Melanie Cheap chose med/ surg nursing because she likes learning, she said. Compassion is to her nature.

"We're seeing a lot of different patients, disease processes and different surgeries," said Cheap, RN, a medical/surgical supervisor at OU Health Edmond Medical Center. "After being here for three and a half years, I still feel like I've seen something new every week and I'm learning something. It keeps me interested and it's exciting."

Med/surg lets her practice all the nursing skills she learned in nursing school. Cheap earned her Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at Oklahoma City University Kramer School of Nursing and came to OU Health Edmond Medical Center nearly four years ago. The smaller classes at Kramer School of Nursing provided a comfortable learning atmosphere, she explained.

"I knew all of my professors and was able to go to them for help with questions," Cheap said. "We also got clinical experience at hospitals in the area. That was nice seeing how different hospitals in the area work in different ways. It was a really good experience."

It takes a special nurse to work in med/surg, she said. It's different from a lot of other units. A drive for hard work coupled with a desire to get things done is essential for efficiency. Med/surg nurses are on their feet all day. So, it takes a special person who is willing to do that, she tells nursing students about what to expect if they choose med/surg.

"For me and for new nurses I think OU Edmond is a great place. I don't think there is another unit where you can learn as much as you do by being in med/surg," Cheap continued. "It's a great place to start and I think it's a great place to stay."

Cheap is grateful for the longevity of the nursing staff who shared their best practices when she came to the hospital.

"I was lucky to be trained by a nurse who had been here for several years and is still here. And I think you don't see that everywhere," Cheap said. "And I think that makes it feel good about where you're at in those situations."

As a leader she visits with patients to ensure patient care is meeting their every need. This communication ensures each patient is pleased with the staff and the care they are receiving. A big part for a nurse leader is making sure the staff is doing everything possible for patient centered care. Cheap will ask patients if there is anything the nursing staff may provide to make their hospital stay better.

Cheap said she mirrors many nurses in the sense that they became nurses because they have a passion in life for providing care. The longer she learns about nursing, the more she loves it. Customer service is a major aspect of nursing that she enjoys.

"On our unit we see a lot of different stages of life and a lot of different surgeries. A lot of these orthopedic surgeries - they can really change someone's life. Somebody who's coming in and is fairly healthy needing their hip or knee replaced - they will spend the rest of their life being able to get around better and do more doing the things they like to do," Cheap said. "I think that you get to see people change by what we're doing here."

Med/surg nurses receive thank you cards often from patients and family members thanking them for their care. Cheap said these expressions of gratitude and kindness make nurses feel good and appreciated for doing a good job.

"I think we see some really tough situations sometimes," Cheap said. "Everybody deserves medical care and deserves to be treated. We see the homeless population and we see addiction patients. We see cancer patients that are coming from hard

situations. Every once in a while, when you have one of those sick patients or difficult patients, it just reminds me how lucky I am not to be in their situation now. I think that affects the care that you provide."

Even when someone is grumpy or having a bad day, Cheap reminds herself of the situation her patient is in.

Being a nurse is an enriching calling in life. It's something she'll tell anyone considering a nursing

"There is such a need for good, caring nurses. It's not something everybody can do," she said. "But there's so much flexibility in nursing and you get to see so much. There are opportunities all over the place."

Nursing is an endless career, she said.

"There is so much that you can do."

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# CAREERS IN NURSE - A CHILD'S SUPERHERO

Located in southwest Oklahoma City, is Esperanza Elementary School, home of the Esperanza Foxes. With Pre-K through 4th grade, you will find Dakota Arms, RN,BSN, school nurse. This is Dakota's fourth year as an RN and third year as a school nurse at Esperanza.

Growing up in Moore, OK, Dakota wanted to be a paleontologist when he was little. "I really liked dinosaurs and always wanted to find a velociraptor in my backyard," he said with a smile.

As time changed, he focused on the medical field, attending Oklahoma City Community College for his Associates in Applied Science degree in Nursing, and then Southwestern Oklahoma State University for his Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

"I enjoy being a school nurse," Dakota said. "I am a nurse because I wanted a career to advocate for others and I have a passion for learning about how I can nurse people back to health. The reason I pursued school nursing is that I really enjoy the patient population and I know that I am making a difference in their lives. Children are so inquisitive, so it makes it very easy to teach those foundational levels of health literacy that can shape their lives going forward," he commented.

A typical day for Dakota varies from seeing thirteen children a day or as many as thirty-five, but roughly seventy to eighty per week. The day usually begins by checking his email from leadership and then, children begin making their way into his office with a variety of complaints. There's pink eye, fever, headaches, tummy aches, coughs, sore throat, etc. Then screening for vision and hearing and whoever needs to be referred. Certain children have a daily medication, along with



using an inhaler. Assessments and charting is done on all students.

Throughout the day he never knows what lies beyond his clinic door; broken arms, big lacerations to the head, items in ears and noses, bee stings and all sorts of rashes. That includes the ongoing emergencies of scraped knees, limping, teary eyes or just a Band-Aid to magically heal the invisible scrape. No matter what it is, the children leave smiling and walking just fine. The children are fortunate to have such a caring nurse to take care of them.

Asking Dakota what his greatest reward as a school nurse is, he replied, "Watching the students thrive after giving them the proper resources to do so. As a school nurse, I have a lot of impact on their education even though it is a different way than a traditional teacher. lt might be referring a child to get glasses that is having difficulty in seeing the board, or it could be lending a listening ear to a student who may need time to express themselves to be heard, or a child with a chronic health condition managing their disease at school. All of these can impact a child's education and it's very rewarding to be able to help in any way that I can."

Dakota's advice to someone thinking about going into the medical field, would be to SHADOW. He finds shadowing

is a great way to find exactly what you want to do. Another word of advice is to LISTEN. He would also encourage them to continue to seek knowledge, never quit learning and be an advocator for yourself and others.

Dakota attributes his decision to pursue a career in healthcare to the influence of his aunt, who was a nurse at the time and later, became a PA. During his high school years, he realized his passion for the medical field and looked up to his aunt as a guiding light. She served as his mentor instilling in him the desire to follow in her footsteps. Another influential figure in Dakota's journey is nurse Patty Currey who oversees the school nurses at OKCPS. She also stands out as one of the sweetest, funniest people Dakota has ever met.

Listing a few personal qualities about himself, Dakota said, "I am a smart, funny, kind-hearted, consistent person and I enjoy laughing, having fun and bringing a smile to others."

Dakota's hobbies include reading, shooting hoops and watching NBA basketball. He also volunteers for the Oklahoma Regional Food bank.

## 46 New Nurses in RSU Graduating Class



Rogers State University honored its 41st graduating class of nurses at the annual Nurses Pinning Ceremony, held Friday, May 10 at First Baptist Church in Claremore.

Dr. Carla Lynch, associate dean of the School of Nursing and Health Professions, started the ceremony with the welcoming of students, guests and audience members.

"Graduates, I'm so proud that each of you is here today," Dr. Lynch said. "I know you've been challenged in so many ways since you started the (nursing) program in 2022. I know you've been challenged and expanded, but you've risen to the test, you've achieved, and you've earned what you've needed to earn time and time again, so congratulations – you've done a great job.

"Now that you're a nurse, you will forever and always be a nurse, you will always think like a nurse, you will never not be a nurse," she said. "I can personally say that being a nurse is one of life's greatest privileges. It will open doors for opportunities that most people never get. It provides a sense of making a difference every day as you go to work and help people, so I hope that – like me and the other faculty here – becoming a nurse is one of the best decisions you've ever made.

"With this in mind, I just want

to share three things with you – three important nuggets of advice for how to have a happy life as a nurse," she said. "Number one – use kindness. Be generous in your dealings with others and assume the best about people. Number two – do the work. As each of you know, you must do the work to get where you're at, and number three – we're all on the same time. You cannot do nursing or life by yourself. It's not a competition."

Lynch then introduced RSU President Dr. Larry Rice, whom she described as a "strong advocate and supporter of the nursing program" throughout his tenure as president.

"Graduates, families and distinguished guests, what a privilege it is for me to be here," Dr. Rice began. "Nurses, I know how hard you worked to get here. I've been here 16 years as president – was here a few years before that in other capacities, but throughout my time in higher education, I've always had the honor of witnessing how hard it is to become an RSU nurse and how high the standard, how high the bar is for you and for those who came before you.

"I'm so old that I was here when the Nursing program was getting started," he said, "and – from that first class of 1983, I had the privilege of working with one of those individuals. The bar was set very high by the previous faculty and students, so I know how hard it is to earn those pins that we're going to pin on you today. I just want to say that bar is set so high that the RSU nurse is a brand, and I have no reservations in saying that this class will continue to set that bar high for those to follow."

Rice touched on the personal relationships he's had with nursing graduates, including a particularly personal relationship with one in the class of 2024 – his own granddaughter – concluding with words of encouragement, reiterating that the RSU nurse is a "strong brand" and jokingly added he hoped not to

see any of them in their professional career any time soon.

"God bless you. Go Hillcats," he said.

Following Rice's remarks, assistant professor and undergraduate program coordinator Samantha Rhea recognized instructor Amber Sanchez as the recipient of the Faculty Service Award, after which instructor Sheryl Klenovich presented Rita Byfield with the Clinical Adjunct Award.

Dr. Cassandra Barrow then took the podium to acknowledge family and friends' support of the nursing See PINNING Page 11

Mayo Clinic and Mercy are making a significant advancement in their global, first-of-its-kind 10-year collaboration agreement signed in the summer of 2022. As founding members of Mayo Clinic Platform\_Connect, the two organizations will now be working together to analyze de-identified patient data as they search for new ways to diagnose, treat and prevent disease, providing better outcomes and lower costs of care.

Mayo Clinic Platform\_Connect is a distributed data network that provides secure access to de-identified clinical data. Previously, Mercy and Mayo Clinic could use Connect to analyze data from their own organizations, but as of today, each organization can safely and securely analyze de-identified patient data from either health system. This significantly larger data set allows researchers and innovators to better identify risk factors, predict illnesses and provide earlier treatment with the potential to positively impact millions of patients' lives.

"Mayo Clinic Platform is enabling

innovation to change how care is provided. At its core, Platform relies on our distributed data network to make available data that has depth, breadth and spread, and which can help create new ways to diagnose, treat and care for patients no matter where in the world they might live. Today represents a significant milestone, demonstrating the power of collaboration in transforming healthcare," said John Halamka, M.D., president of Mayo Clinic Platform.

Mayo Clinic Platform recently announced the addition of three healthcare organizations to its global collaboration: Seoul National University Hospital in South Korea, Singapore's SingHealth and UC Davis Health in California. This expansion brings the total number of Mayo Clinic Platform\_Connect members to eight, including founding members Mayo Clinic and Mercy, Brazil's Hospital Israelita Albert Einstein, Israel's Sheba Medical Center and Canada's University Health Network, who joined in 2023.
