

TRADITIONAL TRACK COORDINATOR CREDITS MOM FOR INSPIRATION

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Cody Wilkerson credits his mom's life journey as an inspiration for him wanting to pursue a nursing career.

Wilkerson is a full-time faculty member of the Department of Nursing at the University of Central Oklahoma, and serves as the Traditional (Nursing) Track Coordinator.

"My mom (Cathy Maynard) is a nurse, and so I grew up hearing her experiences and seeing how much of an impact it made on us as a family," said Wilkerson, MSN, RN, CPN. "She went back to school. She was a nontraditional student, and it just totally changed our family's trajectory. And just seeing how much of a benefit that kind of was for her and for us, it just felt like, "You know I think all signs are pointing towards nursing instead of this med school business."

Wilkerson came to UCO as an undergraduate student from Antlers.

"I moved up here for college right after high school and have just never left. I've almost quite literally never left UCO. I've kind of been involved either as a student or in some other role almost for the last 12 years," he said.

Wilkerson started out as a premed major before switching to nursing.

"I started undergraduate as a premed major and then got a job in the hospital while I was in college," he said. "And that pretty much shifted my perspective. I think what nurses are actually doing is what drew me to medicine. I loved the relationship aspect, building relationships with your patients and getting to know them."

Wilkerson graduated in 2017 with his undergraduate degree, and then took a job at Oklahoma Children's Hospital working on the surgical unit.

"We take care of head-to-toe surgery, so it could be neuro, or ortho, or urology. I mean, we see them all," he said. That was my first job. I did that for a year. I was a night shift nurse."

Wilkerson continued his educational push receiving his M.S., Nursing, With Honors from UCO in 2020. He is pursuing his Doctorate of Nursing Practice as a Pediatric

Primary Care Nurse Practitioner from the University of South Alabama, with plans to graduate in Fall 2026.

"A master's in nursing education always kind of feels like a good idea, so I started back really quickly after I took just a year off of school and then was back at UCO again," he said. "I kept working at the hospital full-time. I graduated in May of 2020 with my master's in nursing education. I started with UCO as a full-time faculty in fall of 2020."

Students interested in earning a degree in nursing from the University of Central Oklahoma now have multiple options for their education. The core of the program is the traditional four-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing however there is a five-year plan for program completion available.

"At UCO we have four different paths in nursing," Wilkerson said. "We have both our traditional and our fast-track programs. Those are for students who are not licensed and who are getting a baccalaureate degree in nursing. We also have our online RNDBS program for nurses that are already certified or licensed, and then we have a master's program. We have a coordinator for each of those tracks. I coordinate the traditional undergraduate track (program)."

As the Traditional Track Coordinator, Wilkerson said his role is more behind-the-scenes.

"They (students) don't really see me as the traditional track coordinator afterwards necessarily, because a lot of my work has kind of been behind the scenes," he said. "A lot of my job is continued maintenance of those (nursing) programs. I am chairperson of our Traditional Track committee, so that's all the faculty

that teach in the traditional track."

Wilkerson, who also works as a Clinical RN, Oklahoma Children's Hospital, said he enjoys being a male nurse, and learning from his fellow UCO nursing faculty members.

"I definitely grew up being taught that women are capable of anything. And for me, it's been incredible to be mentored by, especially as a faculty member, to be mentored by this incredibly intelligent, smart, capable group of women," he said. "That to me, I think there's just something really cool about that, the ability to do that, to see that despite what some of these prejudices that may exist in society towards any field that's sort of predominantly female, there is hard evidence that these women are capable of anything they set their minds to."

Northern Oklahoma College going strong

Northern Oklahoma College nursing turns half a century this year and the success keeps coming.

• The associate degree nursing program at Northern Oklahoma College is accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN).

NOC offers programs at the Tonkawa, Enid, and Stillwater campuses.

Under the direction of Dr. Nikole Hicks, NOC Nursing Division Chair, the program is rigorous and innovative.

Academic Practice Partnership opportunities are available for select students in Tonkawa, Enid, Stillwater, and Tulsa with paid clinical internships in the final semester of the nursing program.

Graduates of NOC's nursing program earn an Associate degree in Applied Science and are eligible to apply for licensure as a registered nurse. There is an entry pathway for current LPNs to enter the program with advanced standing.

NOC partners with several RN-BSN programs to provide graduates with opportunities for advanced education. Additional majors include the Associate in Science Pre-Baccalaureate/Pre-

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Redlands, Langston University Sign Agreement to Expand Nursing Education Opportunities



A new agreement between the Langston University School of Nursing and Health Professions and Redlands Community College will allow graduates of Redlands' nursing program to more easily obtain a Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) from Langston University. The agreement was formally signed Friday on the LU Langston campus.

According to the agreement, students who graduate from Redlands Community College with an associate degree in nursing will

be able to transfer all prerequisite courses in which they earned a grade of "C" or higher to Langston University. Additionally, they will be given Advanced Placement credit for up to 30 hours for classes such as Fundamentals of Nursing Practice, Childbearing Family Nursing and Psychosocial Nursing. These benefits will allow students to complete their BSN degrees more quickly and at an affordable price.

The agreement was first signed on Dec. 6 and was effective immediately, but the April 19 signing was a more formal event to commemorate the new partnership, which will benefit both Oklahoma nursing students and the nursing profession as a whole.

"We want to help increase the number of nurses who have earned a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree," said Dr. Teressa Hunter, the dean of Langston's School of Nursing and Health Professions. "According to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, 'BSN nurses are prized for their skills in critical thinking, leadership, case management, and health promotion, and their ability to

practice across various inpatient and outpatient settings.'

"I fully support their statement and want to help meet the goal of educating more RNs who have earned a BSN. This articulation agreement with Redlands Community College is a significant step to help meet this goal."

The School of Nursing and Health Professions offers students multiple ways to earn their BSN degrees. Students who prefer in-person instruction may take classes at Langston University's Langston or Tulsa campuses or at the University's Ardmore site. Students who are already registered nurses (RN) may also choose to complete their BSN online.

"We look forward to working with Langston as we continue to grow the nursing pipeline in the state," said Redlands President Jena Marr. "We have dedicated substantial resources to meeting the demand for nurses, particularly in rural and tribal areas. An associate degree in nursing is a great step in this direction, but we are excited to

partner with Langston to expand our efforts by supporting Redlands nursing graduates who want to pursue a bachelor's degree."

Langston University launched its online RN to BSN program in October 2023, allowing students to attend classes and complete assignments on a schedule that suits their needs with the convenience of not having to leave home. This format will also offer a personal connection within a supportive environment, which has decreased attrition, led to higher student satisfaction and enhanced learning. Students who are RNs can earn a BSN in 9 or 12 months, depending on their chosen course plan.

The deadline for applications for fall 2024 admission to the LU nursing program has passed, but the application deadline for spring admission is Oct. 1. The deadline to apply for admission to the Redlands' general nursing

program has passed, but the LPN-to-RN application opens Sept. 1.

Langston University is Oklahoma's only Historically Black College or University. Made up of six academic schools and offering 40 undergraduate and graduate degree programs, LU provides students with a world-class education that includes hands-on learning through impactful research and beneficial internships. 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Long Term Care Staffing Mandate Will Lead to Closures, Displaced Seniors, Without

Help from Lawmakers

Care Providers Oklahoma today sounded the alarm on an impending crisis created by the Biden Administration's approval of a new staffing mandate. The new mandate requires nursing homes to significantly increase the number of nurse aides and registered nurses at each facility, without addressing 1) the financial impact of that new requirement or 2) the reality of an ongoing workforce shortage that has already led multiple facilities in Oklahoma to close.

"For months, the White House has been signaling their plan is to mandate that nursing homes hire staffers that do not exist with money they do not have," said Care Providers Oklahoma President and CEO Steven Buck. "This is an impossible proposition that has gone

from a bad idea to a federal rule with the force of law. We are sounding the alarm that this policy will absolutely lead to closures, displaced residents, and the loss of quality care for elderly and vulnerable populations."

Care Providers Oklahoma estimates the new rule requires the average facility to hire two to three new registered nurses at a cost approaching \$17 per Medicaid resident per day. Total costs associated with new hires for Oklahoma's nursing homes will be as much as \$76 million annually.

Currently, the Oklahoma Health Care Authority already estimates that nursing homes are funded at \$44 per Medicaid resident per day under the projected cost-of-care. The Biden staffing mandate expands that funding gap to upwards of \$61

per Medicaid resident per day.

"Oklahoma homes have already been closing at a rapid clip because we are not funded at the cost-ofcare," said Buck. "That is going to increase at an even faster rate, especially in rural areas, unless we can get some help."

Buck said that Care Providers Oklahoma was taking the following steps to protect its residents:

- 1. Asking the Oklahoma Legislature to increase funding to a level equal to the OHCA's projected cost-of-care;
- 2. Supporting the federal "Protecting Rural Seniors' Access to Care Act," a bill that would block implementation of the new mandate;
- 3. Educating the public on the devastating impact that the Biden mandate would have on Oklahoma's

vulnerable seniors.

Oklahoma Governor Kevin Stitt has already signed a letter, along with 14 other governors opposing the mandate.

Senator Lankford has also spoken out against the mandate and its impact on rural facilities.

Previously the Oklahoma Association of Health Care Providers (OAHCP), Care Providers Oklahoma represents the interests of more than 18,000 residents and 19.000 professionals that work in Oklahoma's long-term care facilities, including nursing homes, assisted living homes and intermediate care facilities for individuals intellectual disabilities. Care Providers Oklahoma's mission is to assist its members in providing the highest quality care to the seniors, individuals with disabilities and vulnerable Oklahomans who live in our facilities. We advocate for the enhancement of that care so that Oklahoma long-term care residents may live in the comfort and dignity they deserve.


