"I thought my teacher was really cool," she added. "As I got older, I decided I wanted to be a nurse. After graduating high school, I knew nursing would my career. I graduated from the University of Central Oklahoma," Aprille said.

"My first job as a nurse was at Norman Regional where I worked in the step-down units. I enjoyed my job there, but after working in the same environment for nine years, I felt ready for a change. When I joined Community Hospital, I could tell its smaller size suited me well. Despite being a smaller facility we stay incredibly busy, which keeps the pace just right for me.

We all get along well and

have formed a great team. The teamwork makes a great significant difference in our daily work life," Aprille said.

Asking why she wanted to be a nurse, Aprille replied, "It makes me feel good knowing that I am helping people. I know it is a rewarding job." Aprille went on to describe some of her daily duties. "I work in preoperative getting the patients ready for their surgery. This includes paper work, vitals, getting their history and background, starting their IV, making sure everything is ready for surgery. All of us nurses rotate our duties, whether it is preparing another patient for surgery or checking on the patient in recovery. We just want to take care of our patients the best way we can," she explained.

When discussing the qualities a nurse should possess, Aprille emphasized the importance of compassion and the ability to prioritize tasks effectively for their patients. She said, "Compassion allows a nurse to connect with patients on a personal level, providing comfort and understanding during their most vulnerable times. Prioritization ensures that the most critical needs are addressed promptly, which can make a significant difference in patient outcome."

Aprille finds the most challenging part of being a nurse is when she becomes too deeply involved with her patients and the day's work. This can sometimes become overwhelming and emotional. Despite her years of experience, there are moments when she still feels like she still doesn't know enough. However, it is these times that she reminds herself to stay strong and embrace the opportunity to continue learning and growing in her profession.

When asked what advice she would give to someone entering the medical field, Aprille replied, "If you're considering nursing as a career, you need to stick with it. Don't

get things done. A nurse needs to be compassionate and genuine, with compassion straight from the heart. I've always had that deep desire to help others."

Ensuring The Best in Life Nurse Leader Honored With Patriotic Award

Protecting the needs of humanity has always been a hallmark for Monica Kraft, RN, director of nursing for pediatric oncology, and the interim cardiac ICU nursing director at Oklahoma Children's Hospital OU Health.

Her care as a nurse was recently honored with a Patriotic Award.

She was nominated for the award by Kyler Wilson, RN. The Employee Support of the Guard and Reserve is the organization that bestows the award. Kraft has supported Wilson so he can fulfill his own patriotic military duties.

"He is in the National Guard, and I am supportive of him when he needs to take time off to go do his drills, to go on deployment, that type of thing," Kraft said.

As a 20-year veteran of the US Navy, Kraft understands the importance of supporting the hospital's military members. She has made sure Wilson is able to provide his active-duty military service.

"This award makes me recognize how important it is for us to support our service members, whether they're active duty or in the reserves or retired," she continued. "This award is very important in honoring our service members," Kraft said. "I feel very honored that Kyler recognized me for this award, because he could have recognized somebody else, and he thought to recognize me, because he feels that I go above and beyond for him. So, I just want to pass that on, and make sure that our service members feel honored and respected."

She has been with OU Health for 22 years. Kraft did her prerequisites at Rose State College, and then transitioned to OU College of Nursing for her Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. She earned a Master of Science in Nursing degree from University of Phoenix in Leadership. She is also working toward her Doctor of Nursing Practice.

In 2000 she retired from full-time active duty in the US Navy. Kraft had already done some support work for the Red Cross during the 1995 Oklahoma City bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Building and later the Moore tornado in 1999.

"So, I worked with some nurses.

And it was like, I think this would be interesting. So, at that point, I applied for nursing school," Kraft said. "I just wanted to help people. I had children, so I wanted to work with children."

Her altruism sparked by volunteering to help people in crisis mode. As her admiration for nurses flourished, Kraft recognized her future in nursing.

Nurses serving Oklahoma Children's Hospital OU Health contribute to best practices. Kraft said it's important for nurses to feel included. Nurses also have a say when rounding with physicians.

"It's my job to make sure that they feel supported," Kraft said.

Nurses have the supplies needed for safe patient care. The staff gives their all to their patients and families, because taking care of a child includes taking care of the family. Kraft admires nurses at Children's Hospital OU Health for going above and beyond in care. The resilience of children attracts nurses to their field and inspires against burnout.

"I know coming from my

background in oncology and seeing the little ones just wanting to be children is very rewarding," Kraft explained. "They may be sick, and they may have things going on inside their body. But on the outside, they just want to be kids. I think that we have a lot of respect for the families, because they go through a lot."

A newly diagnosed patient may be in one room. And a patient may be struggling in another room.

"Knowing that you're able to take care of both of them to the best of your ability has always been a reward for me," Kraft said.

Having respect for the decisions parents make for their children made Kraft realize this could happen to her own family or other nurses' families. Her solace is knowing she is surrounded by compassionate people caring for one another.

"I think it's really important, and it's like one big family. You know, I'm over two big service lines, and like the cardiac ICU nurses love taking care of the cardiac ICU patients, the hemoglobin nurses love taking care of their hemoglobin patients. So, to know that you can specialize and make a difference in two different very important patient populations is an honor."

Child life specialists help nurses with child play, and how to talk to a frightened 3-year-old. Words should be simple without medical terms. You use simple terms. Child play could be sitting on the floor at their level.

"That's really important," Craft said.

Nurses thrive when having a willingness to study outside of work and accepting there will always be more to learn.

Nurses need to care for themselves outside of work, Kraft said, so they will be prepared to give their all to patients and families.

As a leader, she is always on call for assistance. She relaxes by going to movies or watching Netflix.

"I like to ride my bike," she said. "Now that it's summertime, I'm going home and riding my bike when it's not so hot or walking my dogs and spending time with my children." August 2024

OCU Student Overcomes Obstacles to Achieve Dreams Oklahoma City

Amaka Okwudigbo endured quite a journey moving to the United States from Nigeria in pursuit of a career in the healthcare field.

She has overcome homelessness, food insecurity, and financial issues to fight for her career dreams.

She is currently a student with Oklahoma City University's 12-month accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program.

"I've had a lot of challenges since I've been in the United States," said Okwudigbo, who came to the United States eight years ago at age 18. "I've been homeless, and had no food, and no accommodations, but I was lucky enough to find help here at OCU. They have a food pantry and they have been really helpful with food to me. I have a place to stay. God really, really blessed me."

Okwudigbo came to the U.S. on a student visa.

"I just needed to change my environment, and someone mentioned that I should apply for a visa to see if I can further my education here in the United States and I took the risk," she said. "I first landed in Houston, Texas, and I graduated with an Associates of Science in Health, and then I moved to Oklahoma to further my education. I went to Rose State College, and I had two Associate's degrees from there, one respiratory therapy and the other one programming"

Okwudigbo credits Candace Jones, her former boss (Academic Advisor) at Rose State College, for helping her secure housing.

"She's been amazing, she gave me a roof under her house," Okwudigbo said.

After graduating from Rose State, Okwudigbo looked to expand her educational horizons.

"When I graduated with my programming degree last December, I was looking to expand my knowledge to see other options, so I started looking for schools that could give me a Bachelor's degree, which I could get very fast," she said. "I looked online and I found OCU, and when I spoke to the recruiters, the advisors at the nursing program, they were really fast with responding to me and I was like, "I think this is the school that I am going to."

OCU's accelerated BSN program is the state of Oklahoma's first and only 12-month accelerated BSN. The program provides an opportunity for individuals with a non-nursing associate or bachelor's degree to earn a BSN degree in less time than a traditional baccalaureate program. This is an in-person program that consists of 56 credit hours spread over three full-time semesters during the 12-month program.

Some key features of Oklahoma City University's 12-month accelerated BSN are:

• Program consists of 56 credit hours over 12 months

• Direct transfer of previous associate or baccalaureate degree credits

• Clinical experiences at major hospital and community sites in the Oklahoma City metro area

The program will prepare you to sit for the National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX-RN), which all prospective nurses must pass in order to be licensed in their state.

Okwudigbo worked her way through her previous schools, but was able to secure a scholarship to attend OCU. She hopes to find on-campus work to help with the rest of her school costs.

"It's been a huge challenge, because without a job I wouldn't be able to pay for this, but I was lucky enough to get a scholarship this first semester," she said. "Even though the cost was a bit challenging for me, I was like, 'I will fight for it and I will do it,' and I am here. I am extremely proud."

Okwudigbo credits her parents for instilling her with determination and a strong work ethic.

"I grew up in an environment where we are satisfied with the little that we have, and I'm a first generation that was going to school," she said. "My parents are my backbone. I'm glad that they raised me the way they did."

Okwudigbo also thanked Gina Crawford, DNP, APRN-CNP, FNP, CNE, and Dean and Associate Professor, and Dr. Janice Carr, DNP, RN, CNE, Associate Professor, for their help at OCU's Kramer School of Nursing.

"I want to say thank you to Dean Gina Crawford and Dr. Janice Carr for their enormous support," she said.

Okwudigbo's goal is to join the military and work in healthcare.

"I am so eager to join either the Air Force or the Army," she said. "This has been my goal since I was a baby, and I would love to, actually when I graduate, if by the grace of God, practice in the military."

Both are chemistry majors with aspirations of being among the 10 or so accepted each year into the Navy's medical school.

"I had really high expectations coming here, and I wasn't disappointed," said Tabor, a native of Frankfort, Illinois, who recently completed OMRF's John H. Saxon Academy Service Summer Research Program. In the lab of OMRF Vice President of Research Courtney Griffin, Ph.D., Tabor worked on experiments aimed at preventing vision loss caused by blood vessel issues in the eyes.

"l've developed research techniques and skills that I wouldn't have learned otherwise," said Tabor. "This isn't something that a lot of people at the academy experience."


Mazzeo studied meiosis, the type of cell division that creates

final presentation at OMRF, she created a time-lapse video that tracked the movements of specific spots on the chromosome. Errors during this process can cause birth defects.

"It's been guite interesting to better understand these processes," said Mazzeo, who hails from Virginia Beach, Virginia. "These things we talk about in the lab are so different from what we learn in our biology classes."

"I never cease to be amazed at how professional, mature and serious these students are," said Griffin, who has hosted eight Saxon Scholars in her lab since the program was inaugurated at OMRF in 2009. "When they come through here, I can't help thinking how lucky we are as a country to have these people training to be our future military doctors and scientists."

OMRF Board Member John Saxon III, M.D., created the internship program to honor his father, a West Point graduate and career Air Force pilot who taught at





Inaugural White Coat Ceremony Celebrates OSU Nursing Students

Twenty-six OSU students commemorated the start of their professional nursing education at the university's inaugural White Coat Ceremony.

The ceremony, held on April 3 in the Great Hall of the Nancy Randolph Davis Building, marked a significant milestone for the students and the nursing program at OSU. The program, developed to address a nursing shortage in Oklahoma and across the country, welcomed its first class of professional nursing students in the fall of 2023. In remarks given during the ceremony, Nursing Program Director Dr. Alana Cluck said the ceremony was meaningful to both the nursing students and OSU.

"This official White Coat Ceremony symbolizes the start of your education in the science and art of nursing," Cluck said. "When you put on your white coat, wear it with pride as you are not only representing Oklahoma State University but furthermore the nursing profession."

Although the nursing degree program is still in its first year at OSU, Cluck said she expects the 26 students recognized to be the first of many OSU-educated nurses. Eighty-six students are enrolled in the program for the fall 2024 semester, and Cluck expects the program to grow to 300 students by its third year.

Students pursuing a nursing degree must complete an additional application and pass prerequisite courses and take an exam. Cluck said the process will ensure admitted students are more likely to complete the program and pass the National Council Licensure Examination, which is required to become a licensed nurse.

Once admitted, students spend their final two years in the professional program at OSU studying and gaining hands-on experience. The program is rigorous, and by graduation, professional nursing students will have gone through two years of in-lab simulations and clinical rotations focused on critical care, medical-surgical nursing, pediatrics, obstetrics, community and leadership.

"They spend time in the lab learning and practicing skills, as well as working through simulation patient care scenarios with manikins and virtual reality," Cluck said. "Clinical rotations include long-term care facilities and hospital settings."

For students, the White Coat Ceremony represented the beginning of their health care education. However, Cluck noted that the students' new white coats carried on a decades-old tradition in the medical field and symbolized knowledge, professionalism and hope.

"These coats are worn by a multitude of medical providers as a classic symbol of medical knowledge," Cluck said. "It's as if to automatically say to a patient, 'I am here to help.'"
