Nursing programs include the RN2BSN online program which allows registered nurses with an associate degree to complete a bachelor's degree; the traditional BSN in nursing, leading to RN licensure; the Master of Science in nursing, offered fully online; and the bridge to traditional BSN entry for LPNs or paramedics to earn their bachelor's degree. Allied health sciences options include preathletic training, pre-physical



therapy and pre-occupational therapy. The Master of Business Administration (MBA) program at RSU now offers a concentration in Healthcare Management.

With a history of over 40 years of academic excellence, RSU's nursing program provides academic rigor and a reputation that gives RSU graduates an edge in the competitive job market. ## Stillwater Medical 1st in Oklahoma to Launch Emergency Nurse Residency Program



Stillwater Medical launches residency program to invest in the growth and education of nurses throughout its health system in an effort to improve patient care.

Stillwater Medical has partnered with the Emergency Nurses Association (ENA) to offer a robust new graduate residency program to invest in their nurses' growth and further patient care. This is part of the health system's continual efforts to provide the highest-quality patient experience.

The Emergency Nurse Residency Program (ENRP) is the first available in Oklahoma and is a mixture of in-person didactic (lectures, simulations, hands-on equipment, etc.) and online, independent learning modules. While the content is designed for emergency nurses, Stillwater Medical is offering the program to nurses in all specialty areas.

Newsweek recently named Stillwater Medical as No. 1 in the state of Oklahoma for patient experience. Nurses are at the front-line of patient care. Dawn Kregel, chief nursing officer and senior vice president of patient care services for Stillwater Medical, says Stillwater Medical's greatest asset is its employees.

"Nurses are caring for those who cannot care for themselves. It's a noble profession and as a health system, we are committed to investing in our employees so they can deliver the best care possible. We want them to grow in knowledge and experience because they touch the lives of so many and will continue to do so throughout their career," Kregel said. No matter an individual's specialty, Stillwater Medical nurses are encouraged to register for a course. Course modules include pediatric emergencies, shock, sepsis, & the older adult, behavioral health and metabolic emergencies, among various others.

Heidi Gilbert, emergency department clinical educator, is excited to offer this training for Stillwater Medical staff. She discovered this program in her role on the board of directors for ENA.

"It was such a phenomenal training. The best education program ENA has," Gilbert said. "And I wanted to bring it to Stillwater Medical."

The process had many components for its installation, but Stillwater Medical was able to bring the program to life thanks to a commitment from Lori and Vance Hunter through Stillwater Medical Foundation's Still Strong Emergency Department Educational Endowment.

Currently, five new graduates are enrolled in the program. As of now, the training is fasttracked to take 12 weeks, but in the future, the program will be placed on a timeline of 16-18 weeks. Yet, Gilbert encourages nurses to take courses pertaining to their specialty as an effort to grow their expertise and skills. All classes are stand-alone.

"ICU nurses would not necessarily need OB/Gyn emergency training, so I encourage people to hop in and out of the program," Gilbert said. "No matter if completed in full, or a few classes taken, the more education we have, the better we will take care of our patients."

While the program has recently been added, the new graduates are already reaping benefits.

Kelsee Brown has worked in the emergency room at Stillwater Medical for two years while finishing her education to become a registered nurse and earn her Bachelor of Science in Nursing. As a fully registered nurse, she was eager to further her education through the program.

"Between the in-person lectures, hands-on interactive simulations and course modules, I am learning valuable information I will use every day," Brown said. "This residency program is going to equip me with the knowledge, and experience, I need to be the best nurse I can be and allow me to provide the best possible care for my patients."

The first cohort of program students graduated in the last week of April 2025, where a ceremony was held to honor their commitment to continued education. Also, graduates received a free one-year membersip to the ENA.

The program is placed at a year-long endeavor for Stillwater Medical, but Gilbert hopes to see a continued partnership. Stillwater Medical has opening for nurses in a variety of specialty areas. To learn more or apply visit https://www.stillwater-medical.org/careers/.

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# Clinical Partners Help OU Students Thrive

# The excitement. The lightbulb moments.

For nursing students, there is no greater joy than stepping onto the clinical floor and succeeding.

For University of Oklahoma Fran and Earl Ziegler College of Nursing Interim Dean Melissa Craft, APRN-CNS, AOCN, FCNS, FAAN, clinical rotations are truly where the rubber meets the road and nursing careers take off.

"It takes them a while to realize that a nurse is more than just the skills that you bring," Craft said. "Their eyes light up in both taking care of patients but also learning the skills. Over time you learn a lot of what nurses do are the soft skills."

"For me, what I love is seeing those students put that together. Getting the IV stick the first time, that's awesome, that's exciting, that's cool. Holding the patient's hand after you get the stick and talking to them through what happens next and the surgery they're afraid of, that's the part that makes the biggest impact on the patient and what they will remember their nurse for."

And none of that would be possible if it wasn't for the clinical partnerships the college has forged through the years. Each semester hundreds of OU nursing students fan out to facilities across the state for their first real foray into nursing.

The first few times can be scary, but what most students don't realize is that seasoned nurses like Craft and other faculty have already set them up for success.

"My perspective of the importance of our clinical partners has grown even more over the last year," Craft said. "I've always known how important clinical partners are but the perspective I've gained ... is for us to be able to admit every qualified applicant to one of our five sites, the critical way we can do that is we have to have clinical spots. This is a practice profession."

"We have to have other people that will help train our students. Having clinical partners that guarantee us those spots is huge."

Those partnership aren't just clinical spots but truly learning opportunities and even stepping stones into first jobs.

Stefanie Beavers, DNP, RN, NEA-BC, knows that better than anyone.

As the college's inaugural OU Health's Chief Nurse Executive, Beavers is an integral part in weaving those partnerships together.

"It's critical, especially right now with our nursing workforce shortages, that as health systems we are providing this space and adjunct clinical faculty to support the College of Nursing and to realize how it helps develop students for transition into nursing practice," Beavers said. "We know our students really need that

clinical anchor."

Beavers said the nursing industry has learned how critical it is to support its partners on the academic side as they support students in the clinical environment.

"We are really helping to create the pipeline for our future workforce," she said. "Ultimately, we're training our future workforce. It's our obligation as an academic health system."

The conversation regarding clinical partnerships is two-fold, Craft explained.

"I really need my clinical partners to help me not only with the preceptors - the bedside nurses helping to train the students - but adjunct faculty," she said. "It's impossible to hire enough full-time faculty to manage all of the clinical groups."

Not only do students get clinical spots, but nurses at those facilities also have an opportunity to become adjunct faculty and expand their knowledge base.

And opening horizons is what clinicals are really about.

Craft's nursing wheelhouse is as an oncology clinical nurse specialist. She tells about Fall semester 2024 when she split a clinical group with another instructor and took them to the OU Health North Tower and the oncology floors.

"For that day, the lightbulbs that came on for the students were amazing for me to watch," Craft said.

And thanks to clinical partnerships, the excitement goes both ways.

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# Oklahoma Nursing Association Celebrates Its Role

Oklahoma nurses and nursing students gain a powerful platform to understand and influence the dynamic evolution of their profession through membership in the Oklahoma Nurses Association (ONA). The annual convention in the Fall, featuring many informative speakers, and the opportunity to become advocates at Nurses Day at the Capitol in Oklahoma City in March each year, empower them to shape the future of nursing.

This year, over 400 nurses, nurse practitioners, educators, and student nurses came together on March 4 at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum. They were part of a community that heard about the crucial legislation and listened to numerous speakers advocating for the positive transformation of their profession. After the ONA hosted the meeting, this community of dedicated professionals traveled to the Oklahoma Capitol that afternoon to lobby for the new legislation, further strengthening their bond.

The organizers offered diverse and inclusive breakout sessions and a dynamic keynote speaker focused on building supportive structures. They emphasized helping nurses to thrive in the new normal since COVID-19, as their challenging work environment evolves.

This year, key topics included protecting nurses from surgical smoke and access to care through the passage of the Advanced Registered Nurse Transition to Practice Bill at the Capitol.

The ONA's Strategic Goals, which include advancing the profession to improve health through advocacy, philanthropy, practice, and innovation, are not just a roadmap for the future, but also a source of inspiration. They aim to champion nursing's value and increase its positive impact on health and society, inspiring all nurses to strive for excellence in their practice.

This highlights the progress made in the nursing profession. Since COVID-19, it has become increasingly proud and optimistic about assuming its rightful place as a key component in delivering high-quality medical care.

The meeting was a step toward advancing and belonging to an advocacy group to improve nursing practice and work environments. The sessions

addressed the steps in the legislative process.

One of the attendees emphasized how nurses were newly important as world-class healthcare providers during COVID-19 at the clinic she and her team opened in 2018.

"At our Corner Clinic in Holdenville, our staff of six was doing everything we could to help our patients who had mild to moderate COVID-19 infections. They were at grave risk for progressing to severe COVID-19, facing hospitalization and death," said Stephanie Keesee, MSN, APRN-CNP, Co-Chair of Advanced Practice Nurses Oklahoma – ONA Chapter.

Oklahoma's nurses and nurse practitioners can take pride in how progressive their nursing association is as a disseminator of important cuttingedge information and therapies. The ONA takes great pride in keeping everyone up to date.

"As soon as it was available, we used Regeneron, an experimental antibody cocktail, to keep our patients out of an emergency room and hospital. We took advantage of those two therapies by infusing monoclonal

antibodies (mAbs) intended to directly neutralize the COVID-19 virus and prevent disease progression. We were proud we could ease our patients' discomfort and help alleviate the burden on our health care system."

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# OC Offers Unique Nursing Program that Combining Faith, Firsthand Experience

Oklahoma Christian University in Edmond offers a unique nursing program that combines faith and firsthand experience preparing students with a well-rounded education.

"Our first graduating class was 2008, and now we have an enrollment that's nearing just over 450," Dr. Toni Davis, DNP, RN, Oklahoma Christian University Chair of Nursing, Assistant Professor of Nursing said. "We are unique in the fact that we are a small Christian school. We have a diverse population of students, and we have a diverse population of faculty. We have 10 students to one professor. That is pretty good."

OC offers a Nursing (B.S.N., Pre-Licensure) program with both on-campus and online learning. An OC graduate with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree will:

- 1. Exemplify Christian principles of compassion, service, integrity, and respect for the well-being of clients, peers, and self.
- 2. Synthesize critical thinking skills for professional nursing practice.
- 3. Communicate clearly, effectively, and appropriately with clients and other healthcare providers to promote positive client outcomes.
- 4. Provide appropriate and safe nursing care (clinically competent) to clients.
- 5. Demonstrate a leadership style consistent with academic preparation while adhering to the standards of the nursing profession.
- 6. Provide nursing care based on knowledge and appreciation of unique cultural variations.



Students must complete a minimum of 123 hours including the major, core, and minor if required. Additional elective hours may be required to reach a total of 123 hours.

Davis said OC offers a state-of-the-art simulation lab for nursing students.

"We have an amazing simulation lab," she said. "We're able to teach students about how to take care of patients with mannequins. That is unique for a small school like ours."

Davis said OC nursing students can earn their degree online, if desired.

"We have an online program that's one of a kind," she said. "There's not one like this anywhere where a student can get a four-year degree in nursing all online. We have three starting dates. You can start in the fall, you can start in the spring, and you can start in the summertime. The online program does allow for those who are working adults to have the flexibility to take classes online. They do have to come on campus to do some validation of skills and go to clinicals in the hospitals. Over 660 hours of clinical hours that's required for Oklahoma Christian for these students to graduate and be ready for the workforce. That's for both online and in-person."

Davis said OC nursing students can learn through mission trips. "We offer international and domestic mission trips for all students to

have that opportunity to do that, which is unique as well," she said.

Davis said OC tackles specialties of nursing, namely critical care, pediatrics, and obstetrics.

"We cover most medical specialties," she said. "Med-Surg nursing, critical care, pediatrics, mental health. There are schools that combine those classes. Not Oklahoma Christian. We have those classes one at a time." Davis said OC does community health services.

"We serve the community. We do school screenings, we work at public health agencies across the state," she said.

OC nursing students do clinical training.

"They're getting in and doing the job. When these students go to clinicals, they're assigned a nurse every clinical shift, which can be between eight- and 12-hours shift," Davis said. "It is not really a following or a shadowing. The clinical training is where they do the work as a nurse under the supervision of their clinical instructor and the preceptor, the nurse they're assigned."

Davis said before a student is accepted to the OC nursing school, they must take four introductory classes.

"That's when we introduce the simulation lab to them," she said. "We've got four introductory courses that we give them teaching the early skills of taking care of patients. It is hands-on from the beginning. We teach them how to take care of patients before they enter the nursing program. That is unique."

Gabriel Jeter, an OC senior, said the OC School of Nursing is the most supportive faculty on campus.

"I've never met a group of professors who have cared more about their students, their health and their overall well-being," he said. "I will be a better nurse because of my experience here at OC!"

Davis said faith plays a key role in OC's students' lives.

"It's no secret everywhere that nursing is tough," she said. "What makes us unique, though, is that we instruct our students not really to bear it but just to seek Christ in all

of your endeavors and all the things that you do with patients. That sets us aside from everyone

#### **CAREER LADDER & TRADITIONAL**

OSU-OKC welcomes LPNs and Paramedics looking for a pathway to being eligible for Registered Nurse licensure. With proof of active, state licensure and required prerequisite courses, LPNs and Paramedics will complete a transition course, then the final two courses in the program.

Upon successful completion of the transition course, students are awarded 17 credit hours of advanced standing credit for their licensure. The coursework for this pathway is provided online. Students come to campus for testing, simulations, and laboratory experiences on Fridays. Students will complete clinical experiences on the weekends. This hybrid design was at the request of our program advisory committee to meet the needs of working adults.

#### **SIMULATION CENTER**

OSU-OKC boasts having one of the largest and most sophisticated simulation facilities in the metro area. Students will experience realistic hospital environments with simulation mannequins that can mimic human patients.

The goal was to make the learning environment as close to an actual hospital as possible to increase students' comfort when they enter our partners' facilities and begin to take care of patients. This decreases student anxiety and boosts student confidence in their ability to care for patients.



#### **Interprofessional Simulation**

OSU-OKC nursing students, OSU-OKC paramedicine students, and OSU-Center for Health Sciences resident physicians come together to rescue, triage, and treat patients with a variety of injuries and illnesses. The goal is for these different groups to learn to work together as they will in the actual healthcare arena.

Student volunteers and staff take on the role of patients and may simulate suffering anything from a traumatic injury requiring being rescued by our paramedic students to a mental health crisis and any other healthcare emergency in between. Not only do students learn to work together as a team, but they will also learn to prioritize care based on the severity of the simulated patient.

Redlands Community College nursing students gain valuable experience in the campus' simulation lab.

"I chose to pursue a career in nursing because of my innate desire to assist others in any way possible," said Kassidy Brinlee, a Redlands nursing student and a student ambassador. "Witnessing my grandmother's battle with dementia deeply impacted me and highlighted the importance of helping others facing similar challenges."

Redlands Community College in El Reno, Okla., gives these students the start toward a successful and fulfilling career in the health care field where they impact the lives of patients and families every day. With a 100% job placement rate, Redlands offers a two-year degree program that prepares graduates to successfully take the National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX) for licensure as a registered nurse and to enter the workforce immediately.

"The benefit of earning an associate degree in nursing at Redlands is that graduates are well-prepared for the licensure exam that will allow them to begin working quickly," said Diane Duffy, interim director of Redlands' Nursing Program. "Once they have completed this stage, they are able to focus on their career as a registered nurse or continue their education at a university to earn a bachelor's of nursing degree."

Redlands has two nursing

program options: the traditional RN program and a track for Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs). Students who are enrolled in the LPN-to-RN cohort earn articulation credits in the first semester, allowing them to graduate in three semesters instead of four. This helps get them out of the classroom and into the community where they can do the most good.

Hollye Edmonds has taken a different path to the nursing field. After spending 15 years as a pre-k teacher, Edmonds decided to pursue a new career that still allows her to help others.

Returning to school can be daunting, but Edmonds has found a supportive environment at Redlands. "From the beginning, I was offered help and guidance from enrolling in courses to securing financial aid when needed and every area in between. Redlands has made the process of being a student easy and has mapped out clear pathways to success and supports their students on their journey."

Redlands is a solid, affordable choice for students because of the scholarships available as well as the personal attention and opportunities it provides. The college's partnerships with several area health facilities provide students with challenging, hands-on

experience during their clinical rotations.

"Fortunately, our location just outside of Oklahoma City gives our students the opportunity to serve in both rural and urban areas, exposing them to the different types of nursing care available and helping them figure out what is the best fit for them" Duffy said.

After spending a decade in pre-hospital health care, Jeremy Pool was ready to expand his experience with a greater focus on patient care. He had previously earned an associate degree from Redlands as well as other medical certifications, so he wanted to complete the college's nursing program.

"I find the staff very helpful and down to earth and my college credits transferred seamlessly here," Pool said. "The faculty goes above and beyond to make sure you have the tools and resources to succeed in the program. They are with you every step of the way to answer questions, address problems or concerns, and assist with test taking strategies and note taking."

With a Cooperative Arrangement Development Grant from Native American Serving Non-Tribal Institutions (NASNTI) Part A to support outreach and retention efforts and additional funding to update campus simulation labs, the Redlands Nursing Program is providing a high-quality learning experience led by dedicated and well-trained faculty.

"At Redlands, everyone is friendly, and the faculty is excited to be part of students' lives," said Duffy. "We are committed to helping our nursing students succeed, and our faculty and staff are dedicated to supporting them throughout their time in the program."

Pool agreed, saying "I feel the faculty I work with daily make an impact on my success in their own way. Professor Newell makes lectures and test prepping always engaging and interesting, while my success coach keeps me accountable of my work and gives me great advice on how to approach my test taking and time organization."

The five-year cooperative grant is designed for Native American and low-income students and is 100% funded by the U.S. Department of Education as part of the NASNTI program.

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# Northern Oklahoma College A Shining Star

Tucked away in Tonkawa, Northern Oklahoma College has been turning out some of the state's best nurses for more than half a century.

One-hundred percent NCLEX pass rates going on three years now, small class sizes, three campuses and multiple pathways make NOC a leader in nursing education.

Under the direction of Dr. Nikole Hicks, NOC Nursing Division Chair, the program is rigorous and innovative.

"Faculty really get to know our students and help to provide them with resources to be successful," said Hicks, who has seen Northern Oklahoma College's reach expand to campuses in Enid and Stillwater. "They have lots of support. We have faculty who specialize in success coaching and a structured remediation program for those who are struggling with exams or clinicals."

The College has learning partnerships with both large and small facilities to provide experience in both urban and rural inpatient and outpatient settings.

Hicks said students come from a variety of backgrounds and age groups.

"We have a lot of diversity. We have traditional college students NORTHERN coming out of high school ... we also have students embarking on nursing as a second

or third career choice," Hicks said. "We really have a wide variety and the positive of that is students can learn from each other. There are students with experience who can help mentor other students.

"There is no typical Northern student. It's a wide variety of people who want to go into nursing, help people, make a difference and improve their communities."

In 2023, the college celebrated a half century of success.

Fifty years of success included more than a few accolades including a Top 10 Nursing Program in the state ranking, according to Nursing Hub.

The celebration was marked with a gathering of past and present nursing students, even members of the first graduating class.

"It was wonderful," Hicks said. "People from the community talked about how Northern Nursing graduates have made a difference to them. (It was rewarding) just to see the things this program provided a foundation for people to be able to do: innovative things, practice areas, advanced degrees

and people in education in all areas of nursing.

"To see the impact starting from one location - one small program - the impact in producing nurses who go on

> to care for thousands of people in our communities was really remarkable."

Northern Oklahoma College, the State's first

public community college is a multi-campus, land-grant institution that provides high quality, accessible, and affordable educational opportunities and services which create lifechanging experiences and develop students as effective learners and leaders within their communities in a connected, ever-changing world.

Northern Offers offers a two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree for the RN. A two-year RN's focus is providing care at the bedside regardless of whether the bedside is located in the hospital, clinic, doctor's office, hospice, nursing home or community.

The program also focuses on how to manage care for groups of patients.

NOC also offers an opportunity for students to complete their fourth semester clinical experiences and be paid by the clinical site through Academic Practice Partnerships.

"It's part of onboarding and a commitment the clinical facilities make to help partner in their education and it's a great opportunity for our students to dedicate more time to their studies the last semester because they

are receiving payment for their clinical hours," Hicks said. "It's a very unique opportunity."

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# OCU offers 12-month Accelerated BSN Degree Program

In 2023, Oklahoma City University introduced the state's first and only in-person 12-month accelerated Bachelor of Science in nursing (BSN) degree to help address the nation's critical nursing shortage.

"An accelerated bachelor of science in nursing (BSN) degree is one of the strongest tools we can employ to help fill the nursing employment pipeline," said Gina Crawford, dean of Oklahoma City University's Kramer School of Nursing. "The overall goal of the program is to assist second degree students in completing their BSN in one year; this is to assist in the achievement of their professional career goals, but also to have high-quality nurses entering the workforce at a faster rate."

Crawford said the program has been highly successful.

"Students in the ABSN have found their stride in the rigors of an accelerated format," she said. "The faculty have designed the 8-week courses to meet all curriculum requirements in a manageable format for students. The accelerated students must complete the same curriculum requirements as students who are in the traditional option. Our faculty are committed to providing students with support and resources that set them up for success."

Dr. Casey Cassidy, Associate Dean of KSN, said in December 2024, KSN graduated its first ABSN cohort of 33 students

"There are currently 87 students enrolled in the ABSN option. We admit the ABSN twice a year (Fall and Spring)," she said.

Amaka Okwudigbo endured quite a journey moving to the United States from Nigeria in pursuit of a career in the healthcare field.

She overcome homelessness, food insecurity, and financial issues to fight for her career dreams.

Okwudigbo graduated with her BSN in December from OCU and recently passed her NCLEX. She is moving to Tulsa to work at St. Francis Hospital in their Trauma Emergency Center.

"OCU's Kramer School of Nursing has been a very good foundation for me, and the fast track was one of the best decisions I made," she said. "Even though it is fast track, they let you do your own thing at your own pace, but you must meet the deadline regardless. I really enjoyed my stay."

OCU is making substantial scholarship money available to almost all students accepted in the program to help pave the way for those interested in pursuing the degree and becoming a nurse.

The degree track is open to any student with a non-nursing associate or bachelor's degree. Courses are offered in eightweek blocks.

To help increase financial access to the program, the Kramer School of Nursing (KSN) is making its Kramer Way Scholarship available to at least 10 students who begin in January. The scholarship is awarded through a competitive application process; it provides \$15,000 to each of the selected



students

In 2024, OCU reduced the total program cost which allowed students to complete an affordable BSN degree.

"OCU offers generous academic scholarships to pre-licensure BSN students," Crawford said. "For example, a student with a 3.6 or higher cumulative GPA, the program cost is \$23,560.

"Kramer School of Nursing has numerous endowed scholarships and partnerships to lower the cost even further."

The Kramer Way Scholarship provides \$15,000 for 13 students each year for students beginning the program in the spring semester.

"The Kramer Way Scholarship allows students to obtain a BSN they may not have otherwise been able to afford to go back to school," Cassidy said. "Dean Crawford is committed to continuing to build current and new partnerships to support students at Kramer School of Nursing."

Oklahoma City University (OCU) also offers transfer and departmental scholarships, as well as special nursing scholarships for some students transferring from Oklahoma City Community College. These scholarships - based on a student's college GPA - provide an opportunity to defray a significant portion of the program's costs.

For example, all students with a college transfer GPA of at least 3.0 will automatically receive nearly \$10,000 in scholarships. All students with a GPA of 3.6 or higher will receive more than \$17,000 in scholarships.

The 12-month accelerated BSN degree is the second major initiative OCU has unveiled recently in its efforts to help combat the nursing shortage.

The school announced the Saints & Stars Program, a five-year partnership with SSM Health St. Anthony Hospital. Saints & Stars allows certain OCU nursing students to work part-time with SSM Health while receiving scholarships and tuition discounts during their junior and senior year of college.

In addition to the 12-month accelerated BSN program, OCU offers a variety of other nursing programs with options both on-campus and online, including master's and doctoral degrees; a registered nurse-BSN degree; a licensed practical nurse-BSN degree; and a traditional, two-year BSN track.

"Kramer is dedicated to providing high quality education," Crawford said. "Our faculty are innovative and are consistently updating the curriculum to support student success and provide enriching opportunities, such as

interprofessional education, immersive clinical experiences, and simulations. We want to actively be a part of the solution for an ongoing shortage of registered nurses in Oklahoma, and we see ABSN as one avenue to support our community's health."

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# OSU Nursing Program Dedicates Mary K. Chapman Nursing Simulation Laboratory



The nursing lab on Oklahoma State University's Stillwater campus has been dedicated as the Mary K. Chapman Nursing Simulation Laboratory.

The College of Education and Human Sciences unveiled the name on April 15th at an event celebrating the project's major gift donors.

The lab is located in the former Scott-Parker-Wentz cafeteria, which has been transformed into a state-of-the-art facility. It has been in use since early 2025, ensuring students are prepared to meet the dynamic health care needs of individuals, families and their communities.

A four-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree began being offered at the Stillwater campus in the 2023-24 academic year. The program is crucial for Oklahoma, which is facing a critical shortage of nurses. Students in the program have hands-on experience with both rural and urban settings, including 600 hours of clinical experience.

"Thanks to the generosity of donors and the work of our

incredible faculty and students, the future of OSU Nursing is very bright," said Dr. Jon Pedersen, College of Education and Human Sciences dean. "We are truly grateful to the Chapman Foundation, the Pedigo family and the Masonic Charity Foundation of Oklahoma. They are providing first-class facilities, top-of-the-line equipment and scholarship support for students, and their early commitment has been vital in building momentum for the program."

The H.A. and Mary K. Chapman Foundation supported the initiative with a \$1.5 million gift. Mary K. Chapman was born in Oklahoma where she worked as a nurse, later establishing the Tulsa-based foundation before her death in 2002.

Rick and Terri Pedigo, whose daughter attended OSU, were also early investors in the Stillwater nursing program. Pedigo Products Inc., a medical equipment manufacturer, donated more than \$100,000 in equipment to outfit the new lab including stretchers, IV poles and more.

"We are proud to support the new OSU Nursing program by providing state-of-the-art medical equipment that will directly transform the educational experience of future health care professionals," Rick Pedigo said. "Nurses offer invaluable insights into how medical products can revolutionize patient and staff safety, improve clinical outcomes

Faber, 20, of Yukon, has a close relative who developed a serious infection due to improper sterile technique during surgery. This experience reinforced the importance of his chosen career.



Their vigilance helps prevent infections and ensures patient safety. After surgery, they are responsible for sterilizing and storing instruments, an essential step in preventing contamination.

#### **Vision Care Technician**

Carlee Wall does not see herself in college. Instead, her career choice came into focus when she enrolled at CV Tech.

Soon, she will become a Certified Ophthalmic Assistant, which establishes her as an eyecare professional. She is thinking about pursuing more advanced certifications down the road.

"I learned ophthalmic skills and how to be professional in a workplace," she said. "Yes, at 19, I already have a career with job stability and room for growth. CV Tech taught me a lot of technical skills that I get to use while helping others."

Lacey Arreola, 26, of Yukon, was tipped by a colleague about a year-round program that prepares students for the NCLEX exam for a career as a Licensed Practical Nurse. Timeframe is 18 months, and the pass rate is nearly 100 percent.

"The schedule gives you the flexibility to still have a job and take care of your family while still getting an education," Arreola said. "You take it one class at a time, one day at a time. You are responsible for your own success."

LPNs provide basic nursing care under the supervision of registered nurses and physicians. Primary duties include taking vital signs, administering medications and assisting patients with daily activities. Students who complete the program may pursue an online LPN-to-BSN program through Southwestern Oklahoma State University. Arreola plans to start this bridge program in January.

**Medical Assistant** 

Kenlee Early, enrolled last year at CV Tech. Health Careers student are given options after their first year at the Cowan Campus in Yukon. Among the options is enrolling in Medical Assistant in preparation for attaining a Registered Medical Assistant licensure.

Early, 18, and a Piedmont High School senior, said she's wanted to become a nurse since childhood. She believes working as an RMA is the next logical step.

"I wanted to challenge myself," she said of the Medical Assisting program. "Only one high schooler has graduated from it. CV Tech has helped me become so much more of an adult. It's self-paced but with accountability."

Early has enrolled at BYU-Idaho and plans to pursue a three-year bachelor's program in Nursing.





Nissi Jordan's passion for nursing stems from an innate ability to nurture and a childhood emphasizing mind and body wellness. Her parents' belief in food as medicine shaped her entire approach to nursing care and remains a philosophy for future goals. These early lessons now drive her pursuit of a Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) degree.

Jordan's undergraduate journey in nursing began at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, where she earned her Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) degree in 2017.

During her last year of nursing school, she became a first-time mom with husband Blake and struggled with postpartum depression.

It was during this time that
Northwestern faculty members
Dr. Leslie Collins, chair of the
Charles Morton Share Trust
Division of Nursing and associate
professor of nursing; Dr. Krista
Tilley, assistant professor of
nursing; and Dr. Jennifer Mahieu,
associate professor of nursing,
played a crucial role in supporting
her through the challenges of
balancing motherhood and
education.

"I confided in Dr. Collins and Dr. Tilley about my emotional challenges, and their empathy and support helped me navigate that problematic period and finish nursing school, which I am so thankful for," she said. "And Dr. Mahieu was instrumental in ensuring student success, providing endless resources that benefited me and my peers."

After graduating, Jordan took some time away from schooling and studying to focus on her new career as a nurse, where she gained hands-on experiences in various settings.

During this time, she became certified as an Infection Preventionist, a role that allowed

her to gain insight into policymaking with long-term care facilities and exposed her to the broader political landscape of healthcare.

Her experiences as a Registered Nurse (RN) span longterm care, infection prevention, and emergency room and trauma nursing.

"These diverse roles have enabled me to collaborate closely with interdisciplinary healthcare teams and interact with patients and families to ensure optimal outcomes," she said.

Jordan added that while working with everyone from neonates and psychiatric patients to geriatrics, she has gained invaluable experience in assessment, diagnosis and treatment.

Jordan credits
Northwestern's rigorous nursing program and hands-on professional experiences for giving her the confidence to pursue a DNP. She also cites the university's affordability, quality education and strong faculty support as key reasons for returning in 2024.

"The school provided me with a solid foundation in clinical skills, evidence-based practice and hands-on experiences in various healthcare settings," she said of her undergraduate degree. "Over the years, my passion for nursing and patient care has only deepened, and pursuing a DNP is the next step in my professional journey."

As Jordan works through the stresses of her first year in the DNP program and family obligations (she now has two young children), she also is employed as an emergency room/trauma nurse at St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid, Oklahoma, a little more than one hour from her home in Alva, Oklahoma.

"I appreciate that the DNP program is self-paced with deadlines that align well with working professionals' schedules," Jordan said. "The faculty members have been incredibly supportive and accommodating to student

Face-to-face classes for both general and advanced standing entry students are available as well as online classes with a face-to-face clinical component for advanced standing students.

Students in the face-to-face track are able to take daytime classes at all three campuses.

Through its online program, WOSC draws students from a wide radius including Texas and northwest and central Oklahoma.

Fairchild said several current students entered the program when their military spouses came to the area and will likely go on to other states to practice.

The nursing faculty at Western includes a bevy of specialties. When they aren't in the hospital, an ER nurse, nurse practitioner, ICU nurses, and house supervisors bring a wealth of experience to Western nursing students.

For this reason NCLEX RN first time pass rates are high at Western.

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










#### Why go to college?

More money, more job options, and more freedom. With less than a high school diploma the average income is just over \$34,000 per year. With an Associates degree your earnings jump to more than \$58,000 per year and \$75,000 with a Bachelor's degree. Earnings soar ever higher with a Master's and/or Doctoral Degree at over \$100,000 per year.

#### Checklist.

As a student or the parent of a student about to start college, the following checklists will help you

get ready.

- **1.** Work hard all the way to graduation—second-semester grades can affect scholarship eligibility.
- **2.** Stay involved in after-school activities, and seek leadership roles if possible.
- **3.** As soon as possible after its Oct. 1 release, complete and submit your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®), at fafsa.gov, along with any other financial aid applications

your chosen school(s) may require. You should submit your FAFSA® by the earliest financial aid deadline of the schools to which you are applying, usually by early February.

**4.** After you submit the FAFSA, you should receive your Student Aid Report (SAR) within three days to three weeks. This document lists your answers to the questions on your FAFSA and gives you some basic information about your aid eligibility. Quickly

make any necessary corrections and submit them to the FAFSA processor.

**5.** If you haven't done so already, register for and take the standardized tests required for college admission. Check with the colleges you are interested in to see what tests they require. pply to the colleges you have chosen. Prepare your applications carefully. Follow the instructions, and PAY CLOSE ATTENTION TO **DEADLINES!** 

- **6.** Well before your college application deadlines, ask your counselor and teachers to submit the required documents (e.g., transcript, letters of recommendation) to the colleges to which you're applying.
- **7.** Complete any last scholarship applications.
- **8.** Visit colleges that have invited you to enroll
- **9.** Review your college acceptances and compare the colleges' financial aid offers.
- 10. Contact a school's financial aid office if you have questions about the aid that school has offered you. In fact, getting to know your financial aid staff early is a good idea no matter what—they can tell you about deadlines, other aid for which you might wish to apply, and important paperwork you might need to submit.

11. When you decide which school

you want to attend, notify that school of your commitment and submit any required financial deposit. Many schools require this notification and deposit by May 1st.
