An environment inspiring the exchange of ideas is essential to patient care, said James Elledge, RN, director of Surgical Services at Dean McGee Eye Institute, located in Oklahoma City.

"That is where I find satisfaction from a work perspective," Elledge said.

But being administrator at the Dean McGee Eye Surgery Center constitutes most of his role.

Elledge is also a US Army Major, who was deployed as Deputy Command Surgeon/Med-Ops OIC/HCA Prog Mgr - JTF-B, Soto Cano Airbase, Comayagua, Honduras.

He began his nursing education by graduating with a degree from Oklahoma City Community College. In 2008 he earned his Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at the Kramer School of Nursing at Oklahoma City University. He is also working toward completing a Master of Science in Nursing degree and a Master of Business Administration at OCU.

His wife had a hemorrhagic stroke in the first week of his last semester. Her stroke took him out of school when his focus centered upon the reframing of his family.

"I essentially told myself I would not reengage school until my daughters were out of high school," Elledge said. "This year my youngest will graduate. So, I will essentially be returning to school to finish off those two degrees."

Following his associate degree program, his nursing career began in the ICU and ER environment

of INTEGRIS Southwest Medical Center in Oklahoma City. Two years later, he gradually moved outside acute care while moonlighting in ambulatory care.

In 2013 he was recruited by the Dean McGee Eye Institute for the OR director job.

"I was coming off of Army mobilization to Germany, came home and worked in a surgery center in Norman as a circulator," Elledge continued.

His move to Dean McGee Eye Institute came soon after the stroke of his wife.

"I became hesitant about whether I should leave in this direction, but thought it would be a good move," he explained.

His interview for Oklahoma's Nursing Times came months after a 2023 US Army deployment to Honduras and several different countries. He returned to Dean McGee Eye Institute in December.

He returned amid major changes throughout the institute. Organizational changes began with Epic last summer. Epic Systems is one of the largest providers of health information technology, used primarily by large US hospitals and health systems to access, organize, store, and share electronic medical

records. The transition comes with benefits but has been a challenge, Elledge said. The renovation of the culture will be positive for the organization downstream.

"To me with my skill sets and what I enjoy doing in this kind of moment within an organization, is not totally redefining itself, but certainly refining itself. It is of significant interest to me," Elledge said. "I enjoy creating an environment where people understand why they're coming to work. This stems from the greater organization mission, vision values. And, as we are dealing with cultural change, part of that is the redefinition of our values. That is actually still ongoing. And so, with that, it brings purpose, direction, and guidance to where we want to be and who we want to be as a fixture within this community."

According to Dean McGee Eye Institute, "A small group of prominent Oklahoma City citizens, led by ophthalmologist Richard A. Clay, MD, founded the Oklahoma Eye Foundation in 1965 with the specific goal of establishing an eye institute."

Elledge said, "I think it is quite

poignant that on the threshold of that mile marker, we have been reevaluating ourselves — who we are and what we would like to become in time for that anniversary."

Making positive organizational changes is what Elledge is all about as Dean McGee Eye Institute provides the best care and scope possible within the state and region.

"I'm here for that," he said.

Part of the shared governance of the nursing staff is to provide better connectivity to improve patient care opportunities, he said.

"It's not just looking to me as the administrator to get things to happen," Elledge said. There is also buy-in by surgeons and physicians to continue quality of care through patient safety.

McGee Eye Institute is a cohesive organization with nurses, physicians, and administration, acting in a conjoined effort rather than in silo efforts, he explained.

The complexities of what a nursing career has gifted Elledge's life with enhanced critical thinking skills and independent thinking. At times he misses direct patient care.

Elledge is built for a challenge.


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Practical Nursing is a popular program for those seeking a career as a nurse in Oklahoma. Certified Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN) provide direct care to patients in

hospitals, home health, doctors' offices, clinics, and other healthcare settings.

Students in the Practical Nursing program learn in real-world settings. They complete tasks in on-campus labs designed to mimic a hospital, complete with the machines and tools they will use as professionals.

Clinicals - often the final step to becoming certified - provide students with experience in professional settings. Students take clinicals at local hospitals where they work alongside healthcare professionals, and these experiences sometimes lead directly to job opportunities.

For those who want to pursue something different in nursing, the Respiratory Care Therapist program offers entry into an area of medicine that is increasingly in need. Due to many factors, Oklahoma has a higher-than-average number of patients who endure chronic breathing problems. The COVID-19 pandemic only made this worse.

Respiratory Care Therapists help these patients overcome the

daily challenges they face. Students learn in a hands-on environment surrounded by the tools and machines they will use professionally.

Practical Nursing and Respiratory Care are top-notch programs for post-secondary students. Still, there are other ways for students to find a career in nursing. Pre-Nursing is open to high school and post-secondary students and offers various certifications related to nursing.

Depending on the student's plan, they can become certified as an Advanced Unlicensed Assistant, a Certified Medical Assistant, or a Nurse Aid (CNA) through the Pre-Nursing program. Pre-Nursing students can also attend the program part-time, meaning they can seek a certification while they work.

Similarly, Francis Tuttle offers Flexible Health classes to earn nursing certifications. These classes are open for a set amount of time, during which students can attend until they reach the necessary



hours.

Flex Health classes are open for CNA, Home Health Aide (HHA), Certified Medication Aide (CMA), Medication Administration Technician (MAT), Pharmacy Technician, Phlebotomy Technician, EKG Technician, and Medical Assisting (MA) certifications. These classes are also eligible for scholarship or tuition waiver programs that apply to conventional Career Training Programs.

The Rogers State University School of Nursing and Health Professions offers programs in nursing and pre-allied health fields. Nursing programs include the RN2BSN online program which allows registered nurses with an associate degree to complete a bachelor's degree; the traditional BSN in nursing, leading to RN licensure; and the bridge to traditional BSN entry for LPNs or paramedics to earn their bachelor's degree. Allied health sciences options include pre-athletic training, pre-physical therapy and pre-occupational therapy. The Master of Business Administration (MBA) program at RSU now offers a concentration in Healthcare Management.

For those interested in furthering their education and increasing their employment viability in the nursing field, the RN2BSN online nursing program offers them the chance to earn their BSN in a fully online format. Registered nurses who currently have an associate degree in nursing can complete their BSN in as few as three semesters. The program has start dates in both January and August.

The program provides nursing students with the means to earn their Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN), while the online format gives students the flexibility to accommodate their busy schedules. RSU's nationally recognized and fully accredited RN2BSN online program offers real-world practical experience, affordability and flexible coursework that builds upon a student's experience as an RN, preparing to advance them at their workplace, through a graduate program or even to help them find a new position.

In April 2023, Saint Francis Health System and Rogers State University announced a partnership to educate students in the nursing program at Saint Francis Hospital in Tulsa, with Saint Francis serving as an extended campus of the university where students can spend their final three semesters at Saint Francis in Tulsa as they earn their BSN from RSU. This partnership allows RSU to increase its capacity to educate nurses, with the first cohort beginning their time on campus at Saint Francis Hospital in January 2024. The opening of the extended campus at Saint Francis, as well as the recent addition of a spring cohort on RSU's main campus in Claremore, has significantly increased the capacity to graduate outstanding nurses from the RSU School of Nursing and Health Professions.



RSU consistently earns national recognition for affordability, both for traditional classes and its online programs. The university is routinely recognized for having one of the region's lowest student debt loads with nearly half of its graduates earning a degree without any student loan assistance.

The traditional BSN and RN2BSN nursing programs are fully accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). Being the only public residential university in the metropolitan Tulsa area, RSU gives students a traditional college experience. With the university's proximity to Tulsa, RSU is strategically positioned geographically, fiscally and reputationally to be Oklahoma's first choice in BSN education.

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Dr. Sharon Willis, a member of our first DNP cohort, graduated in 2023 after two years. "This program has helped me grow immensely in the nursing profession," said Willis. "I gained practical knowledge in the field and a desire to be a lifelong learner." Willis now serves as a nursing professor,



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Dean of Nursing Julie Hoff, Ph.D., MPH, RN, said the college has hired more faculty and staff and provided more student success programming in the areas of peer tutoring, mentoring, and scholarships as larger nursing classes are accepted.

"There's been a big investment in simulation," Hoff said. "One of the ways we accommodated these numbers is we decreased the number of clinical hours in exchange for increasing time in simulation. Simulation enables faculty to ensure certain competencies are achieved by all students regardless of learning site."

Hoff said the added simulation time helps augment student learning when the opportunities don't present themselves during their scheduled clinical rotations.

The last several years have also seen a more diversified faculty with advanced practice nurses coming on to strengthen the educational experiences.

"In many ways, the students love it because they can be in class one day and then be in clinical and see their faculty engaging with teams, as an advanced practice nurse, in the management of patients," Hoff said.

Increasing quality opportunities for students throughout the state has been the hallmark of Hoff's tenure at OU.

Hoff has made a point to have conversations with nursing leaders around the state to emphasize the importance of working together.

"We are so thankful for the clinical partners who are supporting our enrollment in Duncan, Lawton, Norman, Tulsa, and Oklahoma City. In Oklahoma City, we have strengthened our partnerships with Integris Health, Mercy Hospital, SSM Health, and VA Medical Center.

OU Health continues to be a committed clinical partner who plays a crucial role in our success. Additionally, our partnerships with Duncan Regional Hospital, Commanche County Memorial Hospital, and Norman Regional Hospital have played a crucial role in supporting our undergraduate program growth. Our clinical partnerships with Hillcrest Medical Center, Ascension St. John Medical Center, and St. Francis Health System have sustained our ability to train the future nursing workforce in the Tulsa metropolitan area. Additionally, we rely on countless communitybased clinical partners that include Indian Health, tribal partners, home health and hospice agencies, behavioral health facilities, community health agencies, and K-12 schools that have allowed us to expand where students are learning."

As more and more care inevitably moves away from the hospital into the community in the future, the challenge for nursing education will be to change along with it.

"I just think there is a real disruption in healthcare delivery," Hoff said. "It's still fragmented, and access is still an issue."

Along with that will be an emphasis on flexibility for a healthcare system that isn't known for quick change.

"We don't have to worry about our students being flexible because they are raised in generations of constant change," Hoff said. "We are seeing systems test new models that support the flexibility, well-being, professional growth, and positive organizational culture nurses seek. This can be challenging for healthcare systems as they are big, complex organizations that are challenged to balance financial sustainability while maintaining quality care and improving access."

That means a wealth of opportunities for today's nursing students to become tomorrow's leaders.

Hoff said OU is seeing undergraduate and graduate enrollment levels increase.

In recent years, the College of Nursing has increased its effort to reach more students by guaranteeing acceptance to qualified applicants and partnerships with other entities.

Last year, OU announced partnerships with Murray State and the University of Science & Arts of Oklahoma to offer a guaranteed admission opportunity to six qualified undergraduate students majoring in nursing to pursue their Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at the OU College of Nursing's educational sites at Cameron University in Lawton and Duncan Regional Hospital.

Since coming to OU in January 2020, Hoff said she has felt a tremendous surge of support in impacting nursing education.

"I think the commitment of the University on down to the faculty and staff in the College is very notable including the legislature's commitment and recognition," Hoff said. "The College's commitment to seamless academic commitment is meeting people where they are to get them to where they want to be as a nurse. The mission of the OU College of Nursing is to lead the state in nursing workforce at all levels and advance the health of Oklahomans through education, by education, scientific discovery, translating evidence into practice, and driving innovation." As Dean, I believe it is my responsibility to realize the power of nurses and promise of nursing for Oklahoma and beyond.

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
# Oklahoma Heart Hospital Shaping the Future of Patient Care





#### **Career Ladder & Traditional**

OSU-OKC welcomes LPNs and Paramedics looking for a pathway to being eligible for Registered Nurse licensure. With proof of active, state licensure and required prerequisite courses, LPNs and Paramedics will complete a transition course, then the final two courses in the program. Upon successful completion of the transition course, students are awarded 17 credit hours of advanced standing credit for their licensure. The coursework for this pathway is provided online. Students come to campus for testing, simulations, and laboratory experiences on Fridays. Students will complete clinical experiences on the weekends. This hybrid design was at the request of our program advisory committee to meet the needs of working adults.

#### **Simulation Center**

OSU-OKC boasts having one of the largest and most sophisticated simulation facilities in the metro area. Students will experience realistic hospital environments with simulation mannequins that can mimic human patients. The goal was to make the learning environment as close to an actual hospital as possible to increase students' comfort when they enter our partners' facilities and begin to take care of patients. This decreases student anxiety and boosts student confidence in their ability to care for patients.

#### **Interprofessional Simulation**

OSU-OKC nursing students, OSU-OKC paramedicine students, and OSU-Center for Health Sciences resident physicians come together to rescue, triage, and treat patients with a variety of injuries and illnesses. The goal is for these different groups to learn to work together as they will in the actual healthcare arena. Student volunteers and staff take on the role of patients and may simulate suffering anything from a traumatic injury requiring being rescued by our paramedic students to a mental health crisis and any other healthcare emergency in between. Not only do students learn to work together as a team, but they will also learn to prioritize care based on the severity of the simulated patient.



Professor Newell makes lectures and test prepping always engaging and interesting, while Danaee, my success coach, keeps me accountable of my work and gives me great advice on how to approach my test taking and time organization."

The five-year cooperative grant is designed for Native American and low-income students and is 100% funded by the U.S. Department of Education as part of the NASNTI program.



# OCU Student Overcomes Obstacles to Achieve Dreams



Amaka Okwudigbo endured quite a journey moving to the United States from Nigeria in pursuit of a career in the healthcare field.

She has overcome homelessness, food insecurity, and financial issues to fight for her career dreams.

She is currently a student with Oklahoma City University's 12-month accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program.

"I've had a lot of challenges since I've been in the United States," said Okwudigbo, who came to the United States eight years ago at age 18. "I've been homeless, and had no food, and no accommodations, but I was lucky enough to find help here at OCU. They have a food pantry and they have been really helpful with food to me. I have a place to stay. God really, really blessed me."

Okwudigbo came to the U.S. on a student visa.

"I just needed to change my environment, and someone mentioned that I should apply for a visa to see if I can further my education here in the United States and I took the risk," she said. "I first landed in Houston, Texas, and I graduated with an Associates of Science in Health, and then I moved to Oklahoma to further my education. I went to Rose State College, and I had two Associate's degrees from there, one respiratory therapy and the other one programming"

Okwudigbo credits Candace Jones, her former boss (Academic Advisor) at Rose State College, for helping her secure housing.

"She's been amazing, she gave me a roof under her house," Okwudigbo said.

After graduating from Rose State, Okwudigbo looked to expand her educational horizons.

"When I graduated with my programming degree last December, I was looking to expand my knowledge to see other options, so I started looking for schools that could give me a Bachelor's degree, which I could get very fast," she said. "I looked online and I found OCU, and when I spoke to the recruiters, the advisors at the nursing program, they were really fast with responding to me and I was like, "I think this is the school that I am going to."

OCU's accelerated BSN program is the state of Oklahoma's first and only 12-month accelerated BSN. The program provides an opportunity for individuals with a non-nursing associate or bachelor's degree to earn a BSN degree in less time than a traditional baccalaureate program. This is an in-person program that consists of 56 credit hours spread over three full-time semesters during the 12-month program.

Some key features of Oklahoma City University's 12-month accelerated BSN are:

- Program consists of 56 credit hours over 12 months
- Direct transfer of previous associate or baccalaureate degree credits
- Clinical experiences at major hospital and community sites in the Oklahoma City metro area

The program will prepare you to sit for the National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX-RN), which all prospective nurses must pass in order to be licensed in their state.

Okwudigbo worked her way through her previous schools, but was able to secure a scholarship to attend OCU. She hopes to find on-campus work to help with the rest of her school costs.

"It's been a huge challenge, because without a job I wouldn't be able to pay for this, but I was lucky enough to get a scholarship this first semester," she said. "Even though the cost was a bit challenging for me, I was like, 'I will fight for it and I will do it,' and I am here. I am extremely proud."

Okwudigbo credits her parents for instilling her with determination and a strong work ethic.

"I grew up in an environment where we are satisfied with the little that we have, and I'm a first generation that was going to school," she said. "My parents are my backbone. I'm glad that they raised me the way they did."

Okwudigbo also thanked Gina Crawford, DNP, APRN-CNP, FNP, CNE, and Dean and Associate Professor, and Dr. Janice Carr, DNP, RN, CNE, Associate Professor, for their help at OCU's Kramer School of Nursing.

"I want to say thank you to Dean Gina Crawford and Dr. Janice Carr for their enormous support," she said.

Okwudigbo's goal is to join the military and work in healthcare.

"I am so eager to join either the Air Force or the Army," she said. "This has been my goal since I was a baby, and I would love to, actually when I graduate, if by the grace of God, practice in the military."

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# Inaugural White Coat Ceremony Celebrates OSU Nursing Students

Twenty-six OSU students commemorated the start of their professional nursing education at the university's inaugural White Coat Ceremony.

The ceremony, held on April 3 in the Great Hall of the Nancy Randolph Davis Building, marked a significant milestone for the students and the nursing program at OSU. The program, developed to address a nursing shortage in Oklahoma and across the country, welcomed its first class of professional nursing students in the fall of 2023. In remarks given during the ceremony, Nursing Program Director Dr. Alana Cluck said the ceremony was meaningful to both the nursing students and OSU.

"This official White Coat Ceremony symbolizes the start of your education in the science and art of nursing," Cluck said. "When you put on your white coat, wear it with pride as you are not only representing Oklahoma State University but furthermore the nursing profession."

Although the nursing degree program is still in its first year at OSU, Cluck said she expects the 26 students recognized to be the first of many OSU-educated nurses. Eighty-six students are enrolled in the program for the fall 2024 semester, and Cluck expects the program to grow to 300 students by its third year.

Students pursuing a nursing degree must complete an additional application and pass prerequisite courses and take an exam. Cluck said the process will ensure admitted students are more likely to complete the program and pass the National Council Licensure Examination, which is required to become a licensed nurse.

Once admitted, students spend their final two years in the professional program at OSU studying and gaining hands-on experience. The program is rigorous, and by graduation, professional nursing students will have gone through two years of in-lab simulations and clinical rotations focused on critical care, medical-surgical nursing, pediatrics, obstetrics, community and leadership.

"They spend time in the lab learning and practicing skills, as well as working through simulation patient care scenarios with manikins and virtual reality," Cluck said. "Clinical rotations include long-term care facilities and hospital settings."

For students, the White Coat Ceremony represented the beginning of their health care education. However, Cluck noted that the students' new white coats carried on a decades-old tradition in the medical field and symbolized knowledge, professionalism and hope.

"These coats are worn by a multitude of medical providers as a classic symbol of medical knowledge," Cluck said. "It's as if to automatically say to a patient, 'I am here to help."







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# NCLEX-RN Pass Rates Soar at WOSC

The last few years have been undeniably rough on the nursing profession.

The pandemic brought lasting change to the profession and forced nursing education to change.

But students and educators at Western Oklahoma State College of Nursing have thrived, showing significant improvements in NCLEX-RN first-time pass rates in all four programs.

In fact, the Altus campus and the online LPN-to-RN program had 100-percent first-time pass rates in 2023.

Diane Fairchild, MSN, RN is the Director of Nursing at WOSC.

She sees the superior pass rates as proof her college's programs are adapting and thriving.

She has a good idea why.

"The dedicated faculty focus on critical thinking and clinical judgment in both the classroom and the clinical area," Fairchild said. "(Nursing education) has changed dramatically because of Covid. Nurses think differently about going into the field. Covid has impacted nursing tremendously.

"I think we're seeing overall somewhat of a decline in those who are interested in entering the field. I think Covid has made us take a step back and some students are afraid."

The NCLEX-RN changed formats in April 2023 adapting to a more critical thinking format. The "next generation" testing focused on a clinical judgment model and evolving case studies.

Nationwide, the current first-time RN pass rate for U.S.-educated students sits at 88.56 percent. Oklahoma's pass rate is slightly lower.

Fairchild said the profession has seen an exodus of nurses leaving the bedside since Covid for a variety of reasons. That puts an even greater focus on training the next generation of nurses.





"It's also driven those who truly have the desire to care for patients, I think Covid has driven some people with the desire to care for others into nursing because they want to do what they can to take care of people in those moments. They want to make sure that patients are not alone when end-of-life is near."

Western Oklahoma State has one of the only ADN programs in southwest Oklahoma.

Established as Altus Junior College in 1926, it is the oldest original municipal two-year college still in existence in Oklahoma.

The Nursing Program at Western Oklahoma State College was established in 1981 and has been preparing qualified nurses for many years.

The WOSC nursing program is offered at three campus sites: Altus, Lawton, and Elk City. Western's ADN program has several program tracks

Face-to-face classes for both general and advanced standing entry students are available as well as online classes with a face-to-face clinical component for advanced standing students. Students in the face-to-face track take daytime classes at all three campuses.

"One of our major goals is to meet the needs of southwest Oklahoma by having a high-quality nursing program and having nurses go into our communities to stay and meet the nursing needs of the people in that community," Fairchild said.

"We have to meet student needs. Students have different study habits from students many years ago. Our students need more active learning and education with emphasis on clinical judgment and soft skills," Fairchild said. "I see an increased need for communication with other healthcare providers and with patients. Patient teaching is vital in nursing. Nursing instructors and faculty need to meet those needs by encouraging better communication skills and critical thinking."

WOSC NCLEX-RN pass rates for the LPN-to-RN track had already met or exceeded the requirements of the Oklahoma Board of Nursing for the past several years.

She credits the faculty for adapting quickly to meet the students both during and after the pandemic.

"Many of the instructors spend more time with students, helping individually with tutoring. They have come up with more active lessons in the classroom so the students are more engaged. They go into clinicals and teach at the bedside, not just in the classroom. Overall, they just love their students and they express that to them.

"When students struggle, they build them up instead of tearing them down."

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

After the storm, all patients were transferred safely to other area hospitals. Mercy Love County hospital and the clinic on campus are closed for the foreseeable future. The building is not safe for patient care.

"We are so grateful for our heroic co-workers who moved patients and visitors to safety before the storm hit," said Scott Callender, administrator of Mercy Health Love County. "We regularly train for severe weather, so our co-workers were ready and knew what to do."

Leaders from across Mercy visited impacted areas on Monday to ensure Mercy is doing everything possible for co-workers and the community.

Around 150 Mercy co-workers serve in Marietta. Mercy's human resources



and local operations teams are working together to support Mercy co-workers impacted by the storm across southern Oklahoma. Many also experienced personal damage to their homes and vehicles.

"Our focus is taking care of our

people because they are so crucial to our organization," said Catherine Codispoti, Mercy's chief people officer. "We want our co-workers to know their jobs are secure and we are working through plans to support and redeploy them while

we work through next steps in Marietta."

Mercy leaders are working on how to continue providing care to a community in need. More details will be shared as they develop.




