religions. As a nurse I've got to see amazing cool things, both good and bad.

I've got to be there when babies were born, and I've also held the hand of people when they died and had to comfort their family, she said. "I've done things where it's routine on a clinic day, but I've also done codes on patients, and helped with traumas like when the tornado hit Woodward."

Eventually, her career took her to Edmond where she was a supervisor of a large clinic. But being a supervisor, she wanted to have more contact with patients. She enjoys her conversations with them.

She and her husband live their country life just outside of Guthrie. Their children are now adults. And Allison likes working in smaller rural areas. So, Mercy Clinic Primary Care - Guthrie Academy became a perfect fit.

"The lady that's the manager here — I've worked with her before — she is very kind and a hard

worker," Allison said. "I really admire her, and I wanted to be more involved in the community I actually live in."

Each area of nursing has been meaningful in her life. Mercy Clinic Primary Care has opened another door to humanity. While working with Dr. Jacob Fisher and Angela Corrine Baustert, APRN-CNP, Allison meets people of all ages, including pediatric work.

During her career, both joyful and sad experiences have made her who she is today.

"I think I'm a much stronger

person. I've learned to stick-up for what is right," she said.

She tells students who have shadowed her through the years to do a good job and work hard, and that having good morals and scruples are important.

"And it's not just when someone's watching," she said. "You need to find it in yourself to do what's right."

She takes care of herself by gardening and reading. Allison spends a lot of time with her adult children and grandchildren.

During COVID she and her husband discovered kayaking. It's a physical activity where she can go out in the quiet and relax.

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# OSU's RN to BSN program offers convenience, flexibility

*Oklahoma State University RN to BSN student Sage Holder had long known she was interested in a healthcare career. When two of the most important people in her life – her grandfather and mother – received a cancer diagnosis in the same week during her first year of college, her career path came into focus.*

“I knew I wanted to be in the healthcare system. I just didn’t know exactly where or what that was going to look like when I started college. I knew I wanted to be successful, a person that others needed, and to care for the sick,” Holder recalls.

Holder began taking pre-medicine classes but during the second semester of her freshman year, she had what she calls an “aha” moment.

“I was either in class or in the hospital, spending time with my family during my grandpa’s chemo treatments or my mom’s cancer appointments. I began to notice the nurses. I wanted to be the person that the patient could look to for a smile, a laugh, or a shoulder to cry on.”

Confident in her decision to pursue nursing, Holder completed prerequisite courses and went on to earn an associate degree in May 2021 and become a Registered Nurse (RN). She landed a job at the Emergency Room at Stillwater Medical Center.

Ready to continue her education by pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Nursing, Holder found the perfect fit in OSU’s fully online RN to BSN program.

“I knew the program would offer flexibility with my lifestyle and allow me to continue working as an RN while taking classes,” Holder said. “The faculty have been approachable and easy to reach and to communicate with. I feel like they want me to succeed.”

OSU’s RN to BSN program, which launched in Fall 2017 and is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE), provides students with a convenient and flexible option to complete their bachelor’s degree in as little as one year.

OSU students expand their professional nursing knowledge from practical, foundational skills they learned during their associate degree, learning the why behind past education.

“Our students are challenged with a wide array of topics that range from leadership and current trends in nursing to global, cultural and public health, as well as nursing theory,” RN to BSN program director Dr. Alana Cluck said.

Ultimately, the mission of the RN to BSN program is to prepare nurses to practice professional nursing that meets the dynamic



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health care needs of individuals, families, groups, communities and global populations. With this degree, graduates are qualified for leadership roles in a variety of healthcare environments.

OSU’s RN to BSN program enjoys a 100 percent satisfaction rate among its graduates. Faculty offer personalized attention and are committed to student success.

“Faculty communicate extremely well, especially considering it’s an online program. They offer a variety of ways to share information and foster relationships with our peers, which allows us to be successful. It’s easy to have a positive experience when you feel your efforts are not only noticed, but also celebrated,” RN to BSN graduate Lacy Smith said.

Kobey Trower, a 2019 graduate of the program, appreciated the experience of his peers and the collaborative nature of courses.

“All of the students were working full-time jobs,” Trower said. “We had some people who worked in ICU, some in labor and delivery, others in clinic and research settings. The accessibility of the coursework helped us keep on the same page for group projects. It was super convenient for me to work full time and still have a life without being tied down. That aspect of it helped keep my attention and keep me moving through the program.”

Holder’s experience as a student in the program has been first rate. She encourages any RN considering a four-year degree to explore OSU’s program.

“Set up a meeting or a zoom call with a faculty or administrative member and give them the chance to provide information and answer questions that are of concern. That is what I did and it sold me. The faculty were so welcoming and flexible.”

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

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
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# Nurse Practitioner Kayla Birchfield to Care for Patients in Hometown

Birchfield said she's most excited about: "I live just a few blocks from the clinic, so I'll be able to walk to work to see my patients."



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
